FOREIGN.

PARIS, January 26.

The capture of Malta, by the English is contradicted.

The English are said to have burned all the vessels in Naples harbour; and are to bombard the city, if it falls into the hands of the French.

The Dey of Algiers, having declared war against us, his Envoy was yesterday arrested.

Rebellion yet exists in Belgium.

Gen. Berthier has arrived at Corfica, on his way to consult with the Directory.

The Minister of Marine has addressed the workmen in the dock-yards, and promised the refutation of our Marine; and to hurl vengeance on the "cunning English."

It is said the King of Spain meditates an attempt to retake Minorca; and that the English have extended their views of conquest to Majorca.

It yet remains only expected, that the Congress of Rastadt will conclude a Peace.

The Senate of Hamburg has formally refused to liberate Tandy & Co.

The King of Sweden has refused to receive the French Minister Le Marquis, and is supposed engaged with the Emperor of Russia to enter into war against France.

LONDON, January 2.

The King of Sardinia has been necessitated by French intrigue to abdicate his Throne.

January 19.

It is said a Russian army of 40,000 has entered Germany. And another army is to be embarked on the Baltic for some expedition.

January 22.

The King of Spain has categorically refused the French demand to march troops through his territories to attack Portugal. And this refusal, it is thought will have some effect on the French.

January 27.

T. Barclay, Esq. is appointed Consul General for the Eastern American States.

January 28.

The Germans seem indifferent to the misfortunes of the King of Naples.

Dispatches are received from Lord Nelson, confirming the Neapolitan disasters. Gen. Mack attributed them to the cowardice and subordination of his officers and troops. 6000 persons of the highest rank embarked from Naples on board the English ships. The Royal Family on board Nelson's own ship. Which experiencing a storm on her passage to Sicily, was nearly dismasted; and a son of his Sicilian Majesty died. He was 6 or 7 years of age.

Cork, in Ireland, has declared in favour of an union. 50 members in Parliament participated in the debate on that subject.

January 30.

We learn that Prince Frederick of Orange, died lately on the continent.

The Irish Parliament set all night debating a paragraph in address to the Lord Lieut. assuring him they readily attend to an union with England. At 7 in the morning, it was rejected by a majority of 5.

Paris papers of the 27th say that the Neapolitans, by the last accounts, remained at Capua. The French under its walls. The event of the next combat will decide the fate of Naples.

February 2.

The Insurrection at Cairo was very important; a vast many Frenchmen fell. Since the Pacha of Syria has further discomfited the French army; which has retreated to Damietta. Berthier in this desperate state of affairs has made a bold push to reach France to consult the Directory. The English and the Turks possess Aboukir, and Fate is ready to give the finishing blow to Buonaparte.

The frigate Ambuscade, of 32 guns has been taken by a Frenchman of equal force. After most of her officers were killed or wounded; and many of her men.
