FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 5.

In the action of the 2d, we took 107 high-
landers who have been sent to Utrecht.
There have just arrived here, 100 other pri-
soners. Within two days 3000 French
troops have passed this city, on their way to
the armies.

The English are masters of Lemmer, and
have taken post in Friesland; from whence
they can easily march to this city by land.
We are, however, continually at work on
the batteries upon the dyke at Naerden.

The greatest loss in the battle of the 2d,
fell on the French; and the most part of
the officers of General Brune's staff, have
perished. Some corps were cut off, so that
the inundations ordered by us, have been
more fatal to us than to the enemy. We
were beginning to set the water mills at
work, but the English have set them on fire
with their artillery.

The enemy entered Alkmaar, the 3d inst.
at 5 o'clock, in the afternoon; and we learn
that the head-quarters of Gen. Brune has
been transferred from Beverwyck to Haer-
lem: from whence they will be removed
here should the enemy advance any further.
The English head-quarters we learn, are at
Alkmaar; and some of their troops have ad-
vanced to the neighbourhood of Haerlem.
The batteries which the English erected on
the Dunes, in the action of the 2d, made
great destruction amongst the French.

ZWOLL, (OVERYSSEL) Oct. 6.

The English having made themselves mas-
ters of all the coasts of the Zuyder Zee, in
Friesland and Gueldres, have summoned the
city of Harderwick to surrender.

This day we hear a lively cannonade.

Our loss in the battle of the 2d, has not
yet been accurately ascertained, and we have
had no official account on the subject.

*** This delay is ominous, of its being
more considerable than the Gallo Batavians
wish should be known.

SCHAFFHAUSEN, (on the Rhine)

September 29.

We have not received intelligence from
Zurich, since that city has been occupied by
the French; and we have no knowledge of
the articles of capitulation. Many of the
Russian wounded officers and soldiers are
here, who in the retreat lost some of their
baggage. In the council of war, held yester-
day, by Generals Korsakow, Nauendorff,
and Kienmair, it was resolved, that all the
Russian and Austrian troops, in this vicinity,
should immediately advance.

Translations.

LINDAU, (on Lake Constance) Sept. 29.

The bridge over the Rhine, which was
taken up yesterday morning, will be thrown
over to night, and the corps of Gen. Pe-
trarich, whose head-quarters have been at
Bregenz, is to advance in haste, as he has
been apprised that Generals Jesselich and
Auffenberg, have united with Marshal Su-
warroff, who was advancing into the heart
of Switzerland. He already occupies Lucerne.
