

NEW-YORK, Dec. 1.
By the ship George Barclay, Breath,
36 days from Liverpool, papers to the
19th inclusive are received, containing
London dates to the 17th ult. 3 days la-
ter than received at Baltimore—Extracts
follow.

LONDON, OA. 17.
The Hamburg Mail due on Wed-
nesday arrived this day: and we also re-
ceived this morning's Paris Papers to
the 14th inst. The latter informs us
that the Diet of Ratisbon has at length
delivered its Ultimatum, and that it is
altogether in the spirit of the vote of
Austria.

The intelligence by the Mail is not
interesting nor does it throw any fur-
ther light on the question respecting the
election of the Archbishop of Cologne
and the Bishop of Munster.

The Debt owing to this country by
France for the keep of her prisoners, a-
mounts to very little less than 2,000,000
sterling.

As soon as the news of Peace was
received on the French coast opposite
Jersey, several boats loaded with differ-
ent articles of Provisions proceeded to
that Island. The small Normandy sheep
they sold alive for half-a-guinea each,
turkeys, sixteen-pence each, and butter
sixpence a pound!! As the Islands
will now be supplied from the French
coast, a considerable reduction in the
price of provisions must consequently
take place in the southern and western
parts of England, from whence they
have been wholly supplied.—The price
of butter will be considerably reduced,
owing to the large quantity already
shipped in Holland to London, at prices
greatly inferior to what it has lately
been in this country.

The Hydra frigate sent all her con-
voy for Lisbon into the Tagus safe on
the 24th of Sept. and failed with the
remainder of her convoy to the south-
ward.

His Majesty's ship Hind and Sea-
horle with their convoy were all well
on the 21st ult. off Lisbon.

A PROCLAMATION.

BY Virtue of the Power and Au-
thority granted to me, in and by
an Act of Parliament made and passed in
the Twenty-eighth year of His MAJES-
TY'S Reign, intituled, "An Act for re-
gulating the Trade between the Subjects
of His Majesty's Colonies and Plan-
tations in North-America and in the
West-India Islands and the Countries
belonging to the United States of Ame-
rica, and between His Majesty's said
Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the
West-Indies"—I do, by and with the
advice and consent of His MAJESTY'S
Council, publish this Proclamation,
hereby authorizing and permitting
Wheat, Rye, Rice or Indian Corn and
the Flour of Wheat or Rye—also Ash
Oar-Rafters and Capstank Bars, Slaves,
Heading and Treennails, to be imported
by British Subjects in British built ships
owned by His MAJESTY'S Subjects
and navigated according to Law, from
any of the Territories belonging to the
United States of America, for and dur-
ing the term of Six Months from this
date—and of this Proclamation all Per-
sons whom it may concern will take due
notice and govern themselves accord-
ingly.

at Fredericton, the first day
of July, in the Year of our
Lord, one thousand eight hun-
dred and one, and in the forty-
first year of His MAJES-
TY'S Reign.

{ The town and Township
of Digby.

AS It is probable that the Peace,
which has lately taken place, may
occasion many military and other tran-
sient persons to look for settlements in
these Provinces, and as some such may
incline towards Digby (where a field
offers itself suited to various kinds of
adventurers) several gentlemen of that
place have associated for the purpose of
removing (as much as is practicable)
such difficulties as are most likely to op-
pose themselves to new settlers—

To prevent imposition, uncertainty
and delay from discouraging new co-
mers, they have selected and secured
a number of commodious house-lots in
the Town-plot, upon each of which
they have fixed a moderate price, not
exceeding the lowest rate of selling for
three years past—a proportion of these,
adjoining the water, are adapted to tra-
ding persons.—Others, are calculated

ing a place of some consideration for
ship-building, the fisheries and west-In-
