### TREATY OF PEACE

Between Mr. JOB FRIBBLE, Tailor, of the Parish of St. James's, Westminster, and XANTIPPE, his Wife.

In the name of conjugal happiness, we, Job and Xantippe Fribble, being willing to put a stop to the dreadful effusion of air which has, from time to time, raised such emotions, and produced such a variety of discordant sounds between us during the twelve months that we have lived as man and wife; and feeling a conviction, that if we proceed as we have heretofore done, we shall never obtain the Fitch of Bacon bestowed at Dunmow upon the happy few who continue to love each other after marriage: we have resolved that a CESSATION OF HOSTILITIES shall take place between us from this day forward till death do us part.

From the deranged state of our Household, and to prevent all future wars between us, we have mutually agreed to sign the following articles:

ART. I.—It is stipulated that Mrs. Xantippe Fribble, shall not on any account drink more than one pint a day of that cordial commonly called *Hollands*.—Agreed to with the exception of such times as Mrs. F. may feel herself afflicted with vapours, and when she receives occasional visits from her female acquaintances. IV.—Mr. Fribble is to confine himself principally to his workshop, with the privilege of a free egress and regress to and from the yard, and ingress to the bed room, which is to be like a free port—open to both parties.

V.—It is required, on the part of Mr. Fribble, that the kitchen, dining and drawing rooms, which are to be under the immediate jurisdiction of his wife, shall, on no account be infested with gossiping visitors, or gamblers.—Agreed—with the exception, however, of a few Female Friends, who, by analyzing the actions of their neighbors, promote the love of decency and morality in society; and the privilege of an innocent game at cards every Sunday evening, when Mr. Fribble is at Church; together with permission to have a route once a month.—The latter part of this demand is objected to on the part of Mr. Fribble, except his wife will limit the number of persons invited to the rout, to two hundred, and the expence of the entertainment to one hundred pounds. Agreed with great reluctance by the Lady.

VI.—For the better preservation of domestic harmony, it is agreed upon by the contracting parties, that no worse words than, *my dear* and similar terms of amity, shall pass between them.

VII.—Mr. Fribble is not to swear, nor Mrs. F. to affect falling into a fit any more.

VIII.—Mrs. Fribble shall be free to go to any place of public amusement, and return home at any hour she pleases, without being subject to the in-

terrogation from her husband.—Agreed, provided she does not disturb his repose on her return.

LASTLY.—That the friends of the contracting Parties be invited to a grand ball and supper given in celebration of this happy event.

Signed with the names of the Parties, and sealed with a chaste kiss of reconciliation.

245 are white men, 21 are white women, 64 are black men, and 15 are black women.

241 were convicted in the city of New-York, 25 in the city of Albany, 14 in the county of Dutchess, and one or more in each of the other counties in the state, excepting Richmond, Suffolk, Rockland, Schoharie, and Cayuga, from which there are no convicts in the state prison.

Duration of Sentence.—For life 74. For years—6 for 14, 1 for 12, 4 for 10, 19 for 7, 4 for 6, 22 for 5, 34 for 4, 44 for 3, 85 for 2, 14 for 1, 22 for 1 and 1 day, 5 for 18 months, 4 for 2 years and 6 months, 1 for 5 years and 40 days, 1 for 2 years and 4 months, and 2 for 13 months.

Of the foregoing sentences, 95 will expire during the present year, 1802.

### Who's to pay the piper?

Every government is bound for the protection of the persons and property of its citizens, against the unlawful enterprise and unwarranted hostility of other nations. Our merchants, trading under the sanction of this principle, have been plundered by the belligerent powers, to the amount of many millions. From all except France, restitution has been obtained, or is in a train of obtainment; but on her, the ratificatory clause of the treaty by Bonaparte informs us, we are to have no claim, and to expect no compensation. The spoils by France, are stated to be twenty millions.—In this town the claims are considerable—the Baltimore Insurance Company have demands to the amount of 600,000, the Maryland Insurance Company to 300,000 dollars, and individuals, perhaps to nearly as much—amounting to nearly 2,000,000 of dollars in this place alone. If governments be bound to indemnify its citizens for the illegal captures of other nations, it may not be improper to ask, *who's to pay the piper*.

To the Members of the House of Assembly for defraying their expences of travelling and actual attendance during the present Session, the days of such travel and attendance to be certified by the Speaker, *Ten shillings per diem*.

To the Chaplain of the Council in General Assembly, for his services during the present Session, *Fifteen pounds*.

To the Chaplain of the House of Assembly, for his services during the present Session, *Fifteen pounds*.

To the Clerk of the Council in General Assembly, for Stationary and other expences during the present Session, *Thirty pounds*.

To the Rector and Church-Wardens of the Parish of Fredericks, to be applied to the relief of the Children of the deceased ISAAC HEDDEN, Esquire, late Clerk of the Assembly, *Twenty five pounds*.

To the Clerk of the House of Assembly, for his services during the present Session, *Ten shillings per diem*, and for other services, *Fifty pounds*.

To the Sergeant at Arms attending the Council in General Assembly, *Ten shillings per diem*, for his services during the present Session.

To the Sergeant at Arms attending the Assembly, *Ten shillings per diem*, for his services during the present Session.

To the Door-keeper of the Council in General Assembly, *Five shillings per diem*, for his services during the present Session.

To the Door-keeper of the Assembly, *Five shillings per diem*, for his services during the present Session.

To the Messenger, *Five shillings per diem*, for his services during the present Session.

To the Clerk of the House of Assembly, for Fuel, Stationary, and other expences of the present Session, *Forty-three pounds, Six shillings and One penny*.

To the Tide-Surveyor in the City of Saint John, for his services from the first day of March, One thousand, Eight hundred and One, to the first day of March, One thousand, Eight hundred and Two, and expences incurred in performing the same, *Forty pounds*.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, for payment of the several Adjutants of the Militia, for the year One thousand, Eight hundred and One, a sum not exceeding *One hundred and Sixty pounds*.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, for defraying Contingent expences of the Province, a sum not exceeding *One hundred pounds*.

To the Justices of the Peace for the County of Westmorland, for completing the Court-House in that County, *One hundred pounds*.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, a sum not exceeding *One hundred and Fifty pounds*, to defray the expence of such person as His Excellency may appoint, who shall view the Roads leading from the Nova-Scotia line to Saint John and Fredericks, and from Saint Andrews to Saint John, and report the situation of the same to the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, at their next meeting, with his opinion of such alterations as he may judge requisite more effectually to complete the general communication, with estimates of the expence of such alterations or erection of such Bridges as he may think necessary.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, *Three hundred and Fifty pounds*, towards defraying the expence already incurred in building a Province Hall for the accommodation of the General Assembly and Courts of Justice in Fredericks.

To the keeper of the Light-House on Partridge-Island, *Seventy pounds*, and also *Ten pounds* for Fuel, commencing the first day of January, One thousand, Eight hundred and One, and ending the first day of January, One thousand, Eight hundred and Two; and the like sums from the first day of January, One thousand, Eight hundred and Two, and ending the first day of January, One thousand, Eight hundred and Three; which the Treasurer shall pay as the same may become due, out of the monies arising from the tonnage on vessels, deducting such part as he may have already paid.

To the Commissioners of the Light-House on Partridge-Island, for the purpose of making such repairs to the same and to the keeper's house, as may be found necessary, *Twenty five pounds*.

To the Sheriff of King's County, *Twelve pounds, Eight shillings and four pence*, for returning a Member to serve in General Assembly.

To the Members for the City and County of Saint John in General Assembly, for defraying the expences to be incurred by printing the Journals of the present Session, *Thirty pounds*.

XVIII. And be it further enacted, That all the before-mentioned several sums of money, shall be paid by the Treasurer by warrant issued by the Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, out of the monies now in the Treasury, or as monies may come into the same.

XIX. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force (so far as relates to the quantum of duties imposed and the manner of collecting the same) until the first day of April, which will be in the year of our Lord, One thousand, Eight hundred and Three, and no longer, except for the recovery of any penalties inflicted in and by the thirteenth section of this Act.

### A PROCLAMATION.

BY Virtue of the Power and Authority granted to me, in and by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Twenty-eighth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North-America and in the West-India Islands and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West-Indies"—I do, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and permitting Wheat, Rye, Rice or Indian Corn and the Flour of Wheat or Rye—also Ash Oar-Rafters and Capstaid Bars, Staves, Heading and Treennails, to be imported by British Subjects in British built ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects and navigated according to Law, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for and during the term of Six Months from this date—and of this Proclamation all Persons whom it may concern will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
