A PROCLAMATION.

BY Virtue of the Power and Au-
thority granted to me, in and by
an Act of Parliament made and passed in
the Twenty-eighth year of His MAJES-
TY'S Reign, intituled, "An Act for re-
gulating the Trade between the Subjects
of His MAJESTY'S Colonies and Plan-
tations in North-America and in the
West-India Islands and the Countries
belonging to the United States of Ame-
rica, and between His MAJESTY'S said
Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the
West-Indies"—I do, by and with the
advice and consent of His MAJESTY'S
Council, publish this Proclamation,
hereby authorizing and permitting
Wheat, Rye, Rice or Indian Corn and
the Flour of Wheat or Rye—also Ash
Oar-Rafters and Capstand Bars, Staves,
Heading and Treennails, to be imported
by British Subjects in British built ships
owned by His MAJESTY'S Subjects
and navigated according to Law, from
any of the Territories belonging to the
United States of America, for and dur-
ing the term of Six Months from this
date—and of this Proclamation all Per-
sons whom it may concern will take due
notice and govern themselves accord-
ingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal
at Fredericton, the first day
of January, in the Year of our
Lord, one thousand eight hun-
dred and two, and in the for-
ty-second year of His MA-
JESTY'S Reign.

LONDON, March 1.

A report has been in circulation that
France insists on having a share in the
Newfoundland Fishery, and that the
Court of Madrid is not reconciled to
the cession of Trinidad. For our own
part, we are not inclined to lend these
rumours any faith. The exclusive pos-
session of the Newfoundland Fishery is
what this Country will never relin-
quish; and the Cabinet of the Thulle-
ries cannot be ignorant of it: as to Tri-
nidad, it is unreasonable to suppose that
Bonaparte would have signed the Preli-
minary articles without previously dis-
closing his intentions to Spain and Hol-
land. The delays in the conclusion of
the Definitive Treaty can be traced to
no other motive than the ambition of
the Ecclesiastical Princes and other dig-
nities in Germany, who are straining
every nerve to prevent the intended fe-
deralizations. The First Consul will
find it more difficult to subdue the
Priests than the Mamelukes and the
Austrians. But whatever may be the
discussions at Ratisbon, as well as at A-
miens, they cannot be of such a nature
as to destroy the hope of the approach-
ing blessings of Peace. Every material
dispute between this country and
France may be considered as finally ad-
justed in the Preliminary articles. There
is, however, still one point to be
gained. That Great-Britain has no man-
ner of concern in the affairs of Germa-
ny, is a maxim to which we cannot sub-
scribe. In the present circumstances it
is the absolute interest of England not
only to maintain the integrity of Han-
over, but to enforce its indisputable
claims to Osnaburg, to the four Balli-
wicks belonging to the Elector of Han-
nover, and the Abbey of Corvey. If
the Electoral dominions of his Majesty
should be left at the mercy of Prussia,
that power would not be long to invade
Hamburg, in which case Great-Britain
would find to her door a new rival, per-
haps more dangerous than France. If
his Majesty had not changed his Coun-
cils, this disastrous event was inevita-
ble. It cannot be denied that the late
Administration committed a number of
errors.—We have had conspicuous
proofs of it in the late Parliamentary
Debates, and especially in that of Wed-
nesday last, when the Revenues of the
Dutchy of Cornwall came under discus-
sion.

From the fair statement of the
Prince's Solicitor-General, Mr. Sutton,
every impartial Member felt convin-
ced that His Royal Highness had been
ill used; that a sum amounting to
900,000l. is actually due to his Highness
by the public. It was certainly a gross
indignity to expose a most amiable
Prince to the eyes of the world, as in a
state of insolvency, when the sums due
to his Highness being paid, after liqui-
dating all the claims of his creditors,
there would remain a balance of many
thousands in his favour. We rejoice
to see the disposition of Parliament to do
justice to His Royal Highness, and
make no doubt that Mr. Addington
will support the Prince's cause with the
candour and the wisdom that have hi-
therto characterized the measures of his
Administration.

Lord Hutchinson, having leave to re-
turn to England from Egypt, resigned
his command to the Earl of Cavan,
who remains as senior upon the Staff in
Egypt. The British force left in the
Country in Oct. was about 5,000 men,
exclusive of the Indian Army.

It has been inferred from the Letter
sent by the Prince of Orange to those
who formerly held Offices under him
in Holland, permitting them to accept
employment, that he despairs of a re-
storation to the Stadtholderate. There
seems, indeed, very little reason to be-
lieve that he will ever be reinstated;
but it shews more of policy than de-
spair, to wish to see his adherents in
posts of profit and power.
