Extract of a letter from a respectable house in Liverpool, to their connections in this town, dated Oct. 30.

"Cotton which advanced 2d. 4d. per lb. in a few days after the Preliminaries of Peace were signed, has since become very languid, and purchasers have almost entirely disappeared; holders in consequence have sold 1d. per lb. lower than the prices were before the signing of the preliminaries. This disposition to sell is increased by a fear which universally prevails, of an approaching scarcity of money.

"Coffee has fallen in London 20 a 25s. per cwt. Sugar has not varied more than 2s. a 4s.

"Accounts from Hambro, say, prices of West-India produce would not decline much there if the holders in this country would keep them up but the want of money will oblige many to force the market, which consequently will bring down the prices.

"New-York 1st pot ashes were yesterday sold at auction at 26s. but they were much crusted. 30s. may be had for a good parcel. Pearl's were at the same time sold for 46s. a 47/6. 1 fort.

"Timber from the Baltic has been offered for freight and charges.

"Of Naval Stores the prices are difficult to ascertain; there is not much tar or turpentine in the market but the former is daily arriving; and as part of the Government Stores, which are very heavy, are likely to be sold before long, we may expect to see every article of Naval Stores reduced to peace prices.

"The Lords of the treasury have ordered the Collectors of the Customs to suspend the collection of Convoy Duty; and that which has been paid since the 1st Oct. will of course be refunded.

"The Act granting permission to his Majesty in council to authorise the importation of West-India produce from America, ceases in six weeks from the meeting of Parliament.

"Parliament met yesterday; we may therefore shortly expect to be able to inform you on what footing our commercial intercourse with France will be admitted.

The following are the particulars of an insurrection that happened at Algiers about the 18th of September:—When the Dey was in his mosque at prayer with his aids, ten turks entered the palace armed, took possession of his seat, hauled down his colors, secured the palace doors, hoisted a flag for a new Dey, and, from the windows above offered a reward of 10,000 sequins to any one who would take his life. As he could not come out of the door of the mosque, on account of its being situated under the windows of the palace, and the Turks within having it in their power to fire upon them they cut a passage thro' the back of the building, and entering the palace attacked the insurgents, seven of whom made their escape, the other three fought until two of them, overcome by loss of blood, were compelled to surrender. The other was cut to pieces in the Dey's seat, after usurping that post of honor for three hours. All however, was quiet the 22d September.

Insurrection among the Tailors.

Two hundred and fifty in Berlin, who refused to work without an increase of wages, have been seized and sent into prison, where they are to be detained without the smallest allowance of *goose and cabbage* till their obstinacy shall be subdued, and they shall declare themselves content to *stitch* for the same number of *Kreutzers* as before.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to the second Tuesday of this instant, November; I have therefore thought fit, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Council, further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the Fourth Tuesday in January next ensuing, then to meet at Fredericton, for the dispatch of Business.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the Second day of November, in the Year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and One, and in the Forty-Second Year of His Majesty's Reign.

The Town and Township of Digby.

AS it is probable that the Peace, which has lately taken place, may occasion many military and other transient persons to look for settlements in these Provinces, and as some such may incline towards Digby (where a field offers itself suited to various kinds of adventures) several gentlemen of that place have associated for the purpose of removing (as much as is practicable) such difficulties as are most likely to oppose themselves to new settlers.

To prevent imposition, uncertainty and delay from discouraging new comers, they have selected and secured a number of commodious house-lots in the Town-plot, upon each of which, they have fixed a moderate price, not exceeding the lowest rate of selling for three years past—a proportion of these, adjoining the water, are adapted to trading persons.—Others, are calculated for mechanics—and a few more, for such as are only concerned in having an agreeable building spot for a house, and room for a garden. The first applicant will have the first choice, and so on with other applicants in succession, till the whole are sold at the prices fixed; a quantity of wild lands, laid out in farm lots, is also in like manner to be sold, and the purchasers will be secured against all deception with respect either to the titles, boundaries or qualities of the soil.

The society will further give the best information in its power to such, as on their first arrival are inclined to make other purchases, or to engage in any business or contract.

The Township of Digby extends from the Gut of Annapolis westward to the extremity of the Province of Nova-Scotia, and contains about one hundred and fifty thousand acres; of which, a body of about twenty five or thirty thousand, lying to the southern or inland side, is still in the possession of the crown, ungranted; the remainder is all appropriated, surveyed, divided into lots and planned—and, by the care of Government, it has lately been secured to the present owners under a clear and effectual grant. The lands in general are good, well wooded and watered; and the Township throughout its whole length is interspersed with settlements—Being washed by the Bay of Fundy and deeply indented by St. Mary's Bay, it has a great proportion of sea coast, and an ample share of all the kinds of fisheries common in Nova-Scotia.

The Town-plot is situated at the East end of the Township, just within the entrance of the Annapolis Basin, and twenty miles from Annapolis town, and six miles across land, from the head of St. Mary's Bay. It is laid out from the waters edge partly on level ground and partly, on the declivity of a moderate hill, dry and pleasant, and having, with an eastern aspect, a view of an Annapolis Basin, and its cultivated shores for twenty miles, to where, it terminates with the Fort and Rivers mouth of that name. It was settled by Loyalists from New-York in the year 1779, the most of whom went early to farms, or moving to older countries, left the whole side to be bought up and improved by about sixty families, who now reside in it, having detached but comfortable dwellings, with little gardens and orchards, and carrying on some fishery and foreign trade. It has good communication both by land and water with all parts of the County of Annapolis. Provisions in it are plenty and cheap. Building materials readily to be procured, and from many local circumstances, there is a probability of its becoming a place of some consideration for ship-building, the fisheries and west-India Trade, as well as a pleasant, cheap, and comfortable place of residence.
