

opposition to the engagements France has contracted for them.

The show and parade which Bonaparte is introducing in his government seem to be carried farther than is necessary for stage effect, and farther than prudence would recommend. The new office of Commandant of the palace, the appointment of four Prefects of the palace, the plan of attaching four General officers to command the Consular guard in succession, instead of a fixed Commandant, throws an additional splendour round the government. We do not suppose that these measures are adopted from any apprehension for his safety, which Bonaparte may entertain. We see him send his brother-in-law, General Leclerc, to St. Domingo; his favorite General Lannes, one of the most intrepid men in France, to Portugal. These are persons on whom, in case of resistance, he could depend, and whom, if he expected it, he would not send away. The new scheme seems chiefly calculated for ostentation and it must be attended with considerable expence. It is very difficult to form an accurate opinion of Bonaparte's future intention from his present measures.

It is said that Government have it now in contemplation to make a very fine capacious harbour at Dunbar, capable of containing 20 sail of ships of war.

Peterhead has, we know, been surveyed for a similar purpose, and we understand that an eminent engineer has been taking observations along the coast, from Fort George to Dunbar.

Yesterday, Mr. Addington, in the course of conversation with the Committee of Gentlemen holding Exchequer Bills, stated, that Government had the satisfaction of receiving that day, dispatches from Marquis Cornwallis at Paris, announcing that the Chief Consul had declared his willingness to acquiesce in the wishes of this country, respecting the integrity and interests of Portugal, so that the conditions extorted by France will not be insisted upon.

This morning Paris Journals to the 17th inst. were received. The following are some Extracts from them.

On Friday the Marquis Cornwallis paid a visit, in form to Bonaparte and the other Consuls. The Marquis went in his new chariot with only a pair of horses. The attendants were dressed in their full liveries. After an audience of Bonaparte, which lasted nearly two hours, he returned to his hotel.

The greatest preparations are making at Amiens for the reception of the Plenipotentiaries. The Congress is expected to be opened at that place in a few days. Bonaparte has ordered a statistical survey of all France to be taken with all possible dispatch, for the information of the Agriculturist, the Manufacturer and the Merchant.

Embarkations of French and Dutch troops are carrying on in Holland; the destination of the latter, Batavia and the Dutch Settlements on the coast of Guinea.

It is understood at Paris that 15,000 picked troops will be employed in the service to St. Domingo. General Leclerc, the Commander in Chief, takes with him Toussaint's sons, who have been for some years educating at Paris.

Yesterday morning between the showers His Majesty, accompanied by Earl Chesterfield Lord Walsingham, and his Equeries in Waiting, walked for some time in Kew Gardens. The King took particular notice of the new improvements.

Yesterday morning his Majesty, accompanied by her Royal Highness Princess Sophia, the Duke of Kent, Prince Adolphus, Colonel Manningham, and the attendants in Waiting, rode on horseback in Richmond Gardens.

GLASGOW, Nov. 21.

Bonaparte, it is said, is about to issue a Concordat, for the establishment of a National Religion in France. The Pope styles him his most Christian Consulship, this, surely must be on condition of his restoring Sunday, &c. to the French Calendar. The Archbishops and Bishops are to be limited to fifty. Certain fixed revenues are to be attached to each parish. Priests who have married are not to exercise the clerical functions, tho' they are not to be deprived of their benefices.

The London Gazette received this morning, contains a list of one hundred and twenty-five vessels, taken and re-

taken from the enemy in the Mediterranean, by Lord Keith's fleet and cruizers since his last returns to Government.

BALTIMORE, JAN. 5.

Another Insurrection at Guadalupe.

Arrived yesterday, the schooner Exchange, Captain Vibert, from Guadalupe. Left it on the 11th, at which time Point-Petre and the whole of the Island, was in confusion, another insurrection having taken place there, which, had it not been fortunately discovered at the moment, would have involved the total destruction of every white and mulatto in the island.

The rebels in the present insurrection were the country blacks against the whites and mulattoes. The former, having lent a helping hand in the revolution which had been just effected, expected a total emancipation from their masters; but not finding that event confirmed or even contemplated in the proclamation of the yellow general Pelage, they had determined to achieve their own liberty, thro' the blood of Pelage and his party. For this purpose, 11,000 were to have been organized on the night succeeding that on which the plot was discovered—to have burnt the towns—and to have murdered every man, woman and child of Pelage's party! At that very moment only when it could possibly have been defeated, was the plot discovered by a black woman who was the kept Miss of a white man, when four of the ring-leaders were apprehended.

Notwithstanding the bloody project had been discovered, and for the present warded off, yet every thing was apprehended from the vengeance and ferocity of the blacks, and all was in the utmost confusion. In such haste was the island deserted by those who could get off, that the Exchange came away on the 11th with only 2 hands on board. An English and a French frigate were at that time off the island, cautioning vessels not to go in. Accounts had also been received that general McDonald, with 18,000 men, had sailed for the windward, and general Rochambeau, with 40,000, for the leeward islands.

NEW-YORK, JAN. 5.

Extract of a letter from a very respectable source, to a merchant in this city, received by the *Severn*, dated Nantz, Nov. 3, 1801.

"Letters from Brest announce, that a courier has brought there an order to dispatch, without delay, all the vessels that may be in readiness to carry about 8000 troops, who are in that neighbourhood, to St. Domingo. Others from Paris state, that the Counsellor of State, Benezech, is to proceed for the same island, as Vice-Consul; General Le Clerc a brother-in-law to Bonaparte, as Captain General; General Rochambeau, as Commander of the land forces, having under his orders, the Generals Desfourneaux and Boudet, with from 20 to 30,000 troops.

"Madame Bonaparte is authorized, by her husband, to announce to all the colonists, that they may with confidence open their hearts to joy and comfort, as every thing will be soon restored to good order in that colony; and most probably the expedition to St. Domingo will succeed, without any effusion of blood—Sans Coup Ferre."

We are informed by Captain Wallace, from St. Pierre, (Martinique) that a French frigate had arrived there in a very short passage from Brest, bringing the news of Peace. Two days before she left Brest (which was the 28th of October) the Squadron destined for the West-Indies had sailed. General Rochambeau went out Commander in Chief, having under his command, on board the fleet 20,000 men, which force was divided into 2 divisions, one of which was for Guadalupe, and the other for St. Domingo. But they had not arrived when Captain Wallace sailed.

Mr. Richer, prefect, came out in the frigate with 500 men.

Extract of a letter from Port de-Paix, dated Nov. 23, 1801.

"At 9 o'clock, this day all the national guards and regular troops, received orders to meet at the Public Square, before the general ordered the judg-

ment of general Moyes, formerly general at Cape Francois, and second in command of this island, to be read; by which it appears, that he is condemned for having failed a commotion in the province under his command; of having suffered assassination to be committed in his department; of having refused to obey his superior's orders; of having written an insolent letter to Saint Domingo, after a declaration of the Commandant of the Cape—in consequence he is condemned to death.

His judgment being read before all the troops, they were ordered to march to the fort where Moyes was confined. About 15 minutes after, he came out, and was shot at 11 o'clock.
