Friday last being the anniversary of our Most Gracious Sovereign's Birth-day, the same was kept in this City with every possible demonstration of joy, and with evident tokens of Loyalty and Attachment to His Sacred Majesty.

The brig Hope, Lee, from Cape Francois, has arrived at New-York—called the 29th April, at which time it was generally expected an accommodation had taken place, between Le Clerc and Christophe. The terms, however, were not publicly known.

A letter from Cape Francois, under date of the 29th April, to a gentleman in Philadelphia, states, "a rumour is now very prevalent, that Touffaint has been shot in the shoulder, of which wound he has since died."

Extract of a letter from Cape Francois, dated 27th ult. to a merchant in New-York, received by the brig Hope, arrived there in 15 days.

"Christophe, the black General, has surrendered himself to Gen. Le Clerc; and has promised that all the negroes who left their respective plantations shall immediately return. Commercial business is getting a little better than when I last wrote to you."

Our Correspondent in New-York has favoured us with the subsequent information:

NEW-YORK, Saturday, May 15.
LATE FROM CAPE FRANCOIS.

The brig Hope, arrived at this port last evening in 13 days from Cape Francois, after being detained there, by the government, upwards of three months.—Having experienced every species of injustice and ill treatment that French ingenuity could devise.—From a gentleman passenger in the Hope, we have received the following intelligence:

"Two days before he left the Cape, an interview had taken place at Haut du Cup (a village about three miles from the Cape) between the Commander in Chief, Le Clerc, and Gen. Christophe;—but the result had not officially been made known;—however, the most pleasing conclusions had been made on the subject; and there scarce remained a doubt, but that Christophe had negotiated terms for himself and his army, as he was to be at the Cape on the day that the Hope sailed. Preparations were making to receive him by Gen. Hardy, (Gen. of division of the North) with whom Christophe was that day to dine. Various speculations were abroad, whether Touffaint was not a party in Christophe's arrangements—the best informed, and those most acquainted with Christophe's character, were of opinion that he would not conclude any agreement in which his old chief was not a party, and interested in. From the publicity and form of the audience at Haut du Cup, little doubt can be entertained on this subject.—Gen. Christophe would not come within the French lines until an officer of equal rank was sent over as an hostage and then he entered with every military pomp and parade; the meeting did not appear like that of a traitor stealing an opportunity to betray his trust. These circumstances diffused a general joy throughout the Cape Town; the unfortunate inhabitants of that ill-fated city looked up to them as the harbingers of peace, and at length began to indulge the hope that the period of their persecutions and troubles were drawing to a close. No material progress had been made in rebuilding the town as yet, nor had any change for the better taken place in the treatment the Americans receive from the various departments of the government through which they were necessitated to do their business; every delay and procrastination was practised, nor was it possible to effect the least dispatch but by means of a bribe; not a bill had issued for the provisions, &c. that Government had taken from our cargoes, but what was first paid for in a proportionate ratio to the subaltern clerks and officers. Government had discontinued to put in requisition every article of provision that had lately arrived, as but few were wanted at that moment, though subject to their own prices and conditions.
