A PROCLAMATION.

BY Virtue of the Power and Au-
 thority granted to me, in and by
 an Act of Parliament made and passed
 in the Twenty-eighth year of His MAJES-
 TY'S Reign, intituled, "An Act for re-
 gulating the Trade between the Subjects
 of His MAJESTY'S Colonies and Plan-
 tations in North-America and in the
 West-India Islands and the Countries
 belonging to the United States of Ame-
 rica, and between His MAJESTY'S said
 Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the
 West-Indies"—I do, by and with the
 advice and consent of His MAJESTY'S
 Council, publish this Proclamation,
 whereby authorizing and permitting
 Wheat, Rye, Rice or Indian Corn and
 the Flour of Wheat or Rye—also Ash
 Bar-Rafters and Capstank Bars, Staves,
 Heading and Treennails, to be imported
 by British Subjects in British built ships
 owned by His MAJESTY'S Subjects
 and navigated according to Law, from
 any of the Territories belonging to the
 United States of America, for and dur-
 ing the term of Six Months from the
 first of July next—and of this Procla-
 mation all Persons whom it may concern
 will take due notice and govern them-
 selves accordingly.

MR. RYAN,
I WAS not a little astonish-
 ed to see in your paper of the 23d
 instant, an Advertisement signed George
 M'Call, and it must appear equally unac-
 countable to the Public, that they should
 be troubled with this business, when the
 following statement of facts, which he
 has laid me under the necessity of mak-
 ing is submitted to them.
 The demand in question against
 Mr. Munday, arises upon a Bond and
 Mortgage given by him to me as secu-
 rity for the payment of the purchase
 money of a farm on the Nerepiss, sold
 to him in the year 1784, upon which a
 considerable balance remains due. In
 May 1801, I was informed by Mr.
 M'CALL that Mr. Munday had return-
 ed from Europe to the United States,
 where he had settled and was in good
 circumstances, and that he, Mr. M'Call,
 was ready to take up the Bond and
 Mortgage, but that he had been inform-
 ed by Mr. Munday that an abatement
 had been made of a part of the princi-
 pal, which was indorsed on the Bond,
 and therefore wished to see the Bond;
 upon which the Bond was produced,
 and Mr. M'CALL expressed himself sa-
 tisfied that there was no such indorse-
 ment, but still refused to pay off the
 Bond without the supposed abatement
 being made. I requested him to write
 to Mr. Munday upon the subject which
 he promised to do, and in the course of
 the last spring he informed me, that he
 had written and received Mr. Munday's
 answer, and wished again to see the
 Bond, which was again produced and
 very critically examined by him, when
 he again expressed himself satisfied that
 there was no such indorsement upon the
 Bond, but still refused to make pay-
 ment without the abatement he had be-
 fore contended for.—I then asked him
 if he had any objection to my putting
 the papers into the hands of an Attor-
 ney for recovery of the debt, he repli-
 ed that he had not.—As proceeding in
 the Court of Chancery, to foreclose the
 Mortgage, would have been attended
 with a very heavy expence which must
 finally have fallen upon Mr. Munday,
 the Mortgaged premises being an ample
 security to cover the Debt and Costs, I
 preferred proceeding in the manner
 mentioned in Mr. M'CALL'S Adver-
 tisement; and whenever Mr. M'CALL
 or any other person for Mr. Munday
 shall pay me the balance justly due upon
 the Bond, with the trifling amount of
 the expence I have been put to, I shall
 very readily withdraw those proceed-
 ings; otherwise I shall most certainly
 avail myself of the remedy which the
 law gives me for the recovery of a just
 debt: Mr. Munday not being intitled
 to any abatement of it whatever, upon
 any principle of law, equity or honor.
