CONNEXION AND FACTION.

Connexion and faction are equivalent
terms, is an opinion which has been
carefully inculcated at all times by un-
constitutional statesmen. The reason is
evident. Whilst men are linked to-
gether, they easily and speedily commu-
nicate the alarm of any evil design.—
They are enabled to fathom it with
common counsel, and to oppose it with
united strength. Whereas, when they
lie dispersed, without concert, order or
discipline, communication is uncertain,
counsel difficult, and resistance imprac-
ticable. Where men are not acquaint-
ed with each other's principles, nor ex-
perienced in each other's talents, nor
at all practised in their mutual habitudes
and dispositions by joint efforts in busi-
ness; no personal confidence, no friend-
ship, no common interest, subsisting a-
mong them; it is evidently impossible
that they can act a public part with uni-
formity, perseverance or efficacy. In a
connexion, the most inconsiderable
man, by adding to the weight of the
whole, has his value, and his use; out

of it, the greatest talents are wholly un-
serviceable to the public. No man,
who is not inflamed by vain glory into
enthusiasm, can flatter himself that
his single, unsupported, desultory, un-
systematic endeavors are of power to
defeat the subtle designs and united
cabals of ambitious citizens. When
bad men combine, the good must associ-
ate, else they will fall, one by one, an
unpitied sacrifice in a contemptible
struggle.—Thoughts on the cause of
the present discontents.

EXTRACT.

The mind is ever ingenuous in
making its own distress. The wander-
ing beggar, who has none to protect,
to feed, or to shelter him, fancies complete
happiness in labour and a full meal.—
Take him from rags and want; feed,
lothe, and employ him; his wishes now
is rise one step above his station. He
could be happy, were he possessed of
raiment, food and ease. Suppose his
wishes gratified, even in this; his pros-
pects widen as he ascends; he finds him-
self in influence and tranquillity, indeed;
but indolence soon breeds anxiety; and
he desires not only to be freed from
pain, but to be possessed of pleasure.—
Pleasure is granted him; and this but
opens his soul to ambition, and ambition
will be sure to taint his future happiness,
either with jealousy, disappointment or
fatigue.

DIFFICULTY.

This it has been the glory of the great
masters in all the arts to confront, and
to overcome; and when they had o-
vercome the first difficulty, to turn it
into an instrument for new conquests
over new difficulties; thus to enable
them to extend the empire of their sci-
ence; and even to push forward beyond

Prince Henry of Prussia.—This illu-
strious character, who died on the even-
ing of the 3d inst. at his country palace
at Remsburg, was aged seventy-six years
and nearly eight months; but the he-
roic deeds of the deceased, have insu-
red immortality to his name. His ex-
ploits are celebrated in history, and his
virtues and amiable qualifications are too
well known to need a panegyric. His
Highness himself wrote, some years be-
fore his death, his epitaph, which will
now be placed upon his tomb. It is
in German, to the following purport:—

EPITAPH.—Thrown by birth into
the vortex of a giddy vapour, which the
vulgar call glory and grandeur, but the
nullity of which is too well known to
the sage; a prey to all human infirmi-
ties; tormented by the passions of others,
disturbed by his own, and borne down
by the loss of beloved relations, true
and faithful friends, yet often, too,
consoled by friendship, happy in col-
lecting his thoughts, happier still where
his services could prove useful to his
country, or suffering humanity. This
is a brief sketch of the life of Henry
Frederick Louis, son of Frederick
William I. King of Prussia, and of So-
phia Dorothea, daughter of George I.
King of England. Traveller! remem-
ber that perfection is not to be found
on earth. If I was not the best of men
I did not belong to the number of the
bad. Praise and blame cannot reach
him who sleeps in eternity! but sweet
hope embellishes the last hours of the
man who has done his duty; nor does
it forsake me at this moment.
