THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR is pleased to direct the Twenty-second section of "an Act for the better regulation of the MILITIA in New-Brumwick" to be published in the public News-papers of the Province, in order that no person may plead ignorance; And His EXCELLENCY requests the respective Brigadiers to give the necessary orders to the commanding Officers of the Regiments under their command to be particular in enforcing the same where it may be found necessary.

"AND be it further enacted, That in case of any emergency, any arms or accoutrements shall be furnished to any person belonging to the Militia in this Province, by Government, by reason that such person shall not have had it in his power before that time to have provided the same for himself; if in any such case any person so furnished with arms or accoutrements by Government shall sell or dispose of the same or any part thereof, or shall convey or cause the same or any part thereof to be conveyed out of the Province, or shall convey or cause the same or any part thereof to be conveyed on board any boat, ship or vessel with intent to have the same carried out of the Province, every person so offending, shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Pounds, to be recovered upon conviction before any one Justice of the Peace upon the oath of one or more credible witnesses or witnesses, and levied by warrant of distress and sale of the offender's goods, rendering the overplus if any, after deducting the costs and charges of such distress and sale, to the offender, one half of which penalties shall be to the use of the Poor of the town or parish where the offence shall be committed, the other half to the person who shall prosecute for the same; and for want of effects whereon to levy such fine, such offender shall be imprisoned not exceeding Six nor less than Three months."

Foreign Intelligence.

BASTIA, IN CORSICA,
June 2.

On the 26th of May, the great French Toulon fleet, consisting of 200 sail of ships passed this coast; General Berthier who is on board the same ship with Gen. Buonaparte, landed, and on shore five hours, and gave various orders. The fleet steered towards the east. On the 30th of May it was off the island of Magdalena, where it will join another division, which is waiting for it there. It will likewise be joined by another division, which yesterday arrived in our harbour from Nice. On the 31st of May the fleet was in view of Cagliari.

The convoy which will join the Toulon fleet at the island of Magdalena, has 4000 Land Troops on board. General Casalti, a Corsican, who with General Vaubois, commands it, landed with only 40 officers, and assured the Commandant that he should only stay there till the Toulon fleet, which he was to join, should pass the island. While the French were at Magdalena, they took an English Bilander of 16 guns, and 35 men. At Porto Torres, they purchased 460 oxen, and 600 sheep, for the use of the fleet.

I T A L Y,
June 12.

Buonaparte has already passed the Southern Point of Sardinia, and is proceeding on his voyage. A few discharges of cannon will ensure to France the Sovereignty of Egypt, and the trade of India—the trade, in fact of the world. The cutting through of the isthmus of Suez in a direct line is, indeed not possible; but a junction of the Mediterranean Sea with the Arabian Gulph, in a certain sense, is possible. An expedition will be undertaken from Egypt against the British Indies. It has long been estimated that 10,000 French Troops would be sufficient to ensure the conquest of India, and Buonaparte has between 30 and 40,000.—From the Plague nothing is to be feared, as it generally ceases by the end of June. This Expedition is one of the events which will make an era in the history of the world, and decide the fate of its Commerce. It has already more than half succeeded, and the preparations at Toulon, which were considered as impossible, have been rendered easy by the Helvetic and Roman Revolutions, combined with other great causes.

War between our Republic and the King of Sardinia is now nearly declared. It is known that a short time since, about 500 Piedmontese Rebels seized the town of Carrolio, which is entirely surrounded by our territory. The King of Sardinia, after some fruitless applications to our Government for a passage for his troops, thought proper to order four thousand men to march through the Ligurian Republic, and attack the town. The Rebels immediately evacuated Carrolio which was instantly taken possession of by the Sardinian Troops. Shortly after a battle took place on the Ligurian territory near Gavi, the commandant of which town sided on the contending parties. The battle lasted six hours, when a column of the Rebels took refuge under the cannon of Gavi. The skirmishing continued two days longer, without any decisive advantage on either side. The
