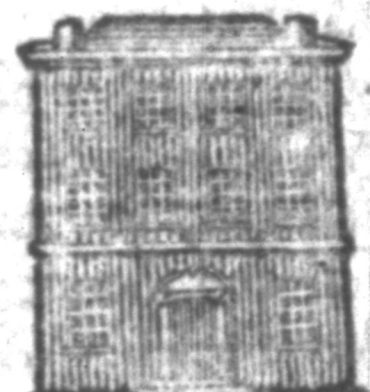

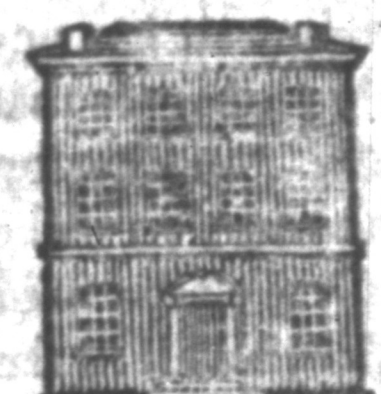

TO THE PUBLIC.

WHEREAS a certain Infamous

Character George P. Gordon, (so called) has asserted and circulated certain reports injurious to the character of the Subscriber; and whereas the said Gordon has asserted, that the Subscriber knowingly, and after being forewarned by him the said Gordon, did take WILLIAM BEACH, (previously enlisted in His Majesty's service) a Passenger in the Schooner SALLY, to Boston, in the United States of America.

And whereas the Subscriber thinks it incumbent on himself, in justice to his own character, and to shew publicly the infamy and treachery of the said George P. Gordon, (so called) states the following facts to all particularly concerned, and the Public at large, viz.—

That on or about the 12th day of November last, the said Gordon (so called) came to the Store of the Subscriber on the Market-wharf and offered a contract with the Subscriber for a passage for WILLIAM BEACH, in the schooner SALLY, then bound to Boston, and proposed his own Note of Hand for the payment of the same, alleging that said BEACH had property in Boston, but had not wherewithal to pay at the time of contracting for the same.

That the Subscriber refused to take said Gordon's Note—that he then proposed paying three dollars in hand and said BEACH to pay three more in Boston, which the Subscriber also refused, (in presence of a Byestander, who is ready to attest the truth of the above, when called for) in consequence of which refusals, said BEACH did not at that time take passage in the SALLY: And the Subscriber further faith, that from that time until he had made two voyages to Boston, he had not heard directly or indirectly, that said BEACH was enlisted in His Majesty's Service.

And the Subscriber further faith, that on or about the Fifteenth day of December last, being then again bound to Boston, said BEACH did in his own person, and publicly in the Store of the Subscriber, agree with him for his passage to Boston, and that (being informed as the Subscriber has every reason to believe, by said BEACH himself) the said George P. Gordon (so called) and within one hour after the abovementioned agreement, personally came and inquired of the Subscriber, whether BEACH had agreed for his passage, to which the Subscriber answered in the affirmative; to which said Gordon replied, "Damn him, I am glad to hear that, for I will turn him out of my house."

And the Subscriber further faith, that for ten days, or thereabouts, said BEACH daily applied to the Subscriber to know when it was probable the Schooner would sail, and that said BEACH on the day of sailing came on board publicly, and in company with other Passengers.

And the Subscriber further faith, that from the time of agreeing with said BEACH, until the time of sailing, and during the passage to Boston, he had no knowledge, information, advice, or caution whatever, either from said Gordon, BEACH, or any person or persons, of said BEACH being enlisted in His Majesty's Service, and the Subscriber verily believes, from the complexion of the business, as well as the known character of said Gordon (so called), that the secret was kept between said Gordon and BEACH, with intent to defraud His Majesty of whatever money said BEACH was to receive as a Recruit: And whereas said Gordon to justify himself, hath against all the above facts, wickedly, treacherously, and with an unprovoked design to injure the character of the Subscriber, asserted, that he cautioned the Subscriber against taking said BEACH a passenger to Boston, the Subscriber declares the said George P. Gordon to be a Liar, and otherwise an infamous character, of which the Public at large may take notice and act accordingly.
