IT is this day ordered, by His Royal Highness the
Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of
His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Ma-
jesty's Privy Council, that no ships or vessels belonging
to any of His Majesty's subjects be permitted to enter
and clear out for any of the ports within the territories
of the United States of America, until further order
And His Royal Highness is further pleased, in the
name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and
with the advice aforesaid, to order, that a general em-
bargo or stop be made of all ships and vessels whatso-
ever, belonging to the citizens of the United States of
America, now within, or which shall hereafter come
into any of the ports, harbors, or roads, within any
part of His Majesty's dominions, together with all per-
sons and effects on board all such ships and vessels;
and that the Commanders of His Majesty's ships of
war and privateers do detain and bring into port all
ships and vessels belonging to the citizens of the U.
States of America, or bearing the flag of the said U.
States, except such as may be furnished with British
licences, which vessels are allowed to proceed accord-
ing to the tenor of the said licences; but that the
utmost care be taken for the preservation of all and
every part of the cargoes on board any of the said ships
or vessels, so that no damage or embezzlement what-
ever be sustained; and the Commanders of His Majes-
ty's ships of war and privateers are hereby instructed
to detain and bring into port every such ship and vessel
accordingly, except such as above excepted; And the
Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-
jesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the
Admiralty, and Lord Warlen of the Cinque Ports, are
to give the necessary directions herein as to them may
