STATE OF ENGLAND.

It is very apparent (says the New-York Daily Advertiser) that the government of England intend to crush the conspirators by the strong arm of power. That they will succeed, we have never entertained a doubt. The moment that the men of wealth and talents in the nation become seriously alarmed for its existence, that moment they will both, to a great extent, rally in its support. It is not to be believed, that such miserable wretches as Hunt, Thistlewood, Watson, and Cobbett, can overturn that old strong fabric of monarchy, and reduce such a mass of property, talents, intelligence and power, to a state of anarchy and ruin. What can be more ridiculous and contemptible, than to see a profligate demagogue, posting about England, with the bones of an atheist, holding them up to the view of a rabble as a sign of rebellion and revolution. That the government has an arduous and difficult task on its hands, there cannot be a doubt. Much distress must ensue, harsh measures must undoubtedly be resorted to, and probably lives will be lost both in the field, and on the scaffold; but there is, in our view, as little doubt that the disturbances will be quelled, and that the ringleaders of mischief will meet the fate which so often befalls bad men, in pursuit of a vicious object.

Letters from the vicinity of Pensacola; received from an officer of the U. States army, to another in this town, mention that the Spanish Commander of that station is erecting new works near the Barrancas, with great zeal; that every man in the garrison is employed on fatigue duty, the Governor himself setting the example; but that whilst every exertion is making to put the city in the highest state of defence, the Spanish authorities behave with the utmost respect to every American who visits the place. SOUTH AMERICAN TRIUMPH.

We have been favored (says the Aurora) with the perusal of a file of the Courier of the Oronoco, which contains several articles of the greatest interest to the cause of liberty and humanity. New Grenada, the centre and citadel of the Southern section of the new world, is already free, and the people from the debouches of the Oronoco to Popayan, on the Pacific, rally under the standard of freedom, and before this Quito and Lima must recognize the republican regime.

Advices from Santa Fe, New Grenada, have just been received, down to the 20th Sept, that the H. Q's of the President had been broken up, and the army had taken the direction of the valley of Cucuta. This valley is the last position of the royalists on the north, and Quito on the South, in the whole range of Venezuela and New Granada; all the other provinces of New Grenada are already free or in complete insurrection against the royal authority.

Santa Martha, which was until this, most violently devoted to Ferdinand VII. is now the most enthusiastic in support of Independence. This change of sentiment is to be accounted for in the humanity, and generosity of Gen. Morillo, who appears to have a royal patent for converting men to Patriotism and raising the people

en masse against tyranny; and such is the spirit which already has shown itself in Santa Martha, that many European Spaniards have removed to Carthagena; a position in which they cannot very long remain, since all the Province to which it belongs is in revolt, and Carthagena is destitute of every means of subsistence.

The columns of the army of the south moved at the same time as those of the north.---It is understood that of the south is to be commanded by general Anzoategui; it will be re-inforced by the patriot forces of Popayan; and it is intended they shall march against Quito, a most important operation to accelerate the independence of the viceroyalty of Lima, and thereby complete the entire expulsion of the Spanish authority out of the whole of South America. The imagination is lost in contemplating the glorious results of the battle of Boyaco---a small and insignificant spot, but like the battle of Arbella and Pharsalia, will obtain for it an immortality in history, for having changed the destiny of a great nation.

PROCLAMATION.

By Bolivar, President of the Republic of New Granada and Venezuela.

Grenadians----From the fields of Venezuela, the cry of your afflictions penetrated my soul---and for the third time I have flown with the liberating army to save you. Victory always in front of our standards, has been faithful to us in your country, & twice has your capital seen it triumphant. On this as well as on former occasions, I came not in search of power nor of glory: my ambition has been that of liberating you from the terrible torments inflicted on you by your oppressors, and to restore you to the enjoyment of your rights, in order that you may institute a government by your own spontaneous and free election. The general Congress holding its session in Guiana, from which my authority is derived, and to which the liberating army owes obedience, is the depository of the na-
