By His Excellency Major-General GEORGE STRACEY SMYTH, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

A PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Wednesday the fifth of this instant June: I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby further prorogued to the first Wednesday in September next ensuing.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, and in the third year of His Majesty's Reign By His Excellency's Command. WM. F. GDELL.

SECRETARY'S OFFICE, Fredericton, 19th June, 1822.

HIS Majesty having directed returns to be forthwith made of the general Establishment of the Government of this Province, arranged according to Departments, and including every Individual employed therein, with all the particulars specified in the annexed Schedule, and also a return under similar heads of those public officers who may not be attached to any particular department: all Persons concerned are hereby required in obedience to His Majesty's commands, to forward immediately to this office their respective reports, agreeably to the form prescribed.

Return to express in separate columns the following particulars.

Name, and designation of Office.

Office.

Date of appointment.

By whom appointed and under what Instrument.

Whether Office executed by Principal or by Deputy, if by Deputy his name.

Amount salary in sterling and Currency, with rate of Exchange.

Fees on an average of the last three years.

Net amount received by Principal and by Deputy.

Whether Principal or Deputy be allowed a House for personal residence, or other allowance, if any, in House rent or Quarters.

Whether Office be held by Principal in conjunction with any and what other civil military or Naval office, or appointment or place of Profit, in any Colony or on the establishment of the United Kingdom.

Periods during which the officer has been absent on leave from the Colony.

Whether the Principal or his Deputy enjoy any and what other advantage or profit, not required to be stated in the preceding columns.

Remarks in explanation of the duties of the office and of such subjects as require elucidation.

The following Letter from the Right Honourable Earl Bathurst, to the Lieutenant Governor, dated Downing-street, 24th January 1822, is published by order of His Excellency.

SIR,

The following Acts, twenty-one in number, passed by the Legislature of the Province of New-Brunswick, in the month of March last, have been submitted to the consideration of the Privy Council, and do not appear to have any objection.

An Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, to levy a further assessment on the Inhabitants of the said City, for the purpose of building and finishing a Poor House in the said City.

An Act for the better extinguishing Fires

which may happen in the Towns of Fredericton and Saint Andrews.

An Act to authorize the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace of the County of Charlotte, to levy an assessment to enable them to pay off the County debt.

An Act to provide for the services of the Speaker of the House of Assembly, and for defraying the expenses and traveling charges of the Members of the said House attending in General Assembly.

An Act to make more effectual regulations relating to Pilots within this Province.

An Act for the erection of a Court House and Gaol in the County of Westmorland.

An Act to extend the provisions of an Act intitled "An Act to regulate the Herring Fisheries in the Parishes of West Isles, Campo Belle, Pennfield, and Saint George, in the County of Charlotte," to the Parish of Grand Manan.

An Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace in the County of Northumberland, in their General Sessions, to levy an assessment on the said County, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the repairs of the Gaol and Court House, and for payment of the County debt.

An Act in addition to and amendment of an Act, intitled "An Act to provide for sick and disabled Seamen, not being Paupers belonging to the Province."

An Act for altering the times of holding the Court of General Sessions of the Peace and Inferior Courts of Common Pleas in the County of Northumberland, and for enlarging the times of the sitting of the said Courts.

An Act in addition to the several Acts now in force for regulating the inspection of fish for home consumption.

An Act to repeal an Act intitled "An Act for the further increase of the Revenue of this Province," and "An Act in addition to an Act, intitled an Act for the further increase of the Revenue of this Province."

An Act to amend the Laws now in force relating to Trespasses, and to make further regulations to prevent the same.

An Act for the establishment of public roads of all roads in this Province, for which any public monies may have been or shall be hereafter granted.

An Act to authorize the Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestry of Saint Andrews Church in the Parish of Saint Andrews, to convey a certain piece of Glebe Land of the said Parish, and to dispose of the monies arising from the sale thereof, in the purchase of other lands.

An Act to revive and extend some of the provisions of an Act, intitled "An Act to provide for the necessities of the Province, occasioned by the failure of the late crop."

An Act in addition to the Acts now in force for raising a Revenue in this Province, and to continue the same.

An Act to amend an Act, intitled "An Act to enable the Province Treasurer to borrow the sum of nine thousand pounds, for paying off bounties and other debts payable by the Laws of the Province."

An Act authorizing the allowance of a drawback of part of the duties on certain articles imported into this Province, when such articles are exported.

An Act to erect the upper part of the County of York, into a Town or Parish.

An Act to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue, for the services therein mentioned.

With respect to the Act Cap. 23, intitled "An Act to increase the Revenue of this Province, by imposing a duty on certain merchandise." I am to acquaint you that the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for trade, &c. consider the same very objectionable; but as this Act will very soon expire, I have not deemed it necessary to recommend its disallowance to His Majesty: I am however to request you will withhold your assent to such an Act in future.

This comprises all the Laws passed at the Session of 1821, except Cap. 3, for the preservation of the red and fallow Deer—Cap. 20, to alter the Act for incorporating the Bank of New-Brunswick, and Cap. 23, above mentioned.

THE CHURCHMAN'S PROFESSION OF HIS FAITH AND PRACTICE. (Continued from the Gazette of the 18th May.)

As a Churchman, I hold that fundamental doctrine of the Gospel, the Trinity of Persons in the Godhead—Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

Concerning the Divinity of the Father, there is no dispute.

The divine titles given to the Son in Holy Scripture are as follows:—He is called "the Word that was in the beginning with GOD, and was GOD;" that "was made flesh," and whose "glory was the glory of the only begotten of the Father." (John i. 14.) When it is said, "A virgin shall conceive and bear a son," it is said, also, "they shall call his name Immanuel, that is, GOD WITH US." (Matt. i. 23.) He is the Lord, before whose face John the Baptist was sent; (Luke i. 76.) the LORD GOD foretold by Isaiah, who was to "feed his flock like a Shepherd." (Isa. xl. 10, 11.) Of Jesus Christ it is affirmed by St. John, "THIS IS THE TRUE GOD, and eternal life." (1 John v. 20.) St. Paul mentions "the appearance of the GREAT GOD and our Saviour," or, "our GREAT GOD and Saviour Jesus Christ." (Tit. xi. 13. 1 Pet. i. 7.) for it is he who shall appear to judge the world; Isaiah styles him, "Wonderful, Counsellor, the MIGHTY GOD;" (Isa. ix. 6.) St. Paul again, "GOD over all, blessed for evermore." (Rom. ix. 5.) In the Old Testament, Christ is frequently called JEHOVAH, (Jer. xxiii. 6. Zech. xii. 10, cited John xix. 34. Rev. i. 7. Isa. xl. 10.) a name which can belong to no one but God. In the Revelation he is introduced as saying of himself, "I am Alpha and Omega, the Beginning and Ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty." (Rev. i. 11.—"I cannot forbear recording it," says Dr. Dod-
