

be made, in British vessels when coming directly from one of the enumerated ports, under pain of forfeiture of ship and cargo.

Sec. 5.—Permits the exportation directly to the above ports from the United States of any articles produced or legally imported into the same, in vessels of the United S. or British vessels, having come directly from any of the above colonial ports, and requires that, when such exportations are made in British vessels, bonds in half the value of the cargo shall be required by the collector from the owner or consignee of such British vessel, conditional for the landing of said cargo in one of the above enumerated ports, a certificate whereof is to be produced within 12 months; and no exportation shall be made to the said ports in British vessels, except such as shall have come direct and shall return direct to one of the above colonial ports.

Sec. 6.—Provides that this law shall continue in force as long as the British act of Parliament; but if at any time intercourse with any or all the colonial ports above enumerated shall be closed by a British Order in Council, then the provisions of the acts of 1818 and 1820, suspended in the first section of this act, shall revive and be in full force.

Sec. 7.—Provides that if any other British colonial port shall hereafter be opened to the United States, the provisions of this act, shall apply to it as well as those ports herein enumerated.

Sec. 8.—Provides that the force of the bond shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury, &c.

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

18TH FEBRUARY, 1823.

European dates have been received to the 9th of December.

It is stated that the Cortes anticipating the decision of the Congress, had resolved to oppose any attempt against their independence.

It is also stated that Gen. Mina had defeated the troops of the army of the Faith, and driven them to the borders of the Kingdom, where it was reported that they had laid down their arms.

A tremendous hurricane was experienced at Lisbon and surrounding country, on the 5th and 6th ultimo, in which many vessels were lost, &c. and great damage done to buildings.

An answer to despatches sent off to Spain on the 2d Dec. was expected at Paris about the 13th or 15th. The following are said to be the propositions of France to the Government of Spain:

1. The restoration of the King to his personal freedom without delay: for it is now distinctly understood, that he is in a state of confinement in his Palace of the Retiro.

2. The restoration of the King to his sovereign rights.

3. Such a change in the Constitution of Spain, as shall give to the Nobles a greater share of the power they possessed under the old regime.

4. The exclusion of the present Ministers from office, or, at least, most of the Heads of the different departments.

5. An amnesty for all persons, of whatever rank, engaged in the cause of the Regency.

6. A more strict regulation of the laws relating to the Press.

7. The possession of certain strong places on the frontier of France, as a guarantee for the performance of any undertaking into which the Spanish Govt. may enter.

Under date of Dec. 7, it is stated, that Com. Owen had proceeded to Deal to take command of the squadron fitting out there, destined, it is reported, to take possession of Cuba, when it is said, has been ceded by Spain to Great Britain, as the price of its neutrality in the impending conflict.

PARIS, DEC. 6.

The following has appeared in the *Regulatore*, a Lisbon paper:—

“Mr. Canning has submitted the following Note to the Portuguese Charge d’Affairs in London:—

“The undersigned is commanded to notify to M. —, that from all the intelligence that has reached the British Govt. there is nothing to authorise the Idea entertained by his most Faithful Majesty and his Ministers, of an invasion of the Peninsula.

“The undersigned feels no hesitation in

assuring His Most Faithful Majesty, that His Britannic Majesty will never regard with indifference any attempt tending to affect the independence of Portugal; and that His Majesty will be always ready to extend to Portugal the protection she is entitled to expect from so ancient an ally.
