LONDON, Nov. 13.

The private business of the approaching
session, it is already calculated, by the bills for
Companies, &c. that are preparing, or have
had notice of them given, will exceed, in
number and importance, any preceding years.
It is expected that there will be upwards of
two hundred private bills before the Parlia-
ment, for Joint Stock Companies, Loan
Companies, Oil Gas Companies, Clean
Washing and pure Water Companies, and
the various Road, Engine, and Turnpike
Measures.

It appears by the Gazette of Tuesday, that
Lord Granville is at length formally appoint-
ed his Majesty's Ambassador at the Court
of France. The Gazette also announces
that Sir Charles Bagot, now our Ambassa-
dor at the Court of St. Petersburg, succeeds
Lord Granville at the Hague: and Sir
Charles himself will probably be succeeded
by the Right Hon. Strafford Canning.

On Monday a consultation was held at
the Colonial Office, between Mr. Horton,
and the Crown Lawyers on the one part,
and Mr. Gaul, and the Canada Company's
Council on the other, concerning the grant-
ing of the Charter to the Company, when
it was agreed that it should be completed
forthwith, and it is now probable that the
Commissioners will sail for America about
the beginning of January.

A gentleman who came passenger in the
Tiger, delivered dispatches on Wednesday
morning at the Foreign Office from the Brit-
ish Commissioner at Mexico.

Dispatches dated the 1st September, have
been received at the Colonial Office, from
Sierra Leone. The Colony, we are happy
to say, continued in a healthy state.

The intended Spanish expedition to South

America, according to the Ettoile, cannot
sail these six weeks. The Union Regiment
is mentioned as one of those which are des-
tined for that Service.

THE NORTHERN EXPEDITION.

Captain Lyon of his Majesty's ship Gri-
per, arrived unexpectedly at the Admiralty
on Thursday morning. His return has
been partly occasioned by his having been
unable to get into Repulse Bay, though he
got off the entrance of Wager River. The
Griper had experienced the most extraordi-
nary continuance of bad weather ever remem-
bered by any seaman on board. They had
but five fine days during the whole voyage,
and one of the five was Monday last. They
have lost all their anchors, and their boats
were all stove in. We are happy to learn,
however, that no lives have been lost.

Captain Lyon reports, that the whale fish-
ery, from the badness of the weather, has been
very unproductive. The whalers he spoke
of had been all unsuccessful.

We (Country) subjoin a letter from our
Correspondent at Portsmouth, Nov. 10.

"This afternoon came into harbour, without
our anchoring at Spithead, his Majesty's ship
Griper, Captain Lyon, from the Northern
Expedition, last from the Southampton
Islands, in six weeks. This ship is in great
distress, and appears to have suffered dread-
fully. She had reached so within six hours
of Repulse Bay, when a most tremendous
gale came on, which continued for
several days with unabated fury; and after
the crew had suffered in a dreadful manner,
Captain Lyon was obliged to bear up for
England, to refit the ship, having lost all
her anchors and cables among the ice, besides
having been on shore, and sustained damage
in her bottom."

They heard of Capt. Parry, who was at
a great distance from them, but never saw
him.

"The Griper was to have wintered in
Repulse Bay and to have dispatched, in the
ensuing summer, an overland expedition, to
endeavour to meet Capt. Parry."

LONDON, Saturday Evening.

We have received a file of Calcutta Gov-
ernment Gazettes to the 8th of June.
Official reports had been received from Gra-
ham of the 22d of May, from which it ap-
peared that the Burmese, who had taken up
a stockade position at Haubur, on the South
bank of the Kullung evacuated it on the ad-
vance of Lieut. Col. Richards, and retired
to the Rungle Gur, where they had a strong
stockade, about eight hours march from Kal-
liabur. "On Lieut. Col. Richards proceed-
ing with a small guard, to examine, and give
orders for the destruction of the stockade at
Haubur he was informed, on his arrival
there by a villager, that about sixty of the
enemy had returned to it. He, in conse-
quence, immediately returned to Captain
Horsburgh's camp, and ordered Lt. Rich-
ardson to repair, with the Russala of cavalry,
and a company of Infantry, to endeavour to
surprise them. In this he succeeded. The
enemy had only time to fire a few shots from
the stockade, which did not take effect, and
ran off to the rear, right upon the cavalry,
who had been previously detached to inter-
cept them, and who killed twenty of them,
and a Phokun (Commandant) all real Bur-
mese. The name of the Phokun killed, is
supposed to be Tamee; and he is reported to
have been the second in command to Boogly
Phokun, and to have had the chief manage-
ment of the enemy's camp."

The private letters say, that the resistance
of the Burmese on the Assam side of Ava
was becoming more obstinate, and would prob-
ably protract the war. All fears of any
attempt on Calcutta from the Chittagong side
had subsided, and it was believed the Bur-
mese had fallen back from Ramao to their
own territory.
