A PROCLAMATION.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in me
by an Act of Parliament passed in the
Sixth Year of the Reign of His present
Majesty, intituled, "An Act to regulate the
Trade of the British possessions abroad,"
I have thought fit, by and with the advice
and consent of His Majesty's Council, to
appoint, and I do hereby, by and with the
advice aforesaid, appoint the Parish of Saint
Stephen in the County of Charlotte, a place
of Entry for the entry of Goods brought or
imported from any adjoining Foreign Coun-
try, pursuant to the provisions of the said
Act—of which all persons concerned will
take due notice and govern themselves ac-
cordingly.

A PROCLAMATION.

IN Pursuance of the Powers vested in me
by an Act of Parliament passed in the
Sixth Year of the Reign of His present
Majesty intituled "An Act to regulate the
Trade of the British Possessions abroad,"
I have thought fit, by and with the advice
and consent of His Majesty's Council, to appoint
and I do hereby, by and with the advice
and consent aforesaid, appoint the Town of Fre-
dericton and the Parish of Woodstock in the
County of York, as Places of Entry for the
entry of Goods brought or imported from any
adjoining Foreign Country pursuant to
the Provisions of the said Act—Of which
all Persons concerned will take due notice
and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS by an ordinance esta-
blishing fees to be taken in the
Province of New-Brunswick, made and
passed by His Excellency THOMAS
CARLETON, Esquire, Governor of this
Province, in Council, the second day of

March one thousand seven hundred and
eighty-five, there are allowed and established
among other fees the following, that is to
say:

For Attornies in the Supreme Court,
Travelling charges per day 10s.

For Counsel in the Supreme Court, tra-
velling charges the same as Attornies, and
no more than one Counsel to be allowed
in taxing Costs.

And whereas in the present circumstan-
ces of the Country, it is expedient and pro-
per that the said fees for travelling charges
to Attornies and Counsel in the Supreme
Court should be abolished, I do therefore,
by and with the advice and consent of His
Majesty's Council, ordain and declare that
the said fees for travelling charges herein
before specified, be and the same are hereby
abolished.

And I do further by and with the advice
and consent aforesaid; ordain and declare
that henceforth any Judge of the Supreme
Court before whom a cause shall be tried or
after being entered for trial, shall by rule of
Court be referred to arbitration, may allow
to be taxed in the Bill of Costs in such cause,
a Counsel fee at his discretion, in no case
to exceed five Guineas.

Extract from the Minutes.

Several cases of Desertion from His Majesty's For-
ces, having recently happened here—we have
deemed it advisable to publish the following Let-
ter addressed to the Magistrates of the several
Counties in this Province; and we doubt not
that the exertions of His Majesty's loyal and
faithful Inhabitants, in their respective stations,
will be used to put a stop to so serious an evil.

Fredericton, 3d June, 1826

GENTLEMEN

SEVERAL cases of Desertion from
His Majesty's Forces, having recently
happened here, and the delinquents, except-
ing in one instance, having escaped; His
Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor has
thought proper to call the attention of the
Magistrates of the several Counties, to this
serious, and, as it is to be feared, growing evil.

Soldiers are never permitted to travel in any
part of the Province without a Pass, so signed
and authenticated as not to be mistaken,
and, although Deserters will always assume
a disguise, yet a little vigilant attention
will easily discover them; and beside the
pecuniary reward given for their apprehen-
sion, there are powerful motives which should
operate upon the mind of every faithful
subject, and prompt him to lend his aid to
detect and prevent these offences. His
Excellency therefore relying upon the zeal
of the Magistrates, requests that they will,
in their several districts, not only use their
own best exertions, but also make known
the subject of this Letter, and call upon the
Inhabitants at large, who from their well
known Loyalty, will, His Excellency is
convinced, need no further stimulus to ex-
cite them in their respective stations, to use
their best endeavours in the discharge of so
important a duty, which they owe to their
King and Country.
