One drachm of Gulsicum powdered.

Two ounces of Sulphur, in flour.

Half an ounce of Ginger grated fine.

One ounce of Cream of Tartar.

A quarter of an ounce of Rhubarb powdered.

One Nutmeg grated.

Mix all these ingredients well together, and take two tea spoons full going into bed, and the same quantity every morning an hour before rising, in a small tumbler of warm water.

The dose to be varied according to the constitution of the patient, and if found too purgative, to be omitted in the morning, as it produces a slight degree of perspiration. This may be depended on.

TREASURY CHAMBERS,

2d AUGUST, 1826.

GENTLEMEN.—I am commanded by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to refer you to the 4th sec. of the Act 6th Geo. IV. ch. 14, which provides that the privilege of trading in Foreign ships with the British Colonies "shall be limited to the ships of those countries which shall place the commerce and navigation of this country and of its Possessions abroad upon the footing of the most favored nations; unless His Majesty shall, by His Order in Council, in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of any foreign Country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not in all respects be fulfilled by such Foreign Country."

And it having been represented to my Lords, by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, that nothing had been done by the American Government for bringing the Commerce of the United States within the terms of that Act—I am commanded by their Lordships to assure you will give directions that the Ports of all our West-India Possessions, and of the Island of Newfoundland, may be closed against the Shipping of the United States, from and after the 1st December next.

Suddenly in St. Mary's, on Sunday evening last, in the 75th year of his age, Capt. J. STERLING, of the late Maryland Loyalists.

In the Village of Jollicure, Westmorland, N. B. on Saturday night the 9th instant, Mr. CHARLES OULTON, and ABIGAIL, his wife. Mr OULTON was nearly 82 years of age, and his wife was in her 77th year. This aged pair had been married nearly sixty years, and what is remarkable, they died within a few hours of each other without pain, perfectly sensible and quite resigned to the call of Heaven, and were buried on Monday the 11th instant in one grave; so that it may be said with truth, "They were loving and affectionate in their lives, and in their death they were not divided." Mr. OULTON was amongst the first English settlers in that part of the Country, where by his industry he acquired, as a farmer, a considerable personal property, and by his integrity and good moral conduct, a fair and lasting character. This aged and respectable couple have left a numerous family of children, grand children, and great grand children, and their sons are amongst the number of the most industrious, independent, and respectable farmers in that County.

At Halifax, on Saturday last, (universally beloved and regretted) in the 63d year of his age, the Rev. ARCHIBALD GRAY, D. D. Minister of the Established Church of Scotland, and for thirty years Pastor of St. Matthew's Church, in that town.

ON FRIDAY, 6TH OCTOBER,

Will be given a Purse of £20, for any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, of any age, to carry Weight for Age, according to the Scale above mentioned. The best of Heats and each Heat twice round the Course.

ON SATURDAY, 7TH OCTOBER,

The Horses which shall have been beaten in running for the Purse of the first, and also of the second day, to be handicapped to run for the entrance money, to which will be added as much from the fund as will make it a Purse of £10. One Heat once round the Course. Stallions in all cases to carry 3lbs extra weight.
