Halifax, September 13.

The Bark Relief, from St. John N. B.
with lumber, to Belfast, was abandoned on
the 18th July, in lat. 45. 48. long. 52.
58. On the 16th she sprung a leak, and
on the day of her abandonment became wa-
terlogged. The crew and passengers (4 of
whom were women and 3 children) took to
the boats, and reached Trepassy, N. F. on
the next morning.

The report of a piracy and murder, com-
mitted under most atrocious circumstances,
has been received this week, from Sydney,
C. B. On the morning of Monday, the
28th ult. about 4 o'clock, during the mate's
watch, two of the crew, (Charles Merchand,
an Englishman, and Winslow Curtis an
American) of the schr. Fame, Capt. Ed-
wards, bound from Boston, to Gottenburgh,
and at the time a little to the southward of
the Isle of Sable, attacked the mate, (Thos.
P. Jenkins) who was asleep upon the hen-
coup, split his head open with an axe, and
threw him overboard. Merchand then re-
quested Curtis to go below into the Cabin,
and dispatch the Captain; but on going
down there the Capt. was asleep, and his re-
solution failed him. On returning to the
deck and expressing his fears, Merchand
called him a coward—and Curtis was in-
duced to attempt the deed a second time; but
not being able to do it effectually, Merchand
jumped down himself, murdered Capt. Ed-
wards in his birth, and afterwards threw the
body, along with the bloody cloths &c. into
the sea. The other two of the crew (a sail-
or and the cook) were saved, by giving a
promise of secrecy. They, after cutting
away the anchor, cables, &c. steered towards
the land. When a league or two distant,
they scuttled the vessel, and betook them-
selves to the boat. They landed at Louis-
burgh on the 30th and endeavoured to con-
ceal their crime by a number of falsehoods;
but the cook availing himself of a favourable
opportunity, informed upon the Murderers,
who were afterwards secured, and laid in Syd-
ney jail, where they are now lying.

The Acadian Recorder states, that the
inhabitants of Grand Manan have unani-

mously resolved to procure by subscription
among themselves a Gold Medal, to be pre-
sented to their Rectory, the Rev. Cornelius
Griffin, as a mark of their esteem for his
exertions and character, and as a testimonial
of their regret for the loss they have sustain-
ed, by his absence from the Island.
