ENGLAND &c.

It is now placed beyond any doubt that
all the great interests of the country are in a
steady course of improvement, with every
appearance of its continuing. The accounts
from the manufacturing districts are really
cheering; and the agriculturalists, contrary
to their own expectations, have not been in
a more thriving situation for a long time
than they are at present. The accounts from
the outports are fully as gratifying; and
the shipping interests are recovering from
their late depression. In the port of Lon-
don, the arrivals this year exhibit an increase
of 414 vessels, English and Foreign, as
compared to the number that was entered last
year up to the same period. There has been
of course a corresponding augmentation of
duties paid into the Custom House, and we
understand that the improvement in this
branch of the Revenue, for the last three
weeks in particular, has been very conside-
rable. — *Bell's Weekly Messenger*, 3d June.

MUTINY.—The Pacific, of this port,
James Brown, Commander, which left Cork
about three weeks since with passengers for
Quebec, put into Labaseeda Bay on Sun-
day evening. The cause of her return was
owing to a general mutiny having broken
out among the passengers off the coast of
Spain, it being their intention to rob Mr.
John Moore, of this City, who was supercar-
go, as they believed he was in possession of a
large sum of money, amounting to five
thousand sovereigns, and then to run the
vessel on the coast of France. So inten-

were they to prosecute their design, that
they would not allow the top masts or
spars that were carried away, to be replaced,
and actually lowered Mr. Moore over the
side of the vessel, for the purpose of forcing
him to give the money. He would have
perished by their hands, but for the inter-
position of the Mate of the vessel, who at the
risk of bringing their vengeance on himself,
persuaded them from their purpose. They
were about murdering him for having inter-
fered. Great barbarity was used towards
the crew; the mutineers deprived them of
their provisions, and at the same time com-
pelled them to work the vessel, and steer
her as they imagined, into France. The
mate assured the mutineers that they were
making for France, while he was actually
bringing them into the Shannon. Some of
the mutineers are in custody, and an investi-
gation is about being made into the particu-
lars of this extraordinary transaction. Mr.
Moore is confined to his bed, being seri-
ously ill from the severe treatment he receiv-
ed. — *Limerick Evening Post*.

GREECE.

Lord Cochrane had written the following
letter to the Greek Government, dated Port
Piræus, April 25.

"A battle has been fought to day—it
was commenced by the marines, who were
landed on the several points of the coast of
the Peninsula (Munichya) and drove them
(the enemy) who were posted there.
The land troops not willing to be surpassed
in courage by the marines, also rushed on
the enemy.

While the Hydriots and Speziots were
making themselves masters of the enemy's
positions in this peninsula, the troops advan-
ced on the other side of the Piræus, whence
at this unexpected attack of the heroic cou-
rage of the Greeks, the Turks fled like a
flock thrown into confusion.

From this day begins a new era in the
military system of modern Greece. If
every one behaves to-morrow, as all, without
exception, have behaved to-day, the siege of
the Acropolis will be raised, and the liberty
of Greece insured. My wishes and my
desires are, that the Greeks may obtain li-
berty for a period longer than that in which
they have endured slavery, and that their
glory may equal that of their ancestors."

COCHRANE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 11.—The
apprehensions for the result of the negotia-
tions of the European Ambassadors increase.
On the 3d May Muzear arrived here from
Vienna, and is said to have brought a de-
claration to the Reis Effendi, in which the
Austrian Cabinet uses every argument to
induce the Divan to accede to the proposals
of Russia and England, but the sentiments
of the Divan seemed to be unchanged. The
capital however, enjoys perfect tranquillity,
which was not interrupted even during the
festival of the Bairam, during which, several
proclamations and nominations took place.
The most remarkable is that of Chosrew
Mehemed Pacha to the command of the
troops in the capital; the Searaskier, Hus-
sein Pacha, being appointed in his place, to
command the forts in the Bosphorus. The
Sultan has left his winter residence since
the Bairam, and gone to his summer palace.
The fleet under the Captain Pacha, consist-
ing of 21 large, and 34 smaller ships, left the
Dardanelles on the 1st of May, and is said
to have joined part of the Egyptian fleet.
The accounts from the Theatre of War,
are not quite so favorable.

The Acropolis, indeed, is not delivered,
but the garrison is said to have been chang-
ed; the fortresses supplied with provisions
and ammunition, and Fabvier, himself, to
have arrived in the Piræus.
