

But though it would be unwise and...
 vasily premature to force manufacturing es-
 tablishments, and exclusive pursuits of ma-
 nufacturing industry, into existence, yet
 there is a mixt species of industry, which it
 might now be wise to encourage, by com-
 mendatory notice, and even prudent to re-
 commend, by premium, as in itself advantage-
 ous, by augmenting the production of very neces-
 sary articles which it might be made to yield,
 and which would besides have a direct and
 immediate tendency to promote industrious
 habits, economy and morality amongst the
 People.

In the same manner that Agriculture
 acts upon manufactures in the State economy
 of a Country in an advanced condition, by
 the labors of that portion of the People
 who are not required for the cultivation of
 the soil; so in the domestic economy of our
 people in their present state, may their Ag-
 ricultural condition be made to operate upon
 very important species of manufactures, by
 encouraging and rewarding useful ap-
 plications of many portions of time, which
 in this Country large families cannot other-
 wise usefully fill in the winter season. The
 great difficulty with which Agriculture has
 here to contend, is the length of that season
 in which the productions of a short, though
 genial summer, must be consumed, by the
 producers whilst employed in avocations
 not Agricultural. So that whatever
 may be the gross produce of the soil,
 the net produce can never be very great.
 This difficulty cannot in the gross be avoided,
 but it may be alleviated, by habits of fruga-
 lity and economy, and particularly by the
 industrious occupations of the family circles.
 It is highly important, therefore, to incul-
 cate every where on the People, how much
 this disadvantage may be compensated, by
 frugally and industriously employing the win-
 ter portions of time, in producing for their
 own use, and for sale, those articles of cloth-
 ing which they must otherwise purchase; but
 which, if fabricated by them, is, in fact, re-
 producing the value of that portion of their
 food which they consume in that time;
 but which would otherwise be unproductively
 consumed, as is too much the case in the
 long winters of this Country.

The articles of domestic manufactures
 which ought to be encouraged by some such
 means as I suggest, should not be such as
 may be imported from the Mother Country
 in exchange for other productions of indus-
 try, but such only as are purchased from
 and are the domestic production of other
 Countries, and for which money only is
 taken in return.

To encourage such species of manufac-
 tures as these, is subject to no disadvantage
 or objection: it is to encourage domestic in-
 dustry and frugality; to discourage practices
 which take people off from habits of domestic
 economy and morality; and it appears to
 me that the Societies will do well to en-
 courage by their own funds, and inculcate
 by their addresses, the attention of the people
 to these important objects. I feel safe, and
 well certified, then, in recommending these
 measures to your serious consideration; and
 with the advantage of meeting here, from all
 parts of the country, Persons who have
 carried the benefits of these Institutions into
 every part of the Province, I thus engage your
 power, influence and example, Gentlemen,
 in doing your endeavours to improve the do-
 mestic habits of the people, wherever those en-
 deavours may appear to be wanting.

The ordinary business of the Institution
 I need not further touch upon. I have only
 to repeat my thanks, and to reiterate the
 commendations of the Country, for the ser-
 vices which the Agricultural and Emigrant
 Societies are rendering.

His Excellency then withdrew, and it
 was on motion of Mr. Parker, resolved

unanimously, that the best thanks of this So-
 ciety be presented to His Excellency, for
 his honoring the Meeting with his presence;
 for the sentiments which he has been pleased
 to express; and for the warm desire which
 His Excellency has shown, on this, and all
 other occasions, to improve the rural econo-
 my of the Province, and to extend as widely
 as possible, the benefits of this and every
 other institution, which may promote the best
 interests of its Inhabitants.

The Meeting then adjourned to Wednes-
 day the fifth day of March next.
