FIRST SESSION of the NEW PARLIAMENT, and THE KING'S SPEECH. London, Nov. 26. From the JOHN BULL.

His Majesty's intention of opening the Parliament in person having been made publicly known on Tuesday morning, the whole line of the streets from St James's to the Parliament House (Pall Mall, Cockspur Street, Charing Cross, Parliament Street, and Palace Yard) were crowded with anxious spectators, and vehicles of all descriptions were ranged on both sides of the way. So great a crowd had not been assembled since the Coronation, nor was more loyal ardour ever manifested than by the elegant persons of both sexes, who filled all the windows and the tops of the houses along the whole line of the procession, as well as by the countless multitudes who crowded to excess every street and avenue leading to the House of

Lords. The road was strewed with gravel, and a detachment of the 2d Regiment of Royal Life Guards paraded the streets. Shortly after twelve o'clock, His Majesty's Crown of State was conveyed to the House of Lords, in one of the King's private carriages. At half past one o'clock the Royal procession moved in the following order:—

Three of His Majesty's private carriages, drawn by six bay horses, each containing his Majesty's officers and attendants. A private carriage, drawn by six black horses, containing the Duke of Wellington, Earl Mountcharles, and the Master of the Horse.

Twelve of the King's servants dressed in their State Liveries. Twelve Yeomen of the Guard. An Escort of the 2d Regiment of Life Guards. His MAJESTY, in the Royal State Carriage, drawn by eight Cream-coloured Horses, most superbly caparisoned. A detachment of Life Guards closed the Procession.

His MAJESTY looked extremely well, and was hailed with the most rapturous applause. When the State Carriage had stopped, and His MAJESTY alighted, the bursts of applause were tremendous, accompanied by the firing of guns, &c.

His Majesty was received at the portico by the Great Officers of State and others, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner, wearing a cap of estate adorned with Jewels: the sword of State being borne by the Earl of Liverpool K. G.

At an early hour the great door leading from Westminster Hall was beset by an impatient crowd struggling for admission, but all persons were strictly excluded who were not supplied with cards from the Lord Chamberlain's Office. At half past twelve o'clock the doors were thrown open, and the interior presented a most brilliant and animated appearance. The different benches were occupied by the wives and daughters of the nobility and leading gentry, all dressed in the richest and most elegant style.

At one o'clock the LORD CHANCELLOR took his seat on the Woolsack, the benches immediately below which were occupied by the Judges.

Prayers were read by the junior prelate, the Bishop of LLANDAFF.

Shortly after several peers entered the House in their full robes. The Royal Dukes of CLARENCE and GLOUCESTER, the Duke of BUCKINGHAM, the Duke of SOMERSET, the Marquis of WINCHESTER, the Marquis of ANGLESEA, LORD GWYDYR, and Lord TEYNHAM took the oaths. Amongst those who, by courtesy, were admitted to the body of the House, we noticed the Prince ESTERHAZY, Prince POLIGNAC, Prince LIEVEN, and others of the Foreign Ambassadors. The benches on which the Peers usually take their seats, were filled with Peeresses and other ladies of distinction connected with the Court. The railing which usually surrounds the Chair had been removed, and the Chair brought forward several feet. The scene now was particularly imposing and every eye was turned towards the door through which His Majesty was to enter.

At eight minutes before two o'clock a discharge of artillery announced the arrival of His MAJESTY in his Robing-room. At two precisely His MAJESTY presented himself, being robed, and wearing the imperial Crown; and was conducted to the
