CIVIL APPOINTMENTS.

Peter McCullam, Esq., to solemnize Marriage in the County of Charlotte. John Smith, Esq., in the County of Westmoreland.

As by a Resolution of the House of Assembly of the 9th March last (which is declared to be a standing Rule of the House) no Bills of a Private or Local nature, can, "except in very particular cases" be received by the House unless such Bill shall have been previously read at some general Sessions of the Peace in the County interested in such Bill, and a Certificate endorsed thereon by the Clerk of the Peace that the same was read in open Court; and as the existence of

this order may not be known in some of the Counties in the Province, we have been authorized to republish the same, which is as follows:—

"Whereas much of the time of the House is unnecessarily taken up in discussions on Bills of a private or local nature, introduced sometimes without any Petitions from the Counties and Persons which they are intended to affect; and frequently containing such provisions as are not justified by the Petitions: Therefore Resolved, that in future it be a standing Rule of this House, not to be departed from, except in very particular cases; that no Bill of a private or local nature shall be received by the House, unless such Bill has been previously read at some General Sessions of the Peace for the County interested in such Bill; and a Certificate be endorsed thereon by the Clerk of the Peace, that the same was so read in open Court."

The following is a copy of a Letter received by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, per last Packet, from Lord Goderich, in Answer to the Addresses from the Inhabitants of this County and the City of St. John, on the Death of His Royal Highness the Duke of York and Albany, which were transmitted by His Excellency to be laid before His Majesty.

"DOWNING STREET, 4th June, 1827. SIR.

I have received and laid before His Majesty, your despatch of the 12th of April last, transmitting addresses from the Inhabitants of the County of York, and from the Mayor Alderman and Commonality of the City of St. John on the death of His Royal Highness the Duke of York and Albany, and I have now to acquaint you that His Majesty was pleased to receive the same very graciously.

I have &c. &c. (Signed) GODERICH. Major General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Batt., &c. &c. &c."

We understand that in consequence of the urgent representations made by the Governors of this and the neighbouring Provinces to the Government at home, of the necessity of avoiding the present circuitous route of the Packets; it is now in contemplation to forward the English Mails direct from Falmouth to Halifax as formerly.

In to-day's Gazette will be found an Ordinance by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, altering the usual times of holding the Hilary and Easter Terms of the Supreme Court.

The intelligence received by the Packet is but one day later than that furnished in our last. We have only found room, however, to insert an extract from Mr. Canning's Speech on the subject of Emigration, which corroborates the previous reports of the improved state of trade in the Mother Country.

The Imperial Parliament was to be prorogued on the 20th July.

The Queen of Wurtemberg arrived in England in the Royal Sovereign Yacht on the 5th June last.

We have copied a very interesting and well written Letter signed "Seavola" from the Novascotian in this days Paper; and we think that Letter deserving of our Readers particular attention. It is one of a series now publishing in the Novascotian on the present state of the British Colonies.

We observe the meeting of the General Assembly of Novascotia is further prorogued to the 4th of October next.

The trials at Newcastle of the seven persons charged with murder, terminated on Friday last, we were not present at either of them, and are therefore unprepared to lay any of the evidence before the public. Kinney and his wife, who stood indicted for the murder of the Pedlar at Point Escuminac, were acquitted from the insufficiency of the proof, but we are told with strong presumptions of their guilt. Mr. Jack was also acquitted of the murder at Cocagne. The most interesting trial was doubtless that of the three men for the murder of Mansworth at Newcastle, the popular opinion was, that one at least would suffer, but they were only convicted of Manslaughter and Sentenced to receive Six Months Imprisonment; the result of this trial continues to be the general topic of conversation, but whatever grounds there may be for animadversion, it is certainly more prudent to refrain from than to indulge in it.

The woman who was indicted for the concealment of the birth of an illegitimate child was sentenced to three months imprisonment.—Miramichi Mercury, July 10.

Distressing Accident.—On Saturday morning last, Miss Rebecca Golding, aged 15, daughter of Mr. John Golding, of this City, in company with her elder sister, and some other young females, was going on a visit to her friends and relatives up the River. The wood-boat, in which they were passengers, was prevented by the state of the tide, from proceeding directly on, and came to near the shore, some distance below Robertson's Lime Kiln. While they were waiting for the change of the tide, and men belonging to the boat ascended the hill, which was very high, and almost perpendicular, and amused themselves and the passengers by rolling stones down the precipice into the water, at some considerable distance ahead of the boat, and as they thought beyond the reach of all danger. But one of the stones, a very large one, while rolling down the declivity, met with some obstruction which gave it a different direction, it passed within a few inches of the head of a man who was on the side of the hill, and painful to relate, it struck and dreadfully bruised this young woman, and caused her instant death! By this accident, an affectionate family and a wide circle of relatives and friends, are plunged into very deep distress and sorrow.—City Gazette.
