### LATEST INTELLIGENCE FROM EUROPE.

Extracts From Halifax and American Papers containing English dates to the 16th Nov. The new Parliament assembled on the 14th Nov. At twelve o'clock the Lord High Steward, the Marquis of Conyngham, attended in the House of Commons for the purpose of administering the oaths. A number of the Peers attended, also, to witness the ceremonies. At two o'clock, in the House of Lords, the Lord Chancellor and the other commissioners, the Earls of Liverpool, Harrowby, and Westmorland, and Lord Bexley, dressed in their Peers robes, took their seats in front of the Throne. The Commons being summoned, the Lord Chancellor proceeded to read the Commission for opening Parliament, which being done, his Lordship directed the Commons to return and elect their Speaker, and present him the day following, at the Bar of the House of Lords, for His Majesty's approbation. Mr. Manners Sutton was afterwards re-elected by acclamation. The Courier of the 14th states, that His Majes-

ty's Speech will be delivered on that day week. The address to His Majesty, from the House of Commons is to be moved by the Hon. Mr. Liddle, member for Northumberland, and seconded by the Hon. G. Winn, member of Malden. In the House of Lords, the Address will be moved by Lord Cornwallis, but the seconder is not determined on.

Accounts have been received from Marseilles of Lord Cochrane's having effected the purchase of a small frigate in that port for the service of the Greeks; for the sum of £12,000. This, with Captain Hasting's steam vessel, and the frigate from New-York, will give a new character to the Greek naval force.

Intelligence from Greece to the 19th of September, states that a steam-boat had arrived in the Gulph of Argos, to the great joy of the people. She was purchased by the Greeks of the owner, T. A. Hastings, for £15,000, and was named Perseverance, (such is the meaning of the Greek word by which it is so called.) It is about 230 tons, — A new expedition is fitting out in Egypt against Greece; and the Smyrna O. Spectator predicts the speedy desolation or subjugation of that country. — It may be "desolation," but not "subjugation;" for the Greeks will not submit.

The London Globe of the 14th ultimo states that the Greek frigate Hellas, Capt. Gregory, which sailed from New-York on the 16th October, for Greece, was spoken on the 22d Oct. in lat. 40, long. 53, 30.

Sir Walter Scott had returned from his visit to Paris, highly gratified with the excursion. He had obtained some very important and authentic documents, with which he intends to illustrate the Life of Napoleon.

Barcelona is still garrisoned by 5000 French troops. A conspiracy was detected there on the 16th October against the lives of the captain general, the Archbishop and others, who fled for safety to the French quarters.

At an affray which took place at Armagh, Ireland, on the 2d November, the police fired on the country people, killed four, and wounded many others.

At a meeting of the ship-owners held in Liverpool, resolutions were passed, that the unexampled distress of the shipping interest was in a great measure owing to, and likely to be perpetuated by, the recent changes in the navigation laws: and that a petition on the subject should be prepared for Parliament.

An engagement took place on the 9th August last, between the Ashantees on the western coast of Africa, and the force commanded by Lieut. Colonel Purdon. The former amounted to 25,000 men, the latter to 11,000. The battle lasted for an hour, and was contested with great obstinacy; but the Ashantees at length took to flight, having lost 5000 of their number, and leaving on the field the King's camp and equipage, (in which was found the head of the late Sir Charles McCarthy.) The loss of the force commanded by Lt. Col. Purdon, was 800 killed and 2000 wounded.
