We hail with unfeigned satisfaction the spirited manner in which the most important concerns of this Province have recently been advocated in the City of St. John, thro' the medium of the Public Journals; while at the same time it affords us great pleasure to witness the talent which the writers so unassumingly display in illustrating their good conceptions of the subject they have taken so praiseworthy an interest in. "The spirit improvement" one writer most justly observes "which has begun to shew itself, ought not to be suffered to evaporate, and die away. Persons who have the good of the country at heart, and who understand the subject, would do well to avail themselves of the means the Public Journals afford; to convey their ideas to the great body of the people, and thus to fan the little spark which just begins to burn into flame. I am persuaded that you, Sir, or any other of the conductors of our public papers, will be happy to give publicity to any communication which has this object in view." Most certainly will our columns be at all times open to any sort of communication (nay we cordially invite even the most trifling assistance) on this very useful theme; and we know the Editors in St. John are also sincerely devoted to the same interesting subject. It only

remains then that such endeavours to promote the general good be met by the warm co-operation of the patriotic friends of this happy Country. "Pro bono publico," in the City Gazette of the 17th ult. (from whose communication the above extract is taken) after alluding to the present general disposition of improvement in almost every part of the world, remarks—"It would certainly be unworthy of our origin, as descendants of Great Britain, of the fostering care which we have experienced, and of the anxiety and interest yet felt by the Government on our behalf, were we supinely to stand still, while all are in motion around us; and we must greatly cease to respect ourselves, if, while the Parent State and the Sister Colonies are on the march of improvement, we, alone, of all the happy family, should be contented to remain in a state of comparative rudeness, feebleness, and ignorance. And in such a state we should be less excusable, as a bountiful Providence has furnished us with ample means to improve our condition." Assuredly: Nothing could be more clearly or better expressed in so few words, nor any truth more deserving of general estimation. We must indeed "greatly cease to respect ourselves," if we should ever be so wicked as to spurn or disregard the bountiful munificence of Providence, and not rather labour diligently, and with our united strength, to improve the gracious blessings bestowed upon us, and by patient industry and indefatigable perseverance, evince ourselves consciously impressed by, and grateful for, such manifest advantages.

Our limits do not permit us to extend these remarks at present. We shall however at all times, in common with our brother Editors, cherish a deep anxiety for the prosperity of this fruitful Colony, and consider it our duty to give publicity from time to time, to every circumstance that may transpire, tending to promote or benefit the general welfare; while, we repeat, our columns will most certainly be always open to every communication, in any shape involving, tho' in a remote degree, the happiness of the loyal Inhabitants of this highly favored Province.

As was naturally expected, the curiosity of the public has led many to visit the vein of IRON ORE, in this City, of which an account was given in our last. The Lord Goderich, a fine ship of four hundred and twelve tons register, copper fastened to the bends, was launched from the Ship Yard of Mr. James Long, Cocagne, on Thursday the 25th instant. She is allowed by judges to be a superior built vessel, and reflects much credit on Mr. McIntosh, the master builder.—*Miramichi, Oct. 30.*

Capt. McNeil of the schooner Dolphin, of Pictou, from the Magdalen Islands, detained by H. M. ship Alligator, for trading without having entered, reports that immense numbers of American and French Fishing vessels have visited the Island this summer. That their crews go on shore and cure their fish, and purchase the fish caught by British subjects, in exchange for beef, flour, pork, gin, &c. He also states that the French vessels from St. Pierre and Miquelon, succeeded in securing the best fish, to the disappointment and loss of our Traders.—*Hal. Journal, Oct. 29.*

KINGSTON, (Jam.) Sept. 6.

Important.—By the Michael Samuel from Aruba, we are put in possession of the following interesting information:— "A Spanish Squadron with 12,000 men, were daily expected from Spain at Porto Rico, under the command of General Mo-

rales, to invade Columbia, as transports had arrived there from Spain with 1800 saddles, &c. for cavalry, and other arms and ammunitions for the expedition. The interior of Porto Cabelle was revolutionizing, and the port was blockaded by a Spanish line of battle ship, 2 brigs, 2 schooners, and a sloop of war. One of the brigs had an engagement with a Columbian Privateer, when the latter was taken a prize. The news arrived at Curaca by a vessel from thence. A severe hurricane occurred at Martinique on the 18th of August, when 18 vessels were lost, among which was the Columbian Privateer brig Pincheta."
