This not only merits the warm emulation of every patriotic mind, but will, no doubt, abundantly requite our perseverance and industry.

"We have learned, with much surprise and pleasure, that a rich and deep vein of IRON ORE, has been discovered, existing in this City. A knowledge of its locality was communicated, last week, to His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR, who, being favourably impressed from the information, and from a specimen of the Ore then exhibited, expressed a wish to examine personally, the formation and extent of the vein; and we have the best authority for stating, that his visit resulted in a strong opinion of its importance. Some further specimens were selected on the spot, by His Excellency, in order to their being submitted to an analysis, and the public will doubtless, soon be put in possession of more particular information.

For this discovery, we are indebted to Mr. SEARS, whose successful exploration in King's and Westmoreland Counties, was noticed a few days since.

The bed of Ore is situated nearly on a line with Union-street, on the declivity of the highlands about the Government Building, at the head of King-street. The inclination of the vein is similar to that which characterises those found in Nova-Scotia."

MINERALS AND MINERAL SPRINGS.

We have the satisfaction to lay before the public, a list of valuable Minerals and Mineral Springs, situated in King's and in Westmoreland Counties. For a knowledge of their several localities, as well as for the discovery of most of them, we are indebted to a Gentleman of this City, who has lately spent a considerable time on an exploring excursion.

To most of our readers it will be an interesting, and to all a novel fact, that no less than three Hepatic (sulphureous) Springs, of the same nature and medicinal properties of the Harrowgate waters, have been found, and analysed—thus laying open infallible fountains of health, in many cases of disease.

We hope that some excitement will continue to be kept up, on the Mineral resources of the Province. The present successful attempt will, doubtless, encourage further exploration, and we look sanguinely to a period, when Mining operations will be ranked among the lucrative branches, to which the industry of our people will be directed.

An extraordinary yield from a single Bean.—Mr. Amasa Coy, of this Town, having during last summer observed among some bush beans in his garden, a bean vine of an unusual appearance, put up a pole by the side of it, and upon the beans becoming ripe, he states that he picked from that single vine no less than three hundred and six pods! which pods produced the immense number of one thousand six hundred and sixty beans! The seed is of the common size but of a very dark purple colour. Two or three persons have had the curiosity to count the beans, and the number has only varied two more. They may at any time be seen in Mr. C's possession. We understand that 66 pods or (say) 500 beans from one seed, was the greatest yield known before the present instance.
