The European dates by the Packet are but a few days later than those given in our last. We have made such extracts as circumstances would allow.

The most attractive article by the last arrivals, is undoubtedly the Speech of His Majesty at the prorogation of Parliament, and which we are confident will be generally read with deep interest. The King's allusion to the pending hostilities between the Emperor of Russia and the Ottoman Porte, and His Majesty's declaration that he will omit no effort of friendly interposition to restore peace, is highly satisfactory; and the gratifying assurances of the prosperity of the parent Country, greatly enhance the pleasure which the perusal of the Royal Speech affords throughout, but particularly in the clear understanding it imparts on those subjects about which, at the present period, so much anxiety is felt.

Lady Douglas, Miss, and Miss Helen Douglas, accompanied by His Excellency Sir Howard, left this for Saint John, in the Steam Boat, yesterday morning; and her Ladyship and family, we understand, will embark, in the course of the present week, on board the Allan Gilmour, at that port, for Glasgow.

During the last week her Ladyship and the young Ladies received visits from their friends and acquaintances here.

The departure of her Ladyship and family from this Province, and from Fredericton in particular, is a source of unfeigned regret. In other parts of the Province, where, from the nature of the seasons, their visits could not be so frequent as they otherwise might have been, their presence was invariably welcomed with the lively and sincere greetings of the heart; and the late deserved attentions paid them by the Inhabitants of St. Andrews, marked the esteem they cherished for their distinguished visitors; and, consequently, the separation must be very painful. In Fredericton, however, which circumstances had, as is well known, made their Home in this Province, and where more frequent opportunities occurred for duly estimating the value of that intimacy which always so cordially subsisted between her Ladyship and family, and their numerous acquaintances; the parting could not be otherwise than exceedingly embarrassing to their feelings; and society here will long retain the pleasing recollection of their unceasing attentions, and that urbanity of disposition, and suavity of manners, which characterized their exertions for its happiness; while her Ladyship warmly patronized every endeavour that presented itself to her peculiar attention, to promote the interests and the general good of all. But chiefly it should not be forgotten, that in Lady Douglas, the poor will long miss a kind and sympathizing benefactress.

Under these circumstances, therefore, the departure of her Ladyship and family from this Province is cause of general and sincere regret; while we trust their voyage will be a voyage of pleasantness, and the means of perfectly restoring her Ladyship to health, (which it affords us much pleasure to hear is now improving fast,) and to contribute towards which as much as possible, we are extremely happy to learn that the very best arrangements have been made on board the Allan Gilmour, in fitting up her accommodations for the voyage.

The "GUELPH ANNIVERSARY" will be read with pleasure by every well wisher to the prosperity of the British Colonies. "The rising City of Guelph," is a rising City indeed! May the noble undertaking prosper as it has begun.

We are happy to state that in the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, the Sum of Fifteen Thousand Pounds was voted for the repairs of the Fortification at Fort George; and that a Company of Sappers and Miners may be expected here early in the next year. —Halifax Royal Gazette, Sept. 17.

LONDON, July 21.

**The Morea.**—There can now be but little question, that England and France are in active negotiation for the immediate evacuation of the Morea by the Egyptian Army under Ibrahim Pacha; and that the great object of the treaty of London last year will speedily be effected by the complete Pacification of Greece; and that one of the conditions of the treaty will be the restoration of all the Greek women and children which have been sent into slavery to Egypt, and other places. This negotiation, which will be enforced with very strong arguments urged by the British and French Admirals in addition to those of the Civil Negotiators, cannot rightly be viewed as interfering in the war between Russia and Turkey; and the Viceroy of Egypt, and his son, are men of too much sagacity, not to perceive the danger which a refusal to accept of honorable stipulations will involve them in, and too prudent not to yield to stern necessity. The last advices from Corfu, announced, that Ibrahim Pacha had replied to some of the propositions made to him; and that he was taking measures to make the evacuation of the Morea as little inconvenient to his army as possible. He saw daily that the allied squadrons were receiving reinforcements, and would shortly be able to dictate any terms they might please; and he knew full well that a perfect understanding existed between those commanders, and the able commissioners, Count Guilleminot, and Gen. Wood, who represents the British Government in absence of Mr. Canning;—and that while they were moderate in their language, they were resolute in their determination. We may shortly expect news of the cessation of all hostile appearances in that quarter.

**Three English Ships seized at Oporto.**—His Majesty's ship Bramble has arrived from Oporto with letters announcing the seizure of three English merchant ships at Oporto by the Portuguese authorities, under the plea of their being about to convey to England property belonging to the leaders of the late constitutional forces. The vessels seized are the *Friends*, the *Vintage*, and another.

They were unloading, and will probably be condemned, unless the English Government assumes a higher tone, with regard to vessels and property of this country, than they have lately held towards the new rulers of Portugal.

We understand that information of the reported insurrection in Spain was yesterday received at the Foreign Office; but it does not appear to be generally understood whether it is a Constitutional or Carlist insurrection. Viewed, however, in the events in Portugal, we incline to believe that it is a movement of the partizans of Don Carlos, for the purpose of producing a reaction similar to that which has just been witnessed in Portugal.

There were no dispatches from Spain received at the Foreign Office yesterday or to-day. But a letter was received at Paris, and transmitted to Government, stating that some Guerillas had assembled in the neighbourhood of Lagrons in Old Castile, to the cries of Charles V. and that a regiment of Infantry which had been despatched against them had re-entered the town, with some loss in killed and wounded. This is the substance of the letter. —*Courier*.

We have reason to believe that information confirming the report of an insurrection in Spain has been received at the Foreign Office; but the precise object of the movement does not appear. Probably it may have been undertaken by the partizans of Don Carlos, encouraged as they must be, by the success of Don Miguel in Portugal. —*Observer*.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, JULY 25.

Sir George Murray laid on the table copies of the correspondence relative to our commercial intercourse with the United States.

**Half past seven o'clock.**—The events passing in Portugal and Spain are represented to us from Paris as exciting little sensation in that capital, and not at all attracting the attention of the French Government. Those two nations, indeed, begin to be considered in Europe as no longer in the class of civilized ones.

The King has been pleased to order a Conge d'Elire to pass the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Metropolitan Church of

Canterbury, to elect an Archbishop to that See, the same being void by the death of the Most Rev. Father in God, Doctor C. Manners Sutton; and his Majesty has also been pleased, by his Royal Sign Manual, to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter, the Right Rev. Father in God Doctor William Howley, now Bishop of London, to be by them elected Archbishop of the said See of Canterbury.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal, granting to Spencer Percival, Esq., the Office of Clerk of the Ordnance of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

**KING'S COLLEGE.**—The progress of the subscriptions for this institution has been most rapid. A month only has elapsed since the first meeting took place; in less than that period the donations amounted to nearly 38,000*l.*, and the shares to 30,000*l.*; to which are to be added 3,000*l.* donations, and 5,300*l.* subscriptions, making a grand total of 41,000*l.* donations, and upwards of 35,000*l.* subscriptions. It is confidently anticipated, that the sum of 100,000*l.* will be raised before the end of next month, when the Committee will proceed to make arrangements for the site of the college, the plan, &c.

Mr. Peel, it is said, will be created a Peer, with the title of Lord Tamworth, and will resign his office.

Major General David Stewart, of Garth, who has just been appointed Governor of the Island of St. Lucie, is a officer of long service and high military reputation. He entered the army in 1792, and has been engaged since in every scene where the enemy was to be met; in Holland, in the West India Islands, which were wrested from the French, in Egypt, Maida, the Peninsula, and Waterloo. On the Plains of Maida he distinguished himself in command of the 78th Regiment; and by his gallant conduct on several occasions he has won various British and Foreign orders; but the chief part of his service has been seen in the brave 42d highlanders, with whom he has shared the honours and perils of most of their achievements in the late wars. General Stewart is an author favourably known to the literary world by his history of the highland Clans, and of the original formation and exploits of the highland Regiments. He is, besides, a pattern of the arts, and a man of distinguished scientific attainments. Under these circumstances, notwithstanding the drawback of his military services and character, we cannot think him but well qualified for the civil appointment which his Majesty has been advised to confer on him.
