Several persons at Pera found much hopes on the pacific dispositions of the Divan, while on the side of Russia we hear only of the most active preparations. The accounts of the English Cabinet are of a very amicable nature. The most satisfactory result is expected here from the mission of the Commissioners who are sent to Greece to propose an amnesty.

THE AFRICAN TRAVELLERS.—We are authorized to state, and we do it with great satisfaction, that the paragraph which has run the round of the daily and weekly journals, asserting in peremptory terms the murder of the African Travellers, Clapperton and Laing, has no other foundation than a report to the same effect inserted in the *Etoile*, French Newspaper, some fifteen months ago, and said to be on the authority, as the recent one also is, of the Bashaw of Tripoli. Now we know that the British Consul, on the strength of this assertion, applied to the Bashaw, who positively denied all knowledge of the report, and added, that he did not believe one word of it. The recent repetition of the story is not only absurd in itself but impossible.—*Courier*.

MEMORANDA.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—We are indebted to a friend for the following particulars:—

On Saturday last a boat with four young men from Lubec for the wreck of the ship *Echo*—one of the many which went to rescue the

property which was the sport of winds and waves. Messrs. Moody Lakeman, David Hallowell, Edwin Hunt, and William Lakeman, were in the boat, which was driven on a rock at Liberty Point, (the southern point of Cambo Bello) and capsized, and the three first drowned. William Lakeman was saved by getting on the bottom of the boat. He was taken off by Mr. A. B. Foster, in a small boat, who happened to be within hearing. The two first were recently married, and have left amiable wives to deplore their early loss. They all ranked among the first young men in Lubec, and it will be long before the vacancy, which this afflicting event has occasioned, will cease to be felt. The body of Moody Lakeman, has since been found and interred.—*Northern Light*.

The *Princess Royal*, at the entrance of the Gulf, spoke the *Catherine and Ann*, bound to Miramichi. This vessel had fallen in with a boat of the *Superb*, Cain, from Bristol to Quebec: out of seven hands in the boat only two then survived, and one died soon after getting on board; the other (*Benjamin Orchard*) had been severely frost-bitten up to the knees; he stated that they had been ten days in the boat. The sight of the remaining bodies was horrible; they had been ripped open, and the flesh from the breast eaten. The ship, soon after the crew left, had gone down. Saw two vessels ashore on Sable Island, coast of Nova Scotia.—*Quebec Star*, May 21.
