## LATE AND IMPORTANT NEWS.

Through the politeness of a friend, we were on Thursday last furnished with a number of the *Cork Commercial Reporter* of the 2nd ult., containing London dates to the 29th September. The intelligence we are thus in possession of, is of unusual and deep interest, and, consequently, it was a further satisfaction to us that we received the above paper in time to make such use of it, for this impression, as we deemed would be likely to prove most acceptable to our readers. Under the European head, therefore, we immediately commenced with the articles alluded to; and these, it will be seen, are of such a nature, as to leave little, if any, room for questioning the general accuracy of their most important particulars; and our readers may perceive, that among the various subjects therein contained, the present unhappy state of Ireland engages the deepest attention of the British Ministry; and when the information in this number, relating to that country, (some portions of which we have copied in detail,) shall be perused, we apprehend none will be unable to form a surmise of the strong description of that intelligence which must have elicited the observations of the *Courier* on this now leading question in the domestic affairs of Europe. "The affairs of Ireland," the *Morning Chronicle* observes, "are now universally allowed to be in that state that we can no longer remain passive;" and it undoubtedly seems to be an impossibility, (judging only from the information now before us,) that the present condition of things in that country can much longer continue: in fact, they have evidently reached such a dreadful crisis as cannot be contemplated, by the reflecting mind, without forebodings of the most awful, and feelings of the most distressing nature. In this alarming emergency, however, there is no room to doubt that the most efficient measures would be instantly adopted by the British Government, for an effectual suppression, so far as it might be possible, of those proceedings, which, by the latest accounts, unquestionably wear the most threatening and gloomy aspect.

## STILL LATER.

The arrival of the English Mail, subsequent to the important paper we have noticed above, has supplied us with information five days later from London. From the files, however, we are thus in possession of, we can now only subjoin the most prominent items of their contents.

In the midst of these eventful circumstances, it is highly gratifying to observe, that the King had recovered from his late severe indisposition.

LONDON, Oct. 4.

Another Cabinet Council assembled at the Foreign Office yesterday at three o'clock.—Like that of Friday it was attended by nearly all the ministers. Previous to its meeting, indeed for nearly the entire morning, Lord Hill, the Commander of the Forces, was closeted with the Duke of Wellington. It is confidently rumoured in the best informed circles

in the west end of the town, but from necessity it can be rumour only, that although other matters of great importance, such as the corn market, the exportation of gold from this country, our foreign relations, &c. unquestionably form topics for grave deliberation, the attention of Ministers is almost exclusively directed to the state of Ireland.

His Majesty is expected in London to-morrow.

The plague has broken out at Gibraltar. The quarantine laws have been put in full force, the deaths from that disease increasing daily.

## PORTUGAL.

A private letter from Lisbon of the 20 ult., states, that on the previous Sunday one of the officers of Don Miguel's guard attempted to assassinate him as he was returning in his carriage from a shooting excursion, accompanied by his two sisters. The officer fired from behind a hedge, but the shot missed. The officer was seized immediately by the guard of his own regiment, which followed the carriage, and now awaits his fate in one of the dungeons of the capital.

Letters from Oporto the 15th inst. bring intelligence of six British subjects having been put on the proscribed list at Oporto, their property actually seized, and their persons ordered to be seized by the Portuguese authorities. Most of them have escaped into the interior, or on board the ships in the river. The English at Oporto are now openly insulted by the soldiery and populace.

The packets from Lisbon also confirm the accounts of the fever having appeared at Gibraltar, though not to any very serious extent. On the 8th ult. the Governor issued a proclamation, stating that "some cases of fever of a suspicious nature having occurred, his Excellency trusts that, by the prompt measures which have already been taken, the disease will be prevented from spreading." To this is attached a notice, that in the present emergency he deems it expedient to direct that all places of worship, and the courts of justice, be closed.

BLOCKADE OF THE DARDANELLES.—The intended blockade of the Dardanelles by the Russians, was officially announced to the Chairman at Lloyd's on Thursday.

We are most happy to be able to state that his Majesty's health continues progressively to improve. Sir Henry Hallford had a long interview yesterday with the Duke of Wellington, in Downing-street, it is supposed for the purpose of communicating this agreeable intelligence to the head of the government.

The Russian arms so far from making any progress in the war against the Turks, have experienced some severe checks. Beyond the Danube, the Turks are carrying on a vigorous war of posts, in which victory appears to be alternate. This under the circumstances is virtually a defeat, for if an invading army does not advance, its cause may be considered as desperate.

One of the reports prevailing concerning the contents of the despatches received by the French Ambassador, is, that they confirm the intelligence that the Porte has declared war against France. The report has gained considerable credit.

SMYRNA, Sept. 1.—Admiral de Rigny continues to enjoy high reputation in the Levant. There are about 90 French men of war in our seas.

The latest accounts from Syria say that the Ambassadors of the three parties to the treaty of the 6th July are expected to meet at Spezzia at the end of July.

The Hydriots continue to be on bad terms with the President capo d'Istrias. Time will perhaps remove this prejudice.—*Courier de Smyrne.*

## IRELAND.

Our accounts from the south are of the most frightful description. The truth is the province of Munster is in an open state of rebellion.—*Dublin Evening Mail.*

An express has just arrived in town, bringing the intelligence that Mr. Devereaux, a respectable gentleman residing in the neighbourhood of Callan, was fired at yesterday from behind a hedge, and shot upon the spot. Despatches have been received by government, giving a frightful account of the state of Tipperary.—*Id.*

It is very satisfactory to observe, that the price of NORTH AMERICAN TIMBER, is stated to have advanced in the Liverpool market. The last *B. Colonist* remarks, that "New-Brunswick White Pine has sold as high as 1s. 6d. per foot; this is from 2d. to 3d. higher than our last quotations."
