TIMBER.—We are happy to learn that this article has advanced in price. A letter from Liverpool, of the 21st Dec. states, that sales of a cargo, from this port, had been made at the following prices:—birch 1s 10d, red pine 1s 9d; yellow 1s 4½d, r. o. staves £9, yellow pine plank 2½d per foot of 2 inches thick.

The London Times says Lord Goderich, the British Prime Minister, had tendered his resignation; and the port feuille had been offered to Lord Harrowby, who had refused; and Ld. G. had consented to serve till a successor had been designated and had accepted.

The Pacha of Egypt has evinced a determination to abstain from any aggressive acts on account of the loss of his vessels at Navarin, declaring his resolution not to execute any retaliatory measures that the Grand Seigneur may think proper to direct.

In the London papers appears some speculation about the intended resignation of Lord Goderich the British Premier, who it is said finds the duties of his office too arduous and perplexing to render it desirable to him.
