

STORNAWAY.—Arrived here in a very exhausted state Captain Stanton, and four of the crew, of the ship Emerald, of St. John, New-Brunswick, from the Island of St. Kilda. Captain Stanton states, that having had a tedious voyage across the Atlantic, and St. Kilda being the first Island the ship made, he was induced, from the mildness of the weather, to land, in expectation of procuring some fresh provisions and water. He had no sooner landed than it came on to blow very fresh from the westward; and when a dense fog, which accompanied the gale, had subsided, it was found that the ship had been blown off, and upon ascending the most elevated parts of the Island, no trace of her could be seen in any direction. Captain Stanton remained a week on this remote Island, daily looking out for the re-appearance of his ship, and when he saw that her return was unlikely he resolved upon the desperate attempt of quitting the Island in the boat in which he had landed, and to steer for the Orkney Islands, whither he supposed his ship had been driven. He accordingly left St. Kilda, and made for the eastward, without either compass or sail, their provisions consisting only of two buckets of water, and a few cakes of course bread. They had rowed only about five leagues, when a breeze sprung up, which in a few minutes terminated in a most violent gale. After suffering a most perilous night, the storm gradually diminished, and the rising of the sun enabled them to see that the wind blew between the northward and the westward which would carry them to some part of the Long Island. They accordingly rowed in that direction, and next day landed at Scarp, on the west side of the Lewis. Happy and thankful for having escaped the dangers they had thus so awfully and recently encountered, they remained there for the night, and next day proceeded in their boat to Stornaway, a distance of 30 miles, where they arrived on Thursday last in an enfeebled state. Upon Captain Stanton's reaching Stornaway, he was informed of the safe arrival of his ship in the Orkneys, whither he immediately proceeded to join her. She is timber laded, and bound from St. John, New-Brunswick, to Hull.—*Glasgow Chronicle.*

IMPORTANT TO MARINERS.—It must be a matter of considerable interest to those navigating the British Channel, to know that the Gentlemen of the navy, now engaged in the survey of those shores, for the use of government, have discovered that the Helwick Sands have been erroneously laid down, or are much altered in themselves, so that the former instructions for avoiding them will now lead to danger. From the brig which went down on the 10th ult. being at the time standing in for the beach, and not for any of the ports in Carmarthen Bay, which, probably, she found it impossible to fetch, it is conjectured she met with damage on the Helwicks. They are said to extend considerably more to westward than is laid down.—*Bristol E. Gazette.*
