

"pend upon this grain for bread, but must adopt some other kind as a substitute, have introduced the use of Oatmeal. A Mill for the manufacturing of Oats has been built in Sackville, and went into operation in the early part of the last autumn. This Mill was erected by a very ingenious man, Mr. JOHN MORRICE, a native of Scotland, who is well acquainted with the structure and use of Oatmills.—The Meal from this mill, I am told, is excellent; and many of the inhabitants have been supplied from it. Two other Mills are now in progress, in other parts of the County, and are expected to be finished in the course of the next season. The building of Oatmills and the use of Oaten instead of Wheaten Bread, I cannot but view as an interesting change in the domestic economy of the inhabitants of this County, and one that will lead to the most beneficial results—a sure step towards comfort, prosperity, and wealth. I have always deplored the necessity that made our Farmers dependant upon the neighbouring States for bread, being of opinion that so long as this dependance continued, they, as a class of men, never could be prosperous and rich.—As to the state and condition of this County at large, it is a pleasing task to observe that there is a visible change among our Farmers in carrying on the details of their Farms. They have more method and better management; many of them take great pride in having all things, "snug," as it is termed. Within six years the prevailing opinion in this County was, that warm barns and stables were prejudicial to cattle.—This absurd notion is wholly done away: the chinks in the old barns are covered with battens, and in the new ones, great care is taken to make them tight and warm, and it is now universally acknowledged that cattle thrive better and consume less food in warm, than in open and exposed stables."

The Report of Queen's County Society, received this day, states that its attention had been principally turned to the improvement of Farming Stock; the extensive Meadow Lands in that County affording abundance of pasturage and fodder. This Society took at cost and charges, a Dishley Ram and Ewe, imported by the Central Society in 1826, and it is gratifying to learn, that their progeny are extensively distributed, and their excellence universally acknowledged throughout the County. "It is found," says the Report, "that this breed of Sheep are hardy, easily kept, and well adapted to our climate." At the Sale of the Stock imported by the Central Society in 1827, a Bull and Heifer of the Short Horn Durham Breed, and another Dishley Ram were purchased and sent to Queen's County. The Ram is in the possession of one of the best Farmers in the County, living in the vicinity of two new settlements forming in the interior. The Durham Cattle are highly valued by those Farmers who have seen them, and are now in better condition than they were at the commencement of winter, not suffering in the least from the rigor of the climate. The Bull is to be sent into different parts of the County, and great improvement in the breed of Cattle is anticipated from the introduction of those fine animals into that part of the Province. The Queens County Society having appropriated so much of its funds to the purchase of Cattle and Sheep, and intending to import Seeds and Implements of Husbandry, have no intention at present of establishing Cattle Shows, which from the local situation of the County, would not be likely to be very generally attended.
