Not having received the detailed account (copied from the *London Gazette Extraordinary* of Nov. 10.) of the glorious battle of Navarin, till too late for this impression; we must deny ourselves the pleasure of laying it before our readers till next week. It is said, and we heartily trust on good authority, that the Ambassadors at Constantinople had succeeded in making their escape in a French Frigate.

A letter from Zante contains the following:—"Confusion and dismay reign in all quarters of this city. A succession of disasters has caused a display of rage and fear bordering on mania. It would appear by a despatch forwarded by the English Admiral to our Ambassador here, that the whole of the Turco Egyptian Fleet had been destroyed in the bay of Navarin, on the 20th inst. and that the batteries of that port had been rendered useless. What is more, the Egyptian troops are in a state of mutiny and starvation, wandering over the country, and being cut up in detail. This tragical news, combined with the recent destructive fires, seems to have paralysed, in toto, the efforts of the Turks in their war department. All is at a stand still. Troops and shipping under orders have been countermanded, and an extraordinary Divan ordered to assemble forthwith. Connected with these events the Reis Effendi has been disgraced, and is in confinement—a prelude, of course, to decapitation. Our suburb is as yet, perfectly tranquil, and it is to be hoped, will remain so. Communications with the Foreign Ambassadors have been extremely frequent since the receipt of this news, and messengers innumerable are passing and repassing after the usual hours of diplomatic business. It is the opinion of the best informed English here, that all *MUST* and will be settled to the entire satisfaction of the Allied Powers, and immediately.

LONDON, NOV. 19.—Consols closed on Saturday at 86. It was rumoured that the business in which the Cabinet and the Foreign Ambassadors were engaged, was of so urgent a nature, that the latter had been at work the whole of Friday night.
