Dr. Somerville, President of the College, the Address delivered by him to the first Students of that Establishment, admitted to the Degree of Bachelor in Arts, on the 21st ultimo, which I here forward, together with such observations as its excellence calls forth, for insertion in the Gazette.

The accompanying Address, furnished by the Rev. Dr. Somerville, at the unanimous request of the College Board, in whose presence it was delivered; is certainly one of the most perfect compositions of the kind ever made public. To say it evinces a high degree of Classical Knowledge, or displays an extensive course of reading, would be the least that could be advanced, on this occasion. It speaks for itself, and the Rev. Doctor's classical attainments are too well known to need any remark.

But in this Address the Inquirer after Knowledge is presented with a Compendium of Study, that cannot fail to make him wise in Classick lore, and qualify him for such high situations, as the man of science and talent is alone fit to occupy.

The commendation of the Greek Language, as proving "a remarkable epoch in the history of that Nation" wherever it has been introduced, is very just—for wherever that beautiful language is unknown, there Society is deficient in refinement; and those "just principles of taste," which undoubtedly "add to the sum of human enjoyments," are wanting.

The Doctor is also particularly happy in his recommendation of Mathematical Studies, and in a most masterly way alludes to the wonderful powers of Algebra, "as an instrument of human thought."

The view then, of the end and aim of Education "the great desideratum," which is, to put the Student "upon the right track of investigation," is judiciously and ably displayed; and there is a beautiful simplicity, in the simile the Doctor adopts in illustration of what he advances.

The Reverend and learned Doctor then proceeds to pass such encomiums upon the general conduct and behaviour of the Students then before him, as reflects the highest credit upon them; and evinces such anxiety and care for their future welfare, as an affectionate Teacher must ever feel for those over whom he has had charge. He then gives such directions for their future course of Study, as public speakers, for which they are intended...and then separately to each, as their future destiny, (the one being designed for the Bar, and the other for the Pulpit,) calls forth.

"To the study of Law" the Doctor offers not any "particular directions," but simply recommends such standard works, an acquaintance with which, are indispensable to the sound Lawyer. But to the Student "destined for the service of the Church," the Doctor speaks with that confidence and authority which his situation as a Divine, so highly entitles him to; and with a skilful pencil indeed does he trace out the course the Student in Religion must pursue; and paint in rich and well blended colours, what a Clergyman should be.

The whole is concluded with a most perfect and copious admonition to both, to use "all diligence" in prosecuting their studies,

and gives them such advice, as cannot fail, if adopted, to guard them against that "pedantry and affectation" which mere men of letters are often given to; and at the same time, in fulfilment of his most anxious wishes, insure "credit to themselves," and render them "ornaments to their Country."

The Address was delivered by the Doctor extemporaneously, with much feeling, and was received by all present with the highest satisfaction.

The allusion in the early part of the Address to "the very excellent manner in which the Classics in the Grammar School, connected with the College, are taught," is a tribute all acknowledge to be due to the skill and assiduity of the Rev. Gentleman there presiding.

The Candidates who were admitted to the Degree of Bachelor in Arts, on the occasion here alluded to, were, Samuel Denny Lee Street, and Daniel Hailes Smith.

On the same day, Timothy Robert Wetmore, B. A. of King's College, Nova-Scotia, was admitted *ad eundem*.
