

administration, at which the Privy Counsellor Van Pahlen, is placed as head; and assured them that the war which the Emperor has been compelled to make, will deprive them but a short time of the advantages of a legal and durable existence.

The Emperor Nicholas has addressed a Circular to all the European Courts, referring to the Declaration and Manifesto he has issued on the subject of the war with Turkey, and confidently relies on their approbation of his conduct. He indignantly repels the suggestions propagated by malevolence or fear, to excite alarm, that the general peace of Europe is menaced, and that Russia has ambitious views; and peremptorily declares, that the treaties between Russia and the Porte may be renewed in such a manner as to be completely efficacious; including security for the future, the free navigation of the Black Sea and Bosphorus, and indemnity for the expenses of the war, and the losses sustained by her subjects. He reiterates, that he has no ambitious views—no wish to diminish the Ottoman Power, and that he will require no sacrifice from Turkey but in the spirit of equity and moderation. In proof of all this he refers to a letter sent to the Grand Vizier, which completely demonstrates, he says, that it is entirely in the power of Turkey to make peace with Russia; and that on the one hand, as Russia will not suffer a negotiation to be so prolonged as to lose the advantage of an entire campaign; so on the other, her sole thought is how best to open the means of a reconciliation at once speedy and durable. The circular concludes with a declaration, that the Proclamation of Marshal Wittgenston to the Moldavians and Wallachians, holds out no exaggerated hope to them, and not a word of any intentions which the Porte herself might not approve.—One great object, as alleged, being to preserve tranquillity in Servia\*, and to prevent an insurrection therein, in spite of the hostile measures which the Divan, always imprudent and blind, adopts towards that province.

\* Mention of this Turkish province is frequently made in the late Russian State Papers. It lies to the W. of Wallachia, and has Belgrade (so often alluded to in former wars) as its key towards the German Empire. It was conquered by the Turks under Mahomed the Great, soon after he made himself master of the Greek Empire, by the capture of Constantinople in 1453. Since the decay of the Ottoman Empire, the Turks have had but a slender hold on the allegiance of the Servians, who have made several attempts to throw off their yoke. In these attempts they were frequently aided by Russia; but in consequence of the former mutual jealousies of the European powers, they were eventually left to their fate. During the French Revolution, and particularly during the military sway of Bonaparte, they again attempted to emancipate themselves; and about 1811, a French army, under Marshal Marmont, we recollect, was on the point of marching from Dalmatia to their assistance; when the entire overthrow of the French armies in Russia and Spain compelled the French to return to their own country, and leave the poor Servians to the chastisement of the masters. After the overthrow of the Military Despotism of France, it became the policy of the victorious Allies not to interfere hostilely in the internal affairs of the nations; but Russia, in all her treaties with Turkey, has made stipulations for the good treatment of the Servians as well as of the Greeks of the Principalities.—It now appears that the Servians were making new attempts to rise against the Turks, and one of the objects of the new war waged by Russia, is to preserve the tranquillity of the province.

The young Hereditary Prince of Saxony is baptized by the name of "Frederick-Augustus-Albert-Anthony-Ferdinand-Joseph-Charles-Maria-Baptist-Nepomuck-William-Xavier-George-Fidelis." This name will form a rich burthen of a national anthem. "God save great Frederick Augustus," and so on to "Fidelis," will dwell, with admirable effect, on the lips of a grateful people.

The Provincial Parliament of Lower-Canada is further prorogued to the 12th of August next.

On Tuesday evening, the House of Commons, by a majority of 161 to 54, voted £3000 per annum, to the son of the late Mr. Canning.

Boston, June 24. Bishop Inglis was to officiate at N. York on Sunday last, at St. John's Church and Trinity Church. His father was formerly Rector of the latter Church.
