



SALE OF Crown Lands in York County. Districts No. 5, 11 and 13.

BY order of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, Public Notice is hereby given, that the undermentioned Tracts of Land will be offered for Sale by Auction at the Market-House, in Fredericton, on Saturday the 10th day of May next, at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, at the upset price per acre expressed against each, and subject to the Regulations heretofore published.

In case the purchaser shall pay down the whole amount of the purchase money, a Grant will immediately pass to him, free of any further expence and unincumbered with any Quit Rent or conditions of improvement; but if the money shall be paid by instalments, the Grant will be withheld until the payment of the last instalment, and will then be passed free of any additional expence to the Purchaser, and my certificate of such payment will entitle him to take immediate possession of the Land, and to hold the same subject to the conditions expressed in the terms of Sale.

In case purchasers of Land at any Sale not exceeding 200 Acres, shall be unable to advance the purchase money by instalments, they may be permitted to occupy the Land upon a Quit Rent equal to five per cent. upon the amount of the purchase money; One year's Quit Rent to be paid at the time of Sale in advance, and to be paid annually in advance thereafter: But in case of failure in paying these Quit Rents regularly, the Land will be again referred to Auction, and sold.

1st Tract.

50 Lots containing 10,000 acres, commencing at the Keswick Ridge Settlement, about 12 miles distant from Fredericton, and extending to the Caverhill Settlement; the principal reserved Road extends parallel to the River St. John at a distance of about five miles therefrom, and will communicate therewith by several good lumber roads; the land is well watered by numerous branches of the Mactaquack Stream, and is of an excellent quality. Upset price two shillings and six pence per acre.

2d Tract.

60 Lots containing 12,000 acres in and adjoining the Cardigan Settlement, distant about 15 miles from Fredericton. This valuable Tract is too well known to require a more particular description: Upset price two shillings and six pence per acre.

3d Tract.

5 Lots containing 1100 acres, fronting on the South side of the Penniac stream, and adjoining above the Penniac Settlement, distant but nine miles from Fredericton, with which it communicates by a tolerably good carriage road: Upset price two shillings and three pence per acre.

4th Tract.

16 Lots containing 3,600 acres, in the Maguddy Settlement, distant about 28 miles from Fredericton. This Tract which is the only vacant part of the route from the River St. John to the Great Magaguadavic Lake,

consists of excellent Land, and is in the immediate vicinity of flourishing and valuable settlements: Upset price two shillings and six pence per acre.

In calculating the contents of the above described Lots, ten per cent. is allowed for roads and waste.

AN ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS the times of holding the Hilary and Easter Terms of the Supreme Court, as established by Ordinance, bearing date the twelfth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ten, have been found inconvenient, I have therefore thought fit, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to ordain and declare, and I do by these presents ordain and declare that the said Hilary Term shall in future commence on the First Tuesday in February in every year, and the said Easter Term, on the first Tuesday in May in every year, instead of the Third Tuesday in February and May respectively, as established by the said Ordinance; and the said Terms shall continue from the said Tuesdays, respectively, until the Saturday following, on which day they shall respectively end unless the Justices of the said Court shall adjourn, the sittings thereof to the Week succeeding the said Terms respectively, under the provisions of the Act of Assembly in such case made and provided; and of this Regulation His Majesty's Justices of the Supreme Court, and all others whom it may concern, will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

And in those cases in which the Land shall be in the possession of cultivation of an individual they will lay them before the Lieutenant-Governor, and recommend the expediency of an action being entered and carried on by the Commissioners in the name and on behalf of the Party aggrieved.

Surveyor-General's Office, 21st May, 1827.

IN consequence of the late regulations regarding the disposal of Lands in this Province, the Surveyor-General feels it his duty to request the attention of the gentlemen holding deputations under him, to the necessity of the immediate execution of those orders of survey, at present in their hands, and to an active and punctual performance of all future orders of survey: and it being a matter of extreme importance to the interests of those individuals to whom Lands have been allotted by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and His Majesty's Council, in conformity with the mode of granting Lands hitherto practised in the Colony, to be put without delay in possession of their Titles from the Crown, he trusts they will lose no moment when a Deputy notifies to them the receipt of an order of survey in their favor, in attending him to have it executed; and he begs at the same time to remind them that their failing to avail themselves of this communication will be intirely at their own risk.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the sixth year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad;" it is, amongst other

things, enacted, that certain ports, therein particularly mentioned, in the island of Jamaica, and in the provinces of Nova Scotia, Canada, and New-Brunswick, and in the island of Barbadoes, shall be free warehousing ports for the purposes of the said Act; and it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, to appoint any port in His Majesty's possessions in America to be a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act; and that every such port, so appointed by His Majesty, shall be a free warehousing port under the said Act, as if appointed by the same, in as full and ample a manner in all respects as any of the ports therein before mentioned, and are free warehousing ports appointed by the said Act.

And whereas, His Majesty doth deem it expedient that certain other ports in His Majesty's possessions in America should be appointed free warehousing ports for the purposes of the said Act; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers in him vested in and by the said Act of Parliament, order and appoint that the following ports in His Majesty's possessions in America shall be respectively free warehousing ports for the purposes of the said Act, that is to say, port of Spain, in the Island of Trinidad; Nassau, in the Island of New-Providence; Montego Bay, in the Island of Jamaica; Roseau, in the Island of Dominica; and Saint Andrews, in the Province of New-Brunswick.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Comissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Hon. Wm. Huskisson, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
