The Editor in copying the Speech of Sir John Harvey, at the opening of the present Session into the *Old Quebec Gazette*, makes the following very appropriate remarks:

"Sir John has long been a resident in North America, and is well acquainted with its inhabitants. He seems to have given himself sufficient pains to become thoroughly acquainted with the wants and interests of the people whom he is more particularly called to govern. It is a pleasing circumstance to see the Representative of the Colony, cordially acting together for the promotion of the general interest, as we are persuaded is the case in the adjoining Province of New Brunswick."

It is with sincere and unfeigned regret, that we have to record the death of Colonel the Honorable John Maitland, of the 32d Regiment, which took place at London, U. C. on the 18th inst. Col. Maitland, we learn, had been indisposed for some time previous to his lamented death: and there is reason to believe that the cold and fatigue which he endured, during the attack upon the American Brigades, at Pointe au Pelée Islands, on the 3d of March, 1838, acting upon a frame enfeebled by wounds, received in the service of his country, and consequent debility, produced the complaint which carried him to his grave. These, combined with the total want of comfort in the quarters occupied last winter by the Regiment and the incessant attention paid by Col. Maitland to his military duties, on a disturbed frontier, must have hastened an event, which all who knew Col. Maitland, from His Excellency the Commander of the Forces, to the humblest private in the 32d Regiment, unite in deploring.—*Quebec Mercury*.

Legislature of New Brunswick.
[Extracts from the Journals of the House of Assembly.]
House of Assembly, 29th Jan. 1839.

Mr. McLeod, from the Committee appointed on the 18th instant, when in consideration of His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session, to consider the several matters connected with the Agricultural interests of the Province, submitted their report, and having read the same, delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, when it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee, to whom was referred that part of His Excellency's Speech relating to Agriculture, and other subjects connected therewith, report:

"That having had under their consideration the several subjects relating to this important subject, they are of opinion that it would tend materially to advance the prosperity of the Province if Agricultural Societies were formed in different, and conveniently situated, districts of several Counties, for the purpose of encouraging by their protection, influence and example, the general agricultural prosperity, and to promote the getting into operation Experimental Farms, in order thereby to ascertain and demonstrate the best mode of cultivating particular crops, their comparative adaptation to, and best system of rotation in, different soils and situations. With these views the Committee recommend that a suitable grant of money be made to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor (such sum to be divided among and limited to the respective Counties, according to their relative importance,) for the purpose of encouraging the establishment of Agricultural Societies and promoting the objects thereof.

"The Committee also are of opinion, that the general interest and welfare of the Province render it highly necessary that some further encouragement should be given to the cultiva-

tion of Bread Stuffs therein, and particularly for the raising of Wheat and Oats on newly reclaimed lands; a measure rendered the more necessary in consequence of the very large importations of Foreign Wheat, the produce of the Continent of Europe, which being brought into this Province duty free, have deprived the Agriculturists of nearly all the protection and indirect bounty intended to be afforded them by the Imperial duty on Foreign Wheat Flour. Impressed, therefore, with the great importance of encouraging an extended cultivation of grain in this Province, your committee consider it highly desirable that a bounty should be granted for the raising of Wheat and Oats on certain descriptions of Land, and they have therefore prepared a bill for that purpose.

"The Committee having taken into their consideration the Petition of Horatio H. Hill and Daniel Hill, of Saint Stephen in the County of Charlotte, praying for Legislative aid or encouragement towards the formation of a Settlement at or near Grand Lake Stream, between the first and second Chepamictook Lakes, are of opinion that it would not be advisable to grant the prayer of the Petitioners; and your Committee having also had under their consideration the Petition of John Morgan, Henry Fisher, Frederick Phillips, Andrew Little, and one hundred others, inhabitants of the Oromocto, Rushagomis and Maryland Settlements, in the Counties of York and Sanbury, praying that a grant may pass to William Edgar towards the erection of a Windmill, are of opinion that it would not be advisable to grant the prayer of the same.

"The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of William Corry, together with the works compiled by him, report:

"That having carefully examined those works, the Committee are of opinion that Mr. Corry's Spelling Book is superior to any now in common use in the Province, and that the printing and publishing of the same would be highly beneficial to the Elementary Schools, and ought to be encouraged by a pecuniary grant.

"That the Treatise on Mercantile Arithmetic, although a work of considerable merit, does not, in the opinion of your Committee, so far surpass the arithmetical books already published, as to justify the Committee in recommending it to the favorable consideration of the House.

FROM BARBADOES.

TRINIDAD, Dec. 14.—Fever has broken out amongst the troops in the Garrison, as will be seen by the annexed extract:—

"It is distressing to hear of the fatal instances of yellow fever at the garrison of St. Ann's. In our last we noticed the death of Ensign Gough of the 52d Regiment, lately arrived from Gibraltar, and in our obituary of this day, is the name of Paymaster Winterbottom, same regiment. The fatal disease has we understand, attacked the whole of that gentleman's family. Mrs. W. we are informed died, last night, and that their children are also dangerously ill."

"The severe sickness at St. Ann's prevented the inspection of the 52d Regiment taking place on Thursday last."

"Her Majesty's Ships of War Pique, Rover, and Modeste, arrived on Tuesday evening last, from Plymouth, 30 days. We understand they will shortly proceed to Jamaica—there to be joined by six other ships of war, and that the whole force will sail for the Mexican coast to watch the motion of the French Squadron blockading the ports of that republic, and for the better protection of British interests. There is nothing we apprehend very warlike in the movement—except the assemblage of so large a naval force. No such good news as a War: A much longer peace, and both army and navy, we are afraid will forget how to drub the enemies of their country.—*West Indian*.
