

duly appreciated by you; and the manner in which you have placed at the disposal of the Executive Government all the available Revenues of the Province, to be applied, if necessary, in its defence against foreign invasion, and for the preservation of British connexion, while it exhibits your undiminished confidence in that Government, also nobly upholds the high character which the people of this Province have so justly acquired, for their ardent loyalty to their Sovereign, and unshaken attachment to the Parent State. In close connexion with this subject let me here record the tribute of my highest admiration of the conduct of the Legislature of the Sister Province of Nova Scotia, in the patriotic offer made by them, on behalf of the loyal and gallant population of that Province, to aid us with their blood and treasure in maintaining our rights and repelling foreign aggression. We have also to acknowledge the most prompt and effectual assistance from His Excellency the Governor in Chief. I feel that I cannot close this deeply important subject in a manner more accordant to your wishes, as well as to my own, than by the expression of my confident hope that my endeavours to prevent border collision, and thereby to preserve the existing relations of peace with the United States may, through the blessing of Providence, prove effectual.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"Your liberality in providing for the pay and equipment of the Militia and Volunteer Force, which I have deemed it necessary to call out; for the contingent expenses of the Government, and in the advance of a large sum of money, applicable to the immediate improvement of the Great Line of our communication with Lower Canada, by the Valley of the Saint John and Timasquata Lake, are most highly appreciated by me, as I am well assured they will be by His Excellency the Governor in Chief, and by our Most Gracious Queen.

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"In now closing this Session, and permitting your return to your homes, I feel assured that should circumstances require me to call upon you for your Militia services in the field, I may rely with the most entire confidence upon your promptly responding to such a call."

Mr. Wilnot, from the Joint Committee appointed to prepare an Address to Her Majesty on the subject of the Disputed Territory, yesterday reported the following as having been agreed to.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

The humble Address of your Majesty's Legislative Council and Assembly, in General Assembly convened.

May it please Your Majesty.

We Your Majesty's faithful and dutiful subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of New Brunswick, beg leave to approach Your Majesty, with feelings of the most profound and ardent attachment to Your Majesty's person and government.

We respectfully invite Your Majesty's special attention, to the long disputed and important question of the North Eastern Boundary of the United States of America, involving as it does, the future union, welfare and prosperity of Your Majesty's North American Possessions.

We respectfully call Your Majesty's notice to the recent intelligence communicated by Your Majesty's Representative in this Province, relative to the actual invasion of this Colony, by an armed force from the adjoining State of Maine; and while we most earnestly impress upon Your Majesty, the value of the territory in question, to the North American Colonies in general, and this Province in particular, we at the same time have the most entire confidence in the determination of Your Majesty's government, to preserve the integrity of these Your Majesty's North American dominions, in the settlement of this most important question.

Entertaining this confidence in the wisdom of Your Majesty's government, and feeling well assured that nothing will be done by Your Majesty, which may have the effect of compromising the rights of the crown, we purposely refrain from expressing an opinion on any of the points in dispute.

For ourselves, and on behalf of Your Majesty's faithful subjects, the inhabitants of this Province, we cordially tender our lives and our property, in aid of the maintenance of Your Majesty's rights, and for repelling the invader from our soil.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and suite, left Head Quarters on Monday morning for the North Eastern Frontier of the Province. His Excellency was escorted from town by a part of Major Wilnot's Troop of Cavalry.—A detachment of the Volunteer Artillery also left this place on the same day for Woodstock.

We have not as yet received any thing conclusive respecting the Governor's Message to the Legislature of Maine, nor has there been any official communication to our Government on the subject. The question has been brought up and discussed in both Houses, but there does not appear to be that unanimity of sentiment amongst the war party which formerly prevailed. It is very evident that they have cooled down, and begun to count the cost of their previous hasty proceedings, for they appear to be quite undecided as to what course it is safest to pursue.

N. E. Boundary resolves were taken up, and the amendment of Mr. Delesdenier adopted.

Mr. Vose offered two additional resolutions, in substance that this State will not consent to a conventional line nor a new arbitration; but that it is the duty of the General Government to make an immediate proposition to Great Britain to appoint a joint commission to run the treaty line, and if Great Britain refuses, to run the line by the authority of the United States, and take possession of the whole territory without unnecessary delay.

At the suggestion of Mr. French, Mr. Vose amended by striking out the words "conventional line," because they are not mentioned in the President's Message.

Mr. Paine moved to strike out of the first resolve, after the words "new arbitration," the words "in pursuance of the recommendation of the President."

After some debate, this amendment was negatived, yeas 80, nays 88.

Mr. Vose's additional resolves were then adopted.

BANGOR, March 19.

There was no business of importance transacted in either branch of the Legislature on Thursday and Friday. The following resolution was reported to the house on Friday afternoon by the committee on the N. E. Boundary, and Monday was assigned for its consideration:—

RESOLVED, That whenever the Governor of this State shall be fully satisfied either by the declaration of the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, or otherwise, that he has abandoned all idea of occupying the disputed territory with a military force, or attempting an expulsion of the civil force, sent there under our land agent—that then the Governor of this State be authorized to withdraw our militia force, leaving the land agent with a sufficient posse, armed or unarmed as the case may require, to drive out or arrest the trespassers, and to preserve and protect the timber from their depredations.

The offer of the Quebec Volunteer Artillery to proceed to Madawaska, has been gallantly backed by the Volunteers of Upper Canada. The 3d Provincial Battalion, under the command of Colonel the Hon. Philip Van Koughnet, has volunteered to march to New Brunswick, to assist in repelling the invasion of that Province. This, as the Cornwall Observer remarks, was no more than would be expected from that gallant corps, than whom a more intelligent, active, and effective body of men is not to be found in Upper Canada. The Cornwall Light Infantry, under command of Captain Crawford, consisting of one hundred men, has volunteered its services also. This company was drilled last summer in light infantry movements by Colonel Turner, and if attached to Colonel Van Koughnet's battalion, would be a great addition to it.—(Old Gazette.)
