Reports have been received by this morning's mail from Montreal, that in consequence of the second outrage perpetrated on the Frontier by a band of American Banditti from Albany in Vermont, the Volunteers had crossed the Line and were retreating on the Americans. The report had reached St. John's and Chambly that several houses had been burnt in the State of Vermont by the Volunteers and inhabitants from our side. Much as such a state of things is to be deplored, it can create no surprise and hardly censure; if the authorities in the United States are unable to repress such hostile proceedings, and there is no means of getting at and punishing the offenders, in the course of law; it can hardly be expected that British frontier population will allow the wolves to break into their sheepfolds without endeavouring to drive them out, pursue them to their dens, and there inflict summary chastisement upon them for misdeeds, that rival in barbarity, the outrages of the Red Indians of the South of whose cruelties the Americans so incessantly complain, and plead, as an excuse for retaliatory cruelties inflicted on the squaws and families of their tormentors.—*Quebec Mercury*, 7th Feb.

It is stated in the Toronto papers, that Warrants had been transmitted to the London District for the execution of Cornelius Cunningham, Amos Perley, and Joshua G. Doan, three of the brigands apprehended at Windsor. The first was a "Colonel," and the second a "Major," in the practical army. The rank of the third, if he held any, we do not know; but he is said to have been an officer in Dr. Duncombe's rebel force in 1837.

It is said that the sympathizers are again mustering at Detroit in force, intending to make a descent in that quarter; and the *Prescott Sentinel*, of Tuesday last, state that between two and three thousand Americans are collecting near Gravelly Point, with a like intention. We shall see.

The sentence of the Court Martial upon the French officer, Hindenlang, finding him guilty and condemning him to death, has been approved of by His Excellency, the Commander of the Forces.

The recapitulation of the testimony for and against Narbonne, Nicolas, and others was read this day before the Court Martial. There is no doubt but they will all be found guilty.
