DISTRESSING CIRCUMSTANCE.—On the morning of Thursday last, David, third son of Mr. David Pickard of Douglas, in the vicinity of this town, went out for the purpose of shooting pigeons; but not having returned as soon as was expected, his friends suspected that something was wrong, and some of them went in search of him. When found he was entirely without life, and had been so for some time. In discharging the piece the breach pin lost its hold and having entered his forehead caused his immediate death. He was a boy of an extremely amiable disposition, and great promise, and has left a numerous circle of relations and friends, who join with the immediate family to which he belonged, in lamenting his premature death. He was in the 13th year of his age.—*Sentinel*, July 5.

We collect the following summary of the latest intelligence from Great Britain from London Papers to the 28th of May and Glasgow to the 30th of that month, received by the arrival of the Ship *Mosambique* at Saint John.

Parliament met on Monday the 27th, when the House of Commons immediately proceeded to the election of a Speaker. The vote was taken out at an early hour, when there appeared—

For Mr. Shaw Lefevre, 317
For Mr. Goulbourn, 299

Majority for Mr. Lefevre, 18

Lord John Russell then announced in answer to a question by Sir Robert Peel, that the Under Secretary for the Colonies would on Tuesday fully state the views of the government in respect of Canada. He likewise intimated that he (Lord J. Russell) would communicate to the House on Friday the nature of the plan of national education now under consideration, though he would postpone the specific motion regarding it till Friday fortnight. There was nothing of any consequence done in the Lords.

A division of the 10th Regt. of Foot had reached Liverpool from Dublin; the remainder of the Regiment 800 strong had just arrived. They were quartered in the town and vicinity.

The Ordnance department in the Tower has been particularly busy during the past week in shipping and forwarding military stores to all parts of England and Wales. The troops in the neighborhood of the manufacturing districts are so numerous that there is not sufficient barrack room for them, and camps are to be formed.

It is understood in the city, that the French Government have agreed to withdraw the blockade from Buenos Ayres, and to submit the difference with that state to the decision of Great Britain, and that orders to that effect have been sent out to Buenos Ayres.

The Hastings, 74, having on board the Queen Dowager, arrived at Portsmouth on Wednesday, from the Mediterranean. The Queen's health has been much improved by the voyage.

POPULARITY OF THE DUKE OF WELLINGTON.—On the approach of his Grace at the last Drawing-room on Thursday, it was with great difficulty the populace were restrained from taking the horses from his Grace's carriage, and drawing it into the Palace yard.

The Steam ship *British Queen* was to leave Portsmouth July 1st, for New York, as appears by an advertisement which gives her tonnage at 2016, and 500 horse power, with Lieut. Richard Roberts as commander. The *British Queen* is intended to depart on the first of each alternate month, from London and New York throughout the year.

England seems to have been visited with incessant rains during the month of May. On the 19th morning and evening, snow fell in various places, and the weather was severely cold. No such weather has been known in England since May, 1809.

The Queen will visit Ireland in August—this is announced from unquestionable authority.—*Limerick Chronicle*.

We regret to have to announce the death of General the Hon. Robert Taylor, uncle to the Marquis of Headfort, at his seat, Davestown, in Ireland, on the 23d ult. The Hon. General, who was in his 79th year, was Colonel of the 6th Dragoons or Carabiniers.

The Irish Methodists have, within a few months, lost by death three ornaments to their ministry, in the persons of Mr. Mayne, Mr. Howe, and Mr. Ousley.

Prince Louis Napoleon, having been charged with some agency in the Paris riot, has published a denial in the London Papers. We give a translation of his letter.

"17, Carleton House terrace, May 17, 1839.
"Sir,—I see with regret, by your Paris correspondence, that efforts are made to throw on me the responsibility of the late insurrection. I reckon on your politeness to contradict that insinuation in the most positive manner. The news of the sanguinary scenes which have taken place, surprised as well as afflicted me. If I were the soul of a conspiracy, I should also be its leader in the day of danger—and I would not disavow it after a defeat.

"NAPOLEON LOUIS BONAPARTE."

The Bristol Chartists, it is said, have threatened to begin the revolution by making a bonfire of the shipping at that port.

At Birmingham, the partisans were a good deal excited in consequence of attempts to make arrests.

There is no question but the vigor of the magistrates, and the presence of adequate military aid, have prevented commotion, and abolished the expressed determination of the Chartists.

The traitor M'Kenzie has been tried and convicted at Canandaigua, under the laws of the United States, for making war upon the dominions of Great Britain. The sentence awarded by Judge Thompson is eighteen months imprisonment and fine. We hope the imprisonment will be of such a nature as keep this troublesome person out of mischief, for the year and half at least.—*New York Albion*.

THE EFFECTS OF STEAM.—It is said that a person can now go from New York to Jerusalem in thirty three days! From the former city to Bristol in thirteen days, from thence to Paris in two, to Syria in thirteen, from there to Java in four, and in one more to the sacred city.—*N. Y. Herald*.

Her Majesty's ship *Andromache*, has been in the river several days. On coming up, she unfortunately got on the bar, but was towed off by the Steamer, on her passage from the Island on Saturday. This accident, we fear, prevented the Captain proceeding to Chatham. This vessel is stationed in the Gulf, for the protection of the Fisheries.—*Gleaner*.

Our spring fleet is rapidly taking their departure. Should we not have an acquisition by arrivals, the River, in another fortnight, will be quite free of square rigged vessels.—*Jb*.

ARRIVAL OF THE LIVERPOOL STEAMER.

By this arrival London dates have been received at New York to the 12th June and Liverpool to the 13th, the Liverpool's day of sailing. We have been favoured with the *New York Commercial Advertiser* from which we make the following extracts:—

In the House of Commons Mr. Labouchere moved for leave to bring in the new bill respecting the island of Jamaica. He deplored the existence and operation of party spirit in relation to measures of this character, and avowed his conviction that the bill originally proposed was necessary and highly important to the welfare of the island, although he had been forced to withdraw it by party opposition. The measure he now proposed was founded upon Sir Robert Peel's principle of giving the Jamaica House of Assembly an opportunity to retract its steps. He had no sanguine hopes that if the House would accede to the proposal he was now about to make, the Jamaica Assembly should have a fair and *bona fide* trial.

The bill introduced by Mr. Labouchere was in substance giving ample time to the Jamaica Assembly to make up their minds whether they would or would not renew the laws which they had hitherto refused to renew—and in the event of this refusal, authorizing the Governor and Council to renew them and put them in force. It proposed also to authorize the issue of orders in Council for regulating vagrancy, contracts for labor, and the occupation of vacant land—not, however, to go into operation except in case of neglect or refusal by the colonial Legislature to regulate these matters properly.

Lord John Russell brought forward his resolutions upon the state of the Colonies. He went somewhat at length into an argumentative statement of the condition of affairs in the two provinces, corresponding with Lord Durham's report, and arriving at the conclusion that the only practicable measure of relief was a legislative union. He declared that the government was not disposed to adopt Sir Francis Head's plans, which were objectionable in many respects, and not practicable. The government was equally opposed to another proposition that had been made, and that of a confederation of all the provinces.

In the plan now proposed to Parliament the government had come to the conclusion that the representation should not be regulated by the population, as it existed in each province, but by the double principle of territory and population—which would have the effect of giving greater weight to the English loyalists in both provinces than they now possessed.

To obviate the danger of giving a representative system to districts lately in rebellion, he proposed that no Assembly should be called until 1842—continuing to the Governor of Lower Canada the power he possesses, and even increasing it where necessary.

The crown revenues he proposed to give into the complete control of the Assemblies, after securing an adequate civil list for the crown officers, judges, &c.

He could not assent to the principle of responsibility to the people of the provinces, to the extent insisted on by Lord Durham.

His lordship concluded by moving two resolutions—one affirming the principle of union—the other providing that matters shall remain as they are until 1842.

Lord John Russell announced that the government had abandoned the plan of national education which it had intended to introduce. [Formal schools.] So much clamor had been raised against it, and such great and persevering efforts had been made to excite an adverse feeling to it throughout the country, that it would be unadvisable to proceed farther with it.

Lord John Russell, being pressed by Sir Robert Peel and others, announced that he should withdraw his resolution respecting union of the Colonies, and bring in a bill for that purpose at once. But he did not wish to carry it beyond the second reading this session.

The debate on the Jamaica bill was then resumed. Battle was joined on the first clause, Sir E. Sugden moving to strike it out; but it was carried, 228 to 194. The bill was then passed through committee.

June 11. Nothing of interest in the House of Lords, except a statement from Lord Melbourne that "the great arming which had taken place in some parts of the country, and appeared of so menacing a character, had disappeared and sunk into nothing."

The Buffalo store-ship sailed from Portsmouth on the 4th, with detachments of the Coldstream Guards and other regiments, for Canada; and on the 5th the Athol sailed with a detachment of the 24th, for the same destination.

The list of fashionable arrivals for the 7th of June contains the names of Mr. and Mrs. Webster.

Lord John Russell has announced the intention of government to establish the penny rate of postage.

The London Times announces the return of Mr. Jaudon to this country, and the breaking up of the U. S. Bank agency.

A hostile correspondence has taken place between Lord Brougham and Mr. Henry Grattan, but ended in nothing of importance.

There have been riots at Liverpool and Bury, but not attended with serious consequences. Excepting these there do not appear to have been any disturbances, Chartist or others.

Mr. Southey was married to Miss Bowles, in the first week of June.

Mr. Abercromby, the late Speaker, has been raised to the peerage by the title of Baron Danfermline.

Accounts had been received in London of the actual commencement of hostilities between Turkey and Egypt. The Turkish army, twenty thousand strong, crossed the Euphrates at Byr, and a battle is said to have taken place on the frontiers of Syria.

The ratifications of the treaty between Holland and Belgium have been exchanged; and that long-pending quarrel has been finally adjusted.

Famine is about to increase the sufferings already endured by the unfortunate inhabitants of Ireland.

[To the Editor of the Royal Gazette.]
