An insurrection was begun in the streets of Paris on Sunday, 12th of May, by three hundred individuals, who armed themselves and for a time seemed to carry all before them. Order is said to have been restored early next morning.

Much blood has been spilt in this unhappy affair. Between 120 and 150 deaths have already resulted from it.

MAY 15.—All is as quiet as the movements of the police will permit. Every instant new arrests are made.

CENTENARY OF METHODISM IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

Our readers have doubtless observed the extraordinary exertions which are now in progress among the Wesleyan Methodists in Great Britain, for the celebration of what is termed the "Centenary of Methodism."

Already the sum of £200,000 has been subscribed, an amount double that which was at first expected, and probably this will yet be considerably augmented.

This is altogether a special effort, and is not in any respect to interfere with the ordinary subscriptions of the connexion. The proceeds are to be appropriated to several objects of great importance; among the principal of which are, the establishment of two Theological Institutions, and the erection of extensive mission premises in London.

We merely allude to this subject, in order to mention in addition, an instance of extraordinary liberality in connexion with the same denomination among ourselves. For several years it has been in contemplation to erect a Wesleyan Academy in this province, but hitherto the building of chapels, mission-houses, &c. in the different circuits, and other necessary expenses prevented the accomplishment of this most desirable object.

During the present session of the district conference at St. John, it was, we believe, intended to come to some final decision, that the "Centenary of Methodism" might not be altogether disregarded here. We understand that Charles Allison, Esquire, of Sackville, in the County of Westmorland, has offered to contribute to such an institution to be erected in that vicinity, the magnificent sum of £4000, besides several acres of land, and £100 per annum for 10 years, towards its support. It is scarcely necessary to add, that this noble offering has been gratefully accepted and acknowledged, and a committee consisting of Rev. Messrs. Temple, Busby, Williams and Wood, has been constituted to carry into immediate effect the benevolent intention of this truly liberal man.—*Sentinel*.

H. M. S. Pique, Capt. Boxer, which arrived from Halifax on Tuesday last, for the purpose of conveying to Quebec, the invalids,

YARMOUTH, (N. S.) May 31.

On Sunday last, three American Fishing craft were brought into this port by the Government Schooner *Victory*, Capt. Darby, having been captured in the Tuskets, for alleged encroachments on the Fishing ground.—The vessels are strip of sails, rigging, &c. pending the decision of the Court at Halifax. They have a considerable quantity of cod and halibut on board. The crews have taken passage for the United States, with the exception of two men, who proceeded to Halifax to give their version of the subject.—*Herald*.
