

Lower Canada.

MONTREAL, 24th May, 1839.

We had a heavy fall of rain through the whole course of last night, and this morning it continued to fall till eight o'clock, but not so heavy. The appearance of the clouds was so heavy and lowering, that it was supposed that the troops would not move out of town to-day. But at ten o'clock they began to "wend their way" to the Priest's Farm, which is situated on the right of the road leading to the Saint Pierre Race Ground, a short distance over the canal bridge, and by noon the Guards, Royals, 15th, 24th, 66th, and 71st Regiments, King's Dragoon Guards, 7th Hussars, and the Artillery with six pieces of cannon, were on the field. Notwithstanding the muddy state of the roads, and the appearance of rain, the crowds that went out to see the grand spectacle were immense. Carriages of every description, gentlemen on horseback, and pedestrians of all ranks and degrees, formed a moving line from the town to the field. Shortly after 12 o'clock His Excellency the Commander in Chief, accompanied by his Staff, and escorted by a detachment of the 7th Hussars, arrived on the ground. His Excellency was received by a Royal Salute from the different regiments, where they were drawn up; and after twenty-one guns were fired, the whole forces were put through a sham fight, after the plan of some celebrated battle, which lasted till nearly three o'clock. The weather was dull, and the field was ill suited for the occasion, owing to its swampy nature, which was rendered still worse by the heavy fall of rain last night—the soldiers were up to their knees in many places, in mud. On the whole the sight was a most splendid one, and well repaid every one who took the trouble to go out. Sir John Colborne appeared to be in excellent health.

MONTREAL, May 27.—The honors of the Queen's Birth Day, (Friday last,) which were celebrated by the Military in an unrivalled style, and to which we formerly alluded, were appropriately concluded in the evening, by a splendid Ball, given by Lady Colborne. The company amounted to between three or four hundred. The arrangements were of the most liberal and recherche character, calculated to gratify every taste, whether delighting in—the mazy dance—unrestrained social intercourse—the quiet observance of human character viewed in its lighter modes—the soul subduing influences of music—or, in uniting with one or all of these, the gratification of the most refined palate. Lady Colborne and the war-worn veteran, the Governor General, displayed every anxiety, that their numerous guests should have in perfection the harmless enjoyments each preferred; and, they were ably seconded in their successful efforts by the senior members of their family. A temporary building was erected in rear of the Governor General's residence for the supper room, and was very tastefully decorated with flowers and evergreens; and was brilliantly lighted, as well as abundantly supplied with all the luxuries the season afforded. The health of Her Majesty was, in the course of the evening, proposed by His Excellency, and was, of course, done full honor to.—Montreal has been rather unused to vice-regal entertainments, and that of Friday last will not certainly tend to reconcile the society of the city to the absence of them.—*Courier*.

We published to day a series of Resolutions, passed at a Special Meeting for the Committee of the North American Colonial Association, held on the 15th of February last, copies of which have recently been received in this country. It affords us sincere pleasure to find, that the highly respectable Association in question, who are unremitting in their attention to the interests of these Provinces, have not forborne to express their opinion with respect to so important a document as the Report of the Earl of Durham. It is also gratifying to find, that the opinions expressed in these Resolutions, coincide, in almost every point, with those entertained by the Constitutional lists of Upper and Lower Canada; and being such that they are more likely to be acted upon by the Imperial Government and Parliament, than the public document which gave rise to them.

To enable the association to carry out these important objects, their act of incorporation confers upon them very valuable and extensive privileges and powers: it authorizes them to acquire, by purchase, or free grant, lands in the colonies, to any extent: it enables them to charter or own steam or other ships, for the purpose of emigration and intercommunication between the several provinces: it likewise empowers the Company to act as Bankers, in England, by receiving deposits from persons emigrating with capital, and giving them bills on the colonies: and it authorizes the Company to establish Banks, in every place where they have emigration stations and land settlements. The capital of the Company is £300,000, divided into 15,000 shares of £20 each, upon which £2 per share, is to be paid at the time

of subscribing, and the remainder as the Directors may see fit, by calls not exceeding £2 per share, at intervals not less than three months from the date of each call.

The individual responsibility of the shareholders is limited, by the act of Parliament, to the amount of their respective shares.

The Company will keep at their head offices, and at the principal ports of embarkation, an account of the prices and descriptions of, and the mode of making application for, Crown lands, in the different colonies: they will likewise keep a register of lands for disposal, and negotiate the purchase and sale of colonial property, in various stages of improvement and cultivation; so that an Emigrant with small funds may, even before he quits his native country, fix upon his intended settlement, and proceed to his place of destination without being subjected to expenses and loss of time; or be exposed to the frauds that have been too often practised upon Emigrants, who have taken their little capital to a strange land, without any settled plan or fixed spot for their location.

Although the North American colonies offer a wide field of profitable enterprise, it is not the intention of the Company, themselves, to embark in commercial or agricultural speculations; believing that all such undertakings can be more efficiently and economically conducted by private individuals than by public companies, it will be the province of this association to encourage all well-founded projects of this description, by infusing into the colonies, where they purchase lands, an adequate supply of the two great elements of prosperity—labour and capital.

The revenues of the Company will be derived from the rent of their fixed property; the settlement and sale of wild lands, and profits resulting from their Banking operations, in the provinces.

GOOD NEWS FOR THE NEWCASTLE DISTRICT.

We lose not a moment in laying before our readers the following pleasing information, which has just been received.—Lieut Charles Rubidge, R. N. of the township of Otonabee, who has been some time past exerting himself most strenuously and successfully in advancing the interests of Upper Canada in the Mother Country, has written to say that he has been appointed agent to Colonel Wyndham, eldest son of the late Lord Egremont, to conduct the colonization of his emigrants in this Province, and would sail early in the present month, with between three and four hundred settlers for this district. They may be expected to arrive in Quebec early in June, and no time should therefore be lost in making every possible arrangement for their satisfactory reception and employment. The numerous friends of Lieut. Rubidge in Peterboro' will be further gratified to hear, that he has succeeded in collecting about fifty pounds towards the cost of their beautiful church.—*Star*.

PORT OF QUEBEC.—The prevalence of easterly winds since Monday morning has brought up about 150 square rigged vessels. There are now nearly three hundred in port; the chief part of them are, however, lying between Cape Diamond and Sillery. Nearly a hundred were at anchor opposite the town, this morning; a number of them are not yet boarded. The wind continues strong at north east, with rain.

DINNER TO BISHOP MACDONELL.—We believe it is generally known that this Venerable Prelate is about making another and probably last visit to Europe, on business connected with the Catholic Faith in Upper Canada; and the U. C. Celtic Society, of which he is both President and Founder, in order to testify their high respect for his many virtues, have invited him to a public dinner, to take place on Wednesday next. A large company is expected, and Sir Allan N. McNab, will preside on this special occasion.—*Id.*
