And they further beg leave to assure your Excellency, that your Excellency may at all times rely upon their services when required, in support of the British Government.

WILLIAM H. ROBINSON, Esq. Assistant Commissary General, and Lady, were passengers in the Steamer *Nova Scotia*, for Windsor, on Wednesday morning. Mr. Robinson proceeds to Halifax to take charge of the Commissariat Department there, in the absence of Deputy Commissary General HEWITSON, who goes to England for the benefit of his health. Mr. SWINNEY has taken charge of the Department at Fredericton for the present, and Mr. GOLDSMITH remains in charge in this City.

While we are pleased to find that Mr. Robinson has been selected to preside over the Commissariat Department in this command, a situation which his active business habits will qualify him to discharge with credit to himself and advantage to the Government, (and in which, we trust, ere long to here of his being confirmed,) we feel confident the removal of himself and his amiable Lady will be sensibly felt in this city, where there endeavours for the amelioration of the condition of the poorer classes and for the education and moral improvement of the rising generation were unceasing.—*St. John Courier*.

The Rev. ROBERT ALDER, one of the Secretaries of the Wesleyan Missionary Society in London, arrived in this City from Canada via the United States, on Saturday evening last, and proceeded to Nova Scotia on Monday morning, on his return to England.—We understand the mutual explanations made at the conference in Upper Canada, have been the means of removing certain differences between that body and the Society in London, which we believe was the principal object of the Rev. Gentleman's mission.—*Id*.

We understand that about \$1000 were subscribed in this City in the early part of the week, and forwarded for the relief of the sufferers by the late disastrous fire at Eastport. The sum, we have no doubt, would have been much larger, had the solicitations been much more general.—*Id*.

The Delegates from the Nova Scotia House of Assembly, had an interview with Lord Normanby on the 24th May. The Tyrion, with the Delegates from the Legislative Council, arrived at Falmouth on the 9th ult.

A company of the 4th battalion embarked yesterday on board the Stakesby transport, which came from Deptford, she had been overhauled, having just returned from the West Indies with two companies. The troops going out are to fill up the casualties in the different detachments stationed on the American continent.

Letters from London and Glasgow of the 11th and 12th of June state that the engines of the British Queen are complete, on board, and she would leave Clyde for London on the 17th June, and Portsmouth for New York, on the 1st July positively. The following is an extract:—"We are getting on with passengers and freight, and in all probability the Queen will take out the most valuable cargo of manufactures that ever went from London. At all events we have goods and passengers enough engaged to show a respectable front, if we should not have any thing more. The ship will be very deep with cargo—nevertheless I expect to be in New York in 15 or 17 days. I was down to see the President this morning, and they are getting on lustily. She is a noble ship and will carry half Liverpool."

General Scott, of the United States' Army, is on a tour of inspection along the whole frontier of the United States, opposite to Lower and Upper Canada, and at the latest dates was on the Niagara frontier. The activity of this officer is admirable, and if peace can be maintained he is the most likely person to be successful. We believe the discreet conduct of the officers of the United States' Army, in the difficult position in which they are placed, is generally acknowledged to be exemplary. It is pleasing to see men whose profession is arms, the promoters of peace.—*Quebec Gaz.* 3d July.
