These trials were closed on Thursday afternoon, when the Court was adjourned till Monday morning next at 10 o'clock.

[From our private Correspondence.]

Monday, Dec. 17, 1838.
W. S. David, Esq. who had been sent on a special mission to Upper Canada, returned this morning from Kingston, and reports that the Brigand Woodruff was under orders for execution on Wednesday next, his sentence having been approved of by Sir George Arthur. The warrants for the execution of three other prisoners who had been also found guilty, were hourly expected,—thus disposing of all the parties who up to that day had been tried. The Court Martial has suspended its sittings on Friday, being the Fast, but were to resume on Saturday. It now appears that Von Shoutz has left by Will £400 for the relief of the widows of Volunteers killed at Prescott,—his property amounting to £4000.

You will hear many rumours of an invasion having taken place on the frontiers, near Champlain, but they are without foundation, as I have taken particular pains to ascertain the fact.—Preparations however for such are positively known to be in progress at Aldburg, Swanton, &c.

The argument on the subject of the legal organization of Court Martial, has closed to-day—the decision, however, will not be made public before to-morrow or next day. No period is yet assigned for the execution of the prisoners here.

The opinion of the Judges respecting the organization of the Court Martial will not be made public until to-morrow.

A letter dated Amherstburg, Dec. 8, says, respecting the Brantards, that "Many of them are in the woods, or on their way to the interior—about 40 prisoners have been taken; 24 were killed, amongst them Putnam, a general, and a Detroit Printer, who was their standard bearer. The Rebels have some idea of occupying Hog Island, about two miles above Detroit—they have become outrageous, and threaten to make this a war of extermination. The municipal authorities and Gen. Brady and his force are set at defiance, and God only knows where such uncontrolled licence will end. The Militia are turning out well. There is a much better feeling existing amongst the French Canadians here than was shown last year, and many have shown great spirit, and a determination not to allow themselves to be misled by the promises of the Pirates any more."

KING'S COLLEGE, FREDERICTON.
December 31, 1838.

SIR:—I beg leave to state, through the Royal Gazette, that I duly received in duplicate a letter, dated "Corfu, 20th December, 1837," addressed by His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Howard Douglas, Her Majesty's Lord High Commissioner for the Ionian Islands, to "The Gentlemen composing the Council of King's College, New Brunswick, previous to the late change of administration," accompanied by a private communication, directing me to publish the said letter and the answer which might be given: which I was also authorised to receive for that purpose.

This letter I immediately laid before His

Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in his capacity of Chancellor of King's College; who has taken the first opportunity of the College Council subsequently assembling in his presence, to deliver the same to that body. The answer being deferred, I consider it my duty to defer likewise the publication of the letter committed to my trust. At the same time I feel that it would argue ingratitude and disrespect, to suffer the year to close without my public acknowledgment of the receipt and delivery of a document, containing strong evidence of the interest which Sir Howard Douglas has always continued to take, in this institution more particularly; and, generally in all which concerns a province and a people once enjoying the high benefit of His Excellency's government.

It becomes our painful task to announce the entire destruction by fire of the Church at Greenwich, King's County, early on Monday morning, the 24th inst. It appeared on investigation that the late earthquake had shaken the building greatly, and caused it to spread, thereby affecting the chimney in the roof, from which some sparks had escaped, ignited and broke out about ten hours after the fires had been extinguished in the stoves.

It was a melancholy and affecting sight soon after day break, to see the parishioners assembled on the spot, where the day before in peace and harmony they had worshipped their Maker, filled with grief and consternation at the destruction the devouring element had committed—each one lamenting the catastrophe as his own particular loss.

It is a singular circumstance the above building was nearly destroyed by fire 17 years ago, on the same day, and within a few hours of the same time.

At a meeting of the inhabitants of the Parish of Greenwich, King's County, held this 27th day of December, 1838, for the purpose of rebuilding the Church which was destroyed by fire on the 24th inst.

Resolved unanimously, That Captain Coffin, R. N., be Chairman.

Moved by Mr. Pywell, That the Church be placed on the ancient site, which was agreed to.

Resolved, on motion, (by the Reverend C. Milner,) That a Building Committee be appointed of the following persons, viz.:

Resolved unanimously, That the Timber for the frame, and the erection of the building be let by Contract; the building Committee to supply the Contractor with all other materials.

Resolved unanimously, That the plan of the Church submitted by the Rev. C. Milner be accepted, subject to modification.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to solicit subscriptions from the friends of the Church, in different parts of the Province: when the following persons were appointed, viz.—Rev. C. Milner, Capt. Coffin, R. N.; the two Church Wardens, and Mr. W. Pywell.

Proposed that Mr. Joel Waters be appointed to collect subscriptions in the Parish of Westfield. Mr. Waters kindly undertook to perform this duty.

Resolved, That the Church Wardens be joint Treasurers.

Resolved, That application be made to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts, and other Protestant Societies for assistance to build the Church. Agreed to unanimously.

Resolved, That a Petition be presented to the Legislature for assistance, and that Colonel M'Leod be solicited to draw up and present the same. Agreed to.

The Chairman having left the Chair by motion, and it being taken by Colonel M'Leod, Resolved unanimously, (on motion of the Rev. C. Milner,) That the thanks of this meeting be given to Captain Coffin for his kindness, liberality and attention in presiding and assisting at this meeting.

The English Mail for November, arrived here just as our paper went to press, we have only space for the following paragraphs:—

LONDON, 7th Nov.

Her Majesty and the Court will adjourn to the Pavilion at Brighton on the 14th inst. by which time all the arrangements at the palace are expected to be completed.—*Evening paper.*

It is said that an illustrious personage has forwarded to Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Orleans a valuable *cadeau* for the infant Count de Paris.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge will stay for three months at Gibraltar on a visit to the governor, Sir Alexander Woodford. The period at present stated of his royal highness's absence from this country is two years.

The Queen Dowager arrived on the 13th ult. at Gibraltar, and landed on the 14th, under royal salutes from the ships and garrisons at the New Mole, where Her Majesty was received by His Excellency the Governor, Sir Alexander Woodford, K. C. B.; His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge, and the Staff. From Gibraltar the royal traveller proceeds to Naples.

Yesterday Her Majesty Queen Adelaide attended the consecration of the protestant church by the Rev. Dr. Burrow. Her Majesty left £25 in the hands of the Vicar General for the poor, and the same sum with the Rev. Dr. Burrow, for charitable purposes.—*Gibraltar Chronicle of the 18th ult.*

It is reported that all the Ministers will assemble in town on the 15th instant, and that the first Cabinet Council, will be held on that day.

FROM A CORRESPONDENT.—It is very generally thought at the west end of the town, and by the officers of the Houses of Lords and Commons, that parliament will meet for the despatch of business on the 4th December, to which day it now stands prorogued.—*Standard.*

We understand that Earl Spencer and the Duke of Richmond had an interview in London a few days ago, in consequence of overtures which had been made to them to join the ministry; when, after mature deliberation, both these noblemen declined acceding to the proposal.—*Brighton Gazette.*

Sir Francis Chantrey has been on a visit at Walmer Castle professionally, taking a sketch of the Duke of Wellington, preparatory to modelling for the City statue.

The Admiralty are putting 68-pound guns into all the ships capable of carrying them; and the Horse Guards continue to furnish the army with percussion muskets.—*Courier.*

A lion was sold by auction at Liverpool last week, and brought £160.

BERMUDA, Dec. 8.—Total Loss of the French Frigate *Hermione*.—The frigate *Hermione*, of sixty guns, Commodore Bazoche, with a crew of 550 men, from Havana, bound to Brest, ran on the rocks off the west end of these Islands on Monday evening last, and soon sunk. The officers and crew landed at Ely's Harbour on the same evening.—They have since been provided with accommodation on board the Royal Oak, lying at the dock yard. We learn that several articles of rigging and some small stores have been saved.

H. B. M. ship *Malabar*, sailed for England from Hamilton, on the 28th ultimo, and on the following day the line of battle ship *Cornwallis*, bearing the flag of Vice Admiral Paget—with a squadron, consisting of the ships of war *Vestal* and *Racehorse*, and armed brig *Ringdove*, put into the same port, on their passage to the West India station. The armed schooner *Skipjack* sailed on the 25th ultimo with sealed orders.
