The message of Governor Fairfield to the Legislature of Maine, on the correspondence between Mr. Forsyth and Mr. Fox, and the memorandum of agreement to regulate the proceedings of the contending parties is too lengthy for our present limits,—indeed the sum and substance of it amounts to nothing more than a recapitulation of the ambiguous and oft repeated pretensions of that State to the Territory in dispute, over which Great Britain has claimed and exercised exclusive jurisdiction during the negotiations for the settlement of the Boundary question. We subjoin the concluding paragraphs which appear to be written in a more pacific character:—

"What then shall be done? The people of this State surely are not desirous of hurrying the two nations into a war. Such an event is anxiously to be avoided if it can be, without dishonor. We owe too much, to the Union, to ourselves, and above all to the spirit and principles of christianity, to bring about a conflict of arms with a nation having with us a common language, and bound to us by so many ties of common interests, without the most inexorable necessity. Under these circumstances I would recommend, that, when we are fully satisfied, either by the declarations of the Lt. Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, or otherwise, that he has abandoned all idea of occupying the disputed territory with a military force, and of attempting an expulsion of our party that then, the Governor be authorized to withdraw our military force, leaving the Land Agent with a sufficient posse, armed or unarmed, as the case may require, sufficient to carry into effect your original design, that of driving out or arresting the trespassers, and preserving and protecting the timber from their depredations.

"From such an act of jurisdiction—an attempt so right and proper in itself as this, and so imperatively called for by the circumstances of the case, we should not be driven by any power on earth. We ought not however, wantonly to do more than is necessary. We want no military force in the territory, if there be no military force against us; brave men would not battle with the air. We do want however, men enough, armed or unarmed, as the case may require, to resist the marauders and protect the timber; and we want no more. In pursuing this course, while we maintain our just and honorable position, we do nothing which our sister States can regard as unnecessarily provoking hostilities, and nothing which our Provincial neighbors can view as indicating a hostile or even illiberal feeling.

"These are my views, briefly and imperfectly expressed. Whether they coincide with your own or not, I repeat my determination to obey, so far as I may be able, whatever instructions you may be pleased to give."

Resolves in relation to the Disputed Territory.

Resolved, That no new State of affairs has taken place since the passage of the Resolves, passed January 24, 1839, and February 20, 1839, which should cause the Legislature to recede from the position taken in those Resolves, and that the measures contemplated by those Resolves should be carried into effect.

Resolved, That the measures of the Executive of this State in carrying into effect the Resolves herein referred to, should be sustained by the Legislature.

Mr. Vose of Augusta hoped the gentleman would not urge its passage at this time. The Governor's message, which embraced subjects of great importance had but just been read—and he had not, and he presumed the House had not, so fully considered the matter to which it relates, as to be prepared for any decisive expression of opinion, until a further examination of the subject. He was not prepared to vote for or against the Resolve at this time and he therefore hoped the gentleman from Calais would consent that the Resolve should lay on the table, and he would move its printing together with the other documents.

Mr. Whidden consented—and the Resolve was laid on the table.

There is nothing later from Maine; the interlopers on the disputed territory, sent in under the authority of that State have taken up advantageous positions and "calculate" to hold on if the Blue Noses come to put them out. Much as some of the New York papers condemn the proceedings of Maine, there is nevertheless a feeling in favour of the enterprise that State has undertaken, not in the Cabinet at Washington, perhaps, nor amongst the leading mercantile men, nor in the first seaports, but amongst the mobocracy, the most influential body in the United States; a war with England in the present state of Lower Canada is rather a favourite project. Indeed we can hardly say that the communications of ministers and men in high office, latterly, preserve that tone of good feeling, or even civility which is usual in the communications between the representatives of Sovereign States.—We do not merely look at the ferocious defiance of His Excellency Governor Fairfield in reply to the very urbane letter of Sir John Harvey; the bully evidently hoped to hector Sir John, but he neither knows the sterling spirit of that gallant officer, nor the daring courage and tried loyalty of the men of New Brunswick, or he would have been

more circumspect in his communication.—*Quebec Mercury.*

Major General Scott, who has been ordered to Maine under instructions from the United States Government, is an old acquaintance of Sir John Harvey, having served as a Brigadier General with the American troops on the Niagara Frontier, when Sir John, as Deputy Adjutant General to the Forces was serving with the Division of the Army in that part of the Upper Province under Lieut. General Sir Gordon Drummond, commanding in Upper Canada. They are both men of sound sense and of high honor, and therefore, there is some prospect of their bringing matters to an amicable termination, unless they are marred by the intervention of the counteracting absurdities of the Bobadil rule of the pugnacious State of Maine.—*Id.*

Yesterday, at noon, two more companies of the 11th Regiment arrived in town from Sorel, under the command of Colonel Bishop, and Captains Farmer and Winnington, Lieutenant Bloss, Ensign Storey, and Staff Asst. Surgeon Darcy.

One company crossed over to Point Levy this afternoon, on their way to New Brunswick, accompanied by a detachment of the Royal Artillery, under Lieut. Hatham, with a field piece and several sleighs loaded with ammunition, rockets, &c.

We understand that the two remaining companies of the 11th Regiment will follow on Friday.—*Quebec Gazette, March 6.*

One company of the 28th Fusiliers proceeded this morning to Annapolis. There was a most creditable warmth of feeling displayed on the occasion, which shows the spirit of Haligonians in a conspicuous light. More than thirty sleighs were volunteered to assist the gallant fellows on their journey. The start was made from the North Barracks at 9 o'clock, amidst such huzzas as only true British subjects know how to raise. The sleighs formed a line, Mr. Rogers and the officers taking the lead in a sleigh belonging to Mr. Hill. The band followed and played through Dutch Town—and the Truckmen, who mounted their Coronation flag, came after, three soldiers on each sled. They proceeded this day as far as Hamilton's on the Windsor Road.—*Halifax Times.*

Her Majesty's Ship Hercules was to leave Plymouth early in the last month, for Barbados—from thence, we understand she is to convey the 67th Regt. to this place. The 37th, we believe, is momentarily expected here from Jamaica.—*Halifax Royal Gazette.*

The Drafts from the City Militia, for actual service, marched into Barracks on Thursday last, and have since been performing garrison duty.

The most energetic military preparations are in progress throughout the Province. Troops, cannon, muskets, ammunition and provisions are daily being forwarded from this post to the Frontier.

A party of the Fredericton Volunteer Artillery came to the City last week for the purpose of taking charge of some field pieces and ammunition, with which they returned to Head Quarters on Friday.

An excellent spirit prevails in this city on the present emergency. Several Volunteer Corps, we learn, are fast filling up.—Horse, Rifle, Scotch Uniform Companies, &c.

We also learn that a Corps, to be called the City Guards, is now rapidly forming under excellent regulations, composed of persons of respectability, who doubtless will take much interest in attending to the duties which may be required of them. About 170 names are already enrolled.—*Saint John Observer.*
