Province of Lower Canada. J. COLBORNE.

By His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir JOHN COLBORNE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath and of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Governor General of all Her Majesty's Provinces on the Continent of North America, and of the Islands of Prince Edward and Newfoundland, and Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Lower Canada, Upper Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Island of Prince Edward and their several dependencies, Vice Admiral of the sea, and Commander of all Her Majesty's Forces in the said Provinces of Lower and Upper Canada.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, by Her three several Commissions under Her Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing respectively date at Westminster the thirteenth and fourteenth days of December, in the second year of Her Majesty's said Majesty, hath been graciously pleased to constitute and appoint Me to be Her Majesty's Governor General of all Her Majesty's Provinces on the Continent of North America, and of the Islands of Prince Edward and Newfoundland, and to be Her Majesty's Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Upper Canada and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and in and over the Island of Prince Edward respectively, with all and every the powers and authorities in the said Commissions respectively contained and which belong to the said offices, I have therefore, with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council for the said Province of Lower Canada, thought fit to issue this Proclamation to make known, and hereby do make known, Her Majesty's said appointments; I do also hereby, and with the same advice, require and command that all and singular Her Majesty's Officers and Ministers in the said Province of Lower Canada do continue in the execution of their several and respective offices, places, and employments, and that Her Majesty's loyal subjects, and all others whom it may concern, do take notice hereof, and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms at the Government House, in the City of Montreal, the seventeenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine, and in the second year of Her Majesty's said Majesty.

The Star, which sailed for England on Sunday, had a greater number of Passengers, we believe, than ever went before in a Packet from Halifax. She certainly is a remarkably fine vessel, and has excellent accommodations, but we are inclined to think the great inducement with many to embark on board of her was the character which her Commander bears. Lieut. Smith is a good seaman, and an active, intelligent Officer—affable in the extreme—generous in his habits of living—and never better pleased than when he is contributing to the happiness and comfort of others.—*Halifax Royal Gazette.*

The Barossa, Transport, from Cork for the West Indies, with detachments for Regiments in those Colonies, narrowly escaped foundering in 47° N. lat. and 11° W. long. Her tiller ropes, being bad, broke, and she "paid away" before the wind. A tremendous sea struck her abaft, burst in her windows, filled her stern cabins, and flooded the cuddy knee deep. Her 2d mate and a seaman were washed overboard. Her sails and rigging much injured. She had got back to Cork. There were about 500 persons crowded on board of her—all of whom suffered privations more or less severe. The Vessel is represented as extremely unfit for the service in which she was engaged.

INTERESTING EXPERIMENT: COMBINATION OF STEAM AND WIND.—A ship called the Maria, of London, Captain Black, is now fitting out, in the West India Export Dock, with two locomotive steam engines, and machinery of 10 horse power each, for the purpose of propelling the vessel by means of paddles which are made to unship, like coach wheels, and be put on or taken off without much trouble, while the ship is under weigh. The Maria is a vessel of 500 tons burden, built at Yarmouth, and has made a sailing voyage to Quebec and back, unaided by the power of steam. She is of the ordinary description of vessels of her class, and the engines and machinery are placed between decks, occupying a space of not more than 20 feet in length, by five feet in width on each side. The vessel is going to China, and the paddles are only to be made available during the calms and light winds, which it is well known are met with in certain latitudes on the East India and China voyages.

ANOTHER REMARKABLE QUICK PASSAGE FROM NEW YORK.—The passage of the Saint Andrew, Captain Thompson, noticed in our last, remarkably quick as it was, has been exceeded in quickness by the passage of the Orpheus, Captain Bailey, which arrived on Wednesday afternoon. The Orpheus sailed from Sandy Hook on the morning of the 20th ultimo, took a pilot off Point Lynas on the evening of the 4th instant, and was in Prince's Dock, at this port, on the morning of the 5th instant. The time occupied between the two ports was, according to the ship's reckoning, *fourteen days and a half.*

The St. Andrew, the packet of the 15th ult. which, however, did not sail until the 16th, arrived yesterday. She has consequently completed the passage, from the wharf at New York to the Prince's Dock at Liverpool, under fifteen days; one of the quickest passages ever made by a sailing vessel between the two ports.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—We must postpone reflections on the events which have again desolated so many hearths in Canada to another occasion. From various sources we learn that destruction, the twin-sister of war, has wrought to a lamentable extent. Hundreds will have been deprived of shelter, on the threshold of a Canadian winter, and will have to mourn in desolation the loss of husbands, fathers, and brothers, by this horrible insurrection. While we condemn the poor wretched instruments for the part they have taken, how deep is the guilt of those who incited them to rise, and deserted them when the danger thickened around them! There are others nearer home who have incurred a fearful responsibility.—*Globe.*

Mr. Maitland, who was the bearer of despatches from the authorities in Canada to the Colonial Office, and to Lord Hill, the Commander in Chief, arrived in the Great Western Steamer. It is a fact that Mr. Maitland has, by means of the Great Western, been enabled to visit the interior of Canada, and return again, in the short space of three months, two-thirds of this time having been spent in Canada. The Great Western experienced tremendous gales both on the outward and on the homeward voyage; the weather during the whole of the outward passage was most terrific. The feeling entertained by the passengers towards Captain Hoskin, R. N. is of a nature which must prove highly gratifying to that officer. Several testimonials were presented to him by the passengers.

The American Minister, Lord Hill, and Sir J. Willoughby Gordon, had interviews with the Earl of Durham on Saturday, at his Lordship's residence in Cleveland-row.

FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.—An arrival at New York furnishes us with Paris dates to the 18th.

The King's speech was delivered on the 17th, and seems to have given little satisfaction to the opposition, to say the least. It congratulates the peers and deputies on the continued prosperity of the kingdom, and assures them that the relations of France with foreign nations are highly satisfactory. He states in reference to the Belgium question,—"conferences have been held at London, relative to the affairs of Belgium and Holland. I have no doubt of their having a speedy and pacific result, giving a new guaranty to the independence of Belgium, and the peace of Europe." After mentioning the evacuation of Acona, he proceeds,—"Spain remains a prey to the same convulsions, the same misfortunes. We continue to fulfil towards our allies, every clause of the quadruple alliance. The government of the queen regent has not ceased to receive from us, not only the assistance to which our treaties bind us, but also every support which the interests of France permit us to give."

His opinion of the Mexican question may be supposed liable to change its tone of confidence on the receipt of information of the late trans-

actions at Vera Cruz. "I hope that the differences with Mexico and the Argentine Republic are coming to a close. A fresh naval force which recently sailed from our harbours, is at this time before Vera Cruz, and has gone to obtain from the Mexican Government, the justice and protection, which our commerce has so long required."

The African possessions are said to be in a very prosperous condition, and so are the finances of the kingdom. The King says that the birth of the Count of Paris was the greatest consolation which Heaven could have given him, and he promises that he shall be educated like his father, "to respect our institutions, and in that devotion to France of which my whole family will never cease to give an example."

The *Constitutionnel* of the 18th says, "Yesterday M. Desage arrived from London, bringing the final decision of the Conference, (relating to the affairs of Belgium and Holland,) which is for adhering to the treaty of the 23 articles, as regards the question of territory. The only thing gained by France is a delay of fulfilment to the 15th of February."

Great activity prevailed in the military department at Brussels—nevertheless, it was not expected, either at London or Paris, that there would be an actual resort to blows. It is affirmed in all quarters that England will go with the Northern powers on the Holland-Belgium question.

It was reported in London, that Lord Durham had invited the merchants interested in the trade with Canada, to meet him at his residence, and gone into an explanation and vindication of his conduct.

The Morning Herald alleges that Earl Grey takes part warmly with his son-in-law, Earl Durham, and will defend his conduct in the approaching session of Parliament.

INTERESTING FROM MEXICO.

[From the New Orleans Bee of January 7.]

By the arrival of the Spanish schooner Baliza from Vera Cruz, which she left on the 23d December, we are in possession of intelligence confirmatory of the recent reports respecting a conflict between the French troops and the Mexican forces under the command of Santa Anna. The statement that the Mexican chief had been wounded, and had suffered amputation of the leg, proves to be correct.

We learn in addition, that the city and castle have been evacuated by the French. Santa Anna has allowed eight days to the French residents in Vera Cruz for preparations for their departure and sixty days have been accorded to the French in the interior for the same purpose. It was currently reported that the Mexican government has resolved upon the expulsion of all foreigners without exception.

From the same source we derive information that part of the French fleet had removed from Vera Cruz in order to renew the blockade of other Mexican ports. The corvette *Crocodile*, commanded by the Prince de Joinville, had gone to Havana on a cruise, and there, now remained but four vessels of war before Vera Cruz. The blockade of the town is nevertheless strictly enforced and no vessels whatever are allowed to enter.

The French brig *Marie Therese* has been chartered by the French Admiral to leave in about ten days for N. Orleans, with one hundred and twenty French residents. The army of Santa Anna, about seven thousand strong, is said to be encamped at ten miles distance from the town.

The schooner, from Metamoras brings news that the town is besieged by the federalists, who number some nine hundred, and is defended by a similar force under command of General Filsois. No action had as yet taken place. The assailants, we are told, are but poorly equipped, being unprovided with artillery and principally composed of dragons and musketeers.

ROBBERIES.—We regret to learn that several daring burglaries have lately been committed in this City. On Friday se'night the Shoe Shop of Mr. R. Watts, in the lower part of the Dwelling house of Mr. B. Reynolds, was entered, and Boots, Shoes, &c. to the value of £8 or £10, carried off. On Monday night an equally daring robbery was perpetrated at the back part of the town, where the dwelling house of a coloured man, named Briant, was forcibly broken open, and robbed of about £60 in cash. Several of the gang concerned in robbing Mr. Watt's shop, which was entered by means of a false key, have been apprehended, and committed for trial. The principals are juvenile offenders named Calahan and Dore.—*St. John Courier, Jan. 26.*

At Black River, Parish of Portland, on Tuesday last Mr. John Robinson, in the 91st year of his age, an old and respectable inhabitant, and one of the earliest settlers of this City.

At Loch Lomond, on Thursday evening, the 10th inst., Mr. Roland Bunting, upwards of one hundred years of age.—Mr. Bunting was one of the Loyalists who came to this country in the year 1783.
