FRENCH MANUFACTURES.

Extract from the Address of Baron Thénard to the King of the French, in the name of the Commission appointed to report upon the Exhibition of the Produce of French Manufactures of 1839.

Above forty years have elapsed since the foundation of these memorable exhibitions; they have therefore undergone both the trial of time, and that, more difficult one still, of political revolution. The Consulate received them from the Directory to bequeath them to the Empire, who transmitted them to the Restoration. The Government of July adopted them as a national institution. The first exhibitions could not fail to feel the effects of the calamities which war ever inflicts; but as soon as peace was restored and consolidated, industry, which was as it were, fettered, received a fresh impulse; it was enlightened on all sides by experience, it penetrated whither it was unknown, extended its relations, new processes were discovered, and the exhibitions of 1819 and 1827 warned England that she would soon have a rival in the arts. Those bright hopes were justified by the exhibition of 1834, and are realised by that of 1839. Yes, Sir, great progress has been made in the last five years which have just elapsed.

We have completely acquired the mechanical spinning of wool, and the same will shortly be the case as regards flax, both which important branches of industry will appear in the balance of our commerce for considerable sums. Above fifty establishments construct steam engines of ordinary power; let the State second them and they will soon supply the great powers which our navy and industry stand in need of. Scarcely a few existed in France at the beginning of this century; they may now be counted by thousands, and one day our manufacturing towns will be covered with them. The machinery for making continuous paper has been carried to such perfection that it is exported to distant parts. The loom à la Jacquard which is so eminently useful, has undergone improvements. An ingenious piece of mechanism shapes wood into furniture, ornaments, gunstocks, &c. with as much rapidity as precision. Excellent chronometers, tried chronometers, are purchased at half the price they cost in 1834; all our ships will be supplied with them, and will no longer run the risk of being cast on the coast in misty weather. Bored wells, which promise to confer such eminent benefits upon agriculture, have been the subject of new experiments, which are worthy of encouragement. It was from England that we received all the fine needles that we wanted. France produces them now in such manner as leaves nothing to be desired. Two new articles have taken rank in industry—the stearic wax-light, whose prospects are so great; and Prussian blue dyeing, which, in time, will almost wholly be substituted for indigo. Our crystals are as limped and of as perfect a cut as foreign crystals; they are superior to them as regards elegance of shape, variety of colour, and solidity of metallic ornament. Nothing can be more beautiful, more splendid than our painted glass; they surpass those celebrated of the ancients. For a long time past efforts were making to produce flint and crown glass by a regular process, admitting of their being obtained of perfect quality and dimensions, suited to all the purposes of optics; this important problem has been solved. A great step has been made in the means of ornamenting porcelain and increasing its value. Lithographic stone of a superior quality has been discovered in several parts of the king-

dom. Lithography has succeeded in effecting the easy reproduction of all impressions, whereby the scarcer works may be reproduced with all the features that distinguish them. The fine marble quarries of our Pyrenees which have not been worked for above fifteen years past, supply not only our wants, but export to a considerable extent. Lead, which is so fusible, is soldered upon itself, and without solder with the hottest fire. Iron is preserved from rust by simple means whose efficacy appears certain. Laminated bronze sheaths our ships, and ensures them a much longer duration than copper. Nitre, by an approved process, is prepared in competition with that which comes from India. Our printed calicoes, our silks, and shawls, continue to float into the London warehouses. Our plain and embroidered muslins have driven the Swiss and English muslins from the French market. Wool rivals cotton in the reception of the varied colours of impression, and is sold everywhere, even at those places where cotton grows in abundance. The labouring classes procure from our commerce printed calicoes, shawls, handkerchiefs, woollen stuffs, and cloth, the low prices of which excite astonishment. The breeding of the silkworm has made great progress. A quantity of mulberry trees have been lately planted, and there is every reason to believe that in ten years hence, France will be freed from the tribute she now pays to foreign countries, a tribute amounting to not less than 40,000,000 francs a year. Fecula is transformed, at the manufacturer's pleasure, either into a sugar of a low price, which is used to improve wine and beer, or into dextrine, which is employed as a substitute for Senegal gum. Eight years have scarcely elapsed since the time when we drew from England all the varnished leather that we consumed; England now buys it from France. Remarkable improvements have been introduced into the art of tanning skins. Our morocco continues to obtain the preference in every market. In short, almost all the branches of our industry have undergone material improvements, and almost all have fallen in price.

Such, Sir, is the rapid recapitulation of what industry has produced since last exhibition. What would it be if we ascended to the first, to that of the year VI. of the Republic. What sources of wealth have been discovered in that interval! What is but the result of forty years of labour would appear to be the work of several centuries. The face of every thing has changed. There is not an art that has not been invented, or that has not become a new art through the improvements it has undergone. Some hold a very high rank in the scale of industry; but above all, soars the art of employing steam as a moving force. That is the brightest conquest of man: with iron, water, and coal he has rendered his power almost boundless, for he has created the steam-engine.
