

protestant instruction. During the ensuing autumn it is expected that the help so much needed will be furnished by the Wesleyan Missionary Committee. Upon a general review of the societies and congregations in these Provinces, it was plain there were many encouraging proofs of the Divine approbation attending the labours of the Lord's servants in this department of his work. The cause of truth is most cheerfully supported, and liberal offerings made on every hand to extend the cause of God, both by educational efforts, and through the instrumentality of Christian Missionaries.

Discussions bearing upon the extension and usefulness of Methodism in these Provinces, were conducted with great moderation, the display of true religious zeal, and unbounded charity; some outline was presented for a Missionary Conference, thereby imparting to the Missionaries in the Districts more extended authority than they now possess, but still retaining their connection with the British Conference; the forum of worship, doctrines, discipline, &c. would be the same; but it is believed such a modification would give a greater impetus to the Colonial Societies and congregations in all matters in which the spiritual or financial concerns of the Church are interested.

Another feature in these deliberations was the establishment of an Academy at Sackville, N. B., to be erected by the munificence of Charles F. Allison, Esquire,—the commencement of a monthly Magazine for the benefit of the Districts, of which Messrs. Temple and Wood are to be the joint Editors, and its title "British North American Wesleyan Methodist Magazine;" to be published in this City;—and the making of the necessary arrangements for observing the centenary year of Methodism.

At all the meetings the Rev. R. Alder presided, whose counsels both instructed and interested those who had the privilege of listening to his eloquent addresses. His discourse on the principles and success of Methodism, delivered in the new Chapel, we understand, was a masterly display of talent; the Missionaries unanimously requested it should be published, to which we are glad to learn he has given his consent. As a more permanent testimony of their esteem for him, and their sense of his ability as a gifted Minister of the Lord Jesus Christ, they have solicited that he will sit for a full length portrait at their expense; from the character we have heard of Mr. Valentine, as an artist, his friends will doubtless be much gratified at this spontaneous request, and unquestionable mark of esteem.

From the Missionaries who went from New Brunswick, we have been pleased to hear of their delight from the courteous and hospitable treatment they received from their brethren, to many of whom they were strangers, and also from the friends generally in Halifax; during their stay there, the Rev. Messrs. Williams, Smithson, Wood, Pickles and Daniel, had the privilege of addressing large and attentive congregations, and their labours were nobly seconded by their talented associate, the Rev. M. Ritchey, A. M., Principal of the Upper Canada Academy.

We may in conclusion assure Mr. Alder, that his friends in this city take great pleasure in observing his advancement in usefulness and influence in the great connexion of which he is so distinguished a member.

Since writing the above we have been informed that on Friday evening the 16th of August, the Centenary Meeting for New Brunswick District is to be held in Germain Street Chapel; and every effort is making to dedicate the new Chapel in St. George's street to the service of God on the following Sabbath.

Agreeable to notice, the Annual Examination of the Episcopal Sunday School took place in the National School Houses on Thursday the 18th instant before a numerous and respectable assembly. Circumstances having induced the postponement of the examination to a later period of the year than usual, many of the children were absent in the country. The numbers present were 14 male and 23 female Teachers, and 113 Boys and 225 Girls. The School opened with singing, after which, prayer was offered up by the Rev. Mr. Harrison, from Portland. In the absence of the Rev. the Rector of the Parish, the Rev. Mr. Harrison then proceeded to the examination of the first division, in the Prophet Daniel; at the conclusion, the Rev. Gentleman expressed himself gratified with the proficiency evinced in the sacred scriptures in the course of examination. The several divisions of the school were also examined in the parts of Scripture to which their attention had been more particularly directed during the past year, and displayed a knowledge of those truths of salvation which have been found by experience to be best secured to the Young by a system of Sunday School instruction, founded on an humble dependence on the Divine blessing. The examination being over, the Rev. Mr. Harrison kindly addressed the Teachers and Children, cheering and animating them on, in the cause in which they were engaged, as one, if faithfully preserved in, that would ultimately lead them to the realms of Glory. The children were then handed by the Teachers such refreshments as were provided, after which the proceedings of the day closed with singing and prayer, the whole exhibited a scene truly gratifying to the humble Christian, and tended in no little degree to show the advantages of early religious instructions.—16.
