tersburg. You delight too much in mystifying.

no said that the new drain would carry off
a water which now accumulates near the
sidewalk of the Archdeacon, or the property
of the late Mr. Clapperton? I did not. On a
second inspection of the ground, I find that in
addition to what I formerly specified, the whole
of the surface water between Mr. Bages' cor-
ner and Miss Allan's property in George
Street, can be carried off by this drain, when
the street is properly formed—formed as a
street in a thriving town ought to be. It will
not, however, be necessary to drain so much
ground by one trunk. I repeat, therefore, that
you had no public grounds for your remarks;
and I am strengthened in my surmise as to
your motive, by the pitiful sarcasms immediately
following your disavowal of entertaining any
animosity against the Secretary. It is evident
to me that you entertain private animosity, not
only against the Secretary, but against the
individual members of his family, otherwise you
would not have unobscurely represented that
the Fredericton Improvement Fund was spent,
not only in building a bridge at the upper end
of the town, close by the property of a mem-
ber of his family, but in building it on its pre-
sent site, from an improper motive. That
bridge, Sir, is in the direct line of the Great
Road as it existed at the time the bridge was
built, and the expenses of it were not defrayed
from the Fredericton Improvement Fund.—I
have frequently remarked that when newspaper
writers use the expressions "We understand,"
"It is understood," "It is generally believed,"
"If we are correctly informed," and so forth,
that they are pretty well assured that they are
telling a falsehood. I state this as the result
of observation, and I would not take it to your-
self in its full harshness.

In return for your interference in mat-
ters which concern you not, allow me to give
you one word of advice. As you value your
character as a Journalist never threaten to make
disclosures about contracts, &c.; but whatever
of impropriety you know respecting them, state
it at once, firmly and independently, and let
public indignation visit the guilty. It may be
that the prospect of getting a mouthful of de-
traction, may induce a sale of two or three extra
numbers, but with the thinking part of the Commu-
nity, a course opposed to that which I have recom-
mended, involves a greater loss of reputation
than is compensated by the gains in point of
sales.

I am done with censuring you. You are by
all odds the best shot in the Province, with a
great gun at a cock sparrow. I doubt whe-
ther another man could be found who could
wield, with so much dexterity, such weapons
as you have every ready at your call.

Who, except yourself, Sir, when foiled in
bringing down public animadversion, about the
expending of twenty dollars worth of Statute
Labour, and the site of a paltry drain, would
wield after the sympathy of a Community, and
call to his aid such stirring subjects, as—
an independent Journal—interested and de-
signing people—a dominant Church Establish-
ment—a richly endowed literary institution—the
shades of the dead—the liberty of the press—
a destitution of public squares—public funds—
direct taxation—and finally the grave itself—
bedaubing each of them with the slime of self-
aggrandizement or deadly malevolence? These are
great guns with a vengeance.—People ought
not to set mountains at labour to bring forth
mice.

In conclusion—Be somewhat more modest—
less self-opinionated—restrain your exuberant scrib-
bendi within the limits of propriety, and re-
member that you are an individual member of
the Community, and that you are not The
Public itself.

I have done with you, other matters demand
